Fort Hays president says colleges must expand

Hammond spoke to the Goodland Rotary Club at their regular Friday lunch meeting. Goodland was

the last stop of the five-day, 17-city press tour that Hammond undertakes each year.

Hammond said he has been talking to people about what he calls Gov. Sam Brownback's "Great Experiment" aimed at economic growth. The experiment is in three arts, he said, beginning with reduction in taxes, primarily personal and business income taxes. This is supposed to help stimulate business growth, with an estimated 50,000 jobs added over the coming

Sometimes, he said, it's not even about new jobs. Some existing jobs are being recast and workers need new skills. Hammond pointed to the aviation industry, which is moving toward using composites in airplane manufacturing rather than metal. and needs workers trained in that.

With all those jobs, Hammond said, the state will have an increased need for college-educated workers, and its post-secondary education institutions - community and technical colleges and Regents universities - will have to expand in order to provide it.

That's why Fort Hays has been working to expand its online college, Hammond said. This year, Sherman County has 22 students enrolled on campus and 13 do-
