

The Goodland Police Department is looking for information on several acts of vandalism committed on the east side of town early Thursday morning.

The department received several reports of vandalism during the day. Houses along Arcade Ave. had their Christmas decorations damaged. At Goodland High School there was minor damage from several objects thrown at windows. At Northwest Kansas Technical College, several lights and a sign were damaged.

There were also reports of a door being dragged down the street by an unknown individual. An officer was dispatched but was unable to locate the individual.

Police believe the incidents happened between midnight and 6 a.m. Thursday.


