New sheriff picks second in command

Newly sworn-in Sherman County Sheriff Burton Pianalto announced his choice for undersheriff at the Goodland Rotary Club's weekly meeting Friday.

Pianalto said he asked Deputy Jason Showalter to take the position about 30 minutes

before the noon meeting. Showalter, a 10-year veteran of the Sheriff's Office, accepted the position. He is a Goodland High School graduate with a bachelor's degree from Fort Hays State University.

"The undersheriff is my right hand," Pianalto said. "He allows me to function. Talking to him is like talking to me."

There are still about four positions, including two deputies, that Pianalto has left to fill, though there were some vacancies before he took office earlier last week. He said a high turnover rate is one thing he hopes to correct.

Pianalto said he is looking to make several other changes at the Sheriff's Office, includ-

ing starting a community policing program. The concept includes education the community on how to better observe and report crime. Law enforcement is there to react to and deter crime, he said, but community members know more about what is going on in their own neighborhoods.

Northwest Tech gets \$50,000 grant from foundation

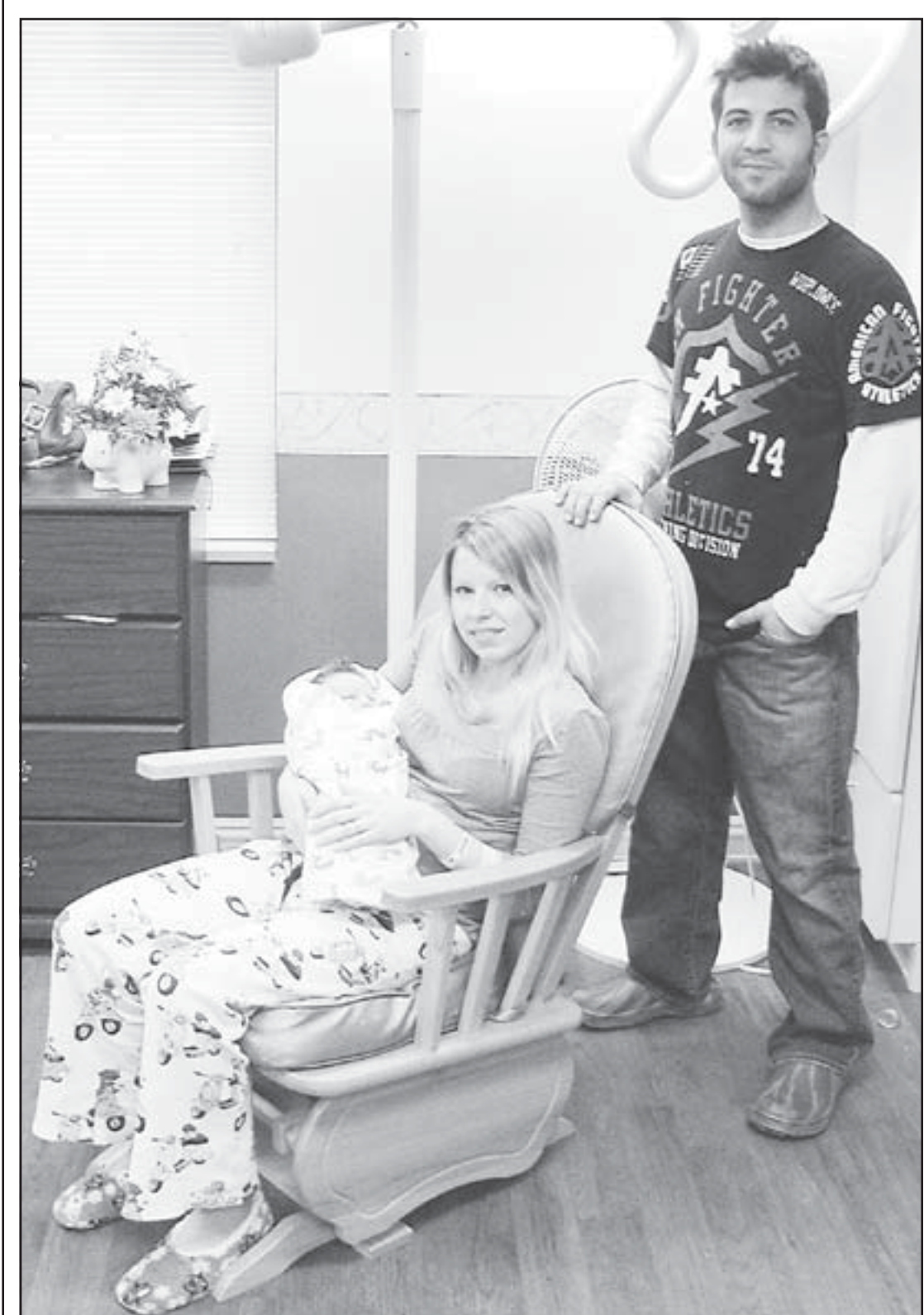
The Dane G. Hansen Foundation awarded Northwest Kansas Technical College a \$50,000 grant for the "Tools for Success" project. The project funds the purchase of three tool kits for each of the programs in the Transportation and Construction divisions. These tool kits expand access to high wage, high demand careers by lessening the upfront cost of tools by making rental tool kits available to students.

One of the most significant challenges to the Kansas economy is closing the skills gap by training students for stable, higher wage technical careers. Governor Brownback took a significant step forward by introducing Senate bill 155 to fund technical education at the high school level. Kansas students are now able to attain technical education credits and industry-recognized credentials prior to graduation

through the tuition waiver program. However, access is limited for students who do not have funds available upfront to purchase the necessary tool kits ranging from \$400 to \$3,300 per program. The Dane G. Hansen Foundation funded Tools for Success project addresses this barrier by providing rental tool kits at a fraction of the cost.

The Dane G. Hansen Foundation has a long history of supporting technical education. Each year the foundation funds one hundred Career and Technical Education Scholarships to assist students within the service area attend technical programs in Kansas. The Tools for Success project furthers this assistance by providing an alternative to accessing the tools necessary to pursue high wage, high demand

Historic paintings found at theater

While tearing out part of a wall last week at the Sherman Theater, manager Dave Branda re-discovered a wall painting that hasn't seen the light of day in nearly 84 years.

The theater originally opened in 1926 as a silent film/vaudeville theater. In the early hours of Jan. 21, 1928, a fire destroyed the stage end of the building. While redecorating, the original woodland scenes painted on the walls were replaced with eight paintings of peacocks and roses. The theater reopened on April 23, three months after the fire.

However, the following year, movies with sound were being released, so the theater had to be refit with sound-absorbing mate-

rial. The Celotex Company had the contract to replace the metal roof and cover the walls with new material. Only one year after their introduction, the peacock paintings were covered over and were not seen by anyone until last week.

In 1928, the paintings had been illuminated with wall sconces. Branda said he had been looking for the wiring and electrical boxes for the sconces because he wanted to reinstall some new ones. He said he knew about the paintings, but did not know exactly where they were or what they looked like, since there are no photos of the interior of the theater from that time.

Just Edit the customer name you don't want to use to the name you do want to use. Click OK, then click Yes to confirm that you want to merge the two names. All the transactions for both entries are now combined under the name you want to use. The names must be identical in order to merge. You can also do this with Vendors, Accounts, Items, and Other Names. You can only merge the same type of list entries - a customer with a customer,

Find the resolve to attack gun violence

Most of us made New Year's resolutions to lose weight, save money or simply not to have any resolutions. No matter which category we are in sticking to those goals takes a high personal resolve, and determination to stay in for the long haul.

When we heard about the shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary a month ago we were so overcome it was hard to contemplate anything worse.

"It would be good if I had some profound guidance to offer," wrote Robert Simpson in the Columbus, Ga., *Ledger-Enquirer* (Dec. 23, 2012). "I don't. Some eloquent words of faith and comfort might help. I don't have them either. The wanton killing of women diligently performing one of the most important and selfless of tasks, and the causing of innocent children to spend their last moments on earth in terror, then slaughtering them like penned-up animals - this kind of insanity leaves me with nothing profound or comforting to offer.

"So why should I write anything about the murder of six adults and 20 small children in Newtown? Because to ignore something that has caused such unspeakable grief seems, as someone has said, disloyal. To write about something else at this moment seems not worthwhile."

The shooting in Newtown, Conn., coming months after the massacre at the Aurora, Colo., theatre rocked many to the core, and cries were heard for the country to act to reduce gun violence or at least examine ways to address what was happening in our country.

President Barack Obama assigned Vice President Joe Biden to gather people on both sides and to develop some recommendations to provide action the American public was seeking. Biden got his work done early, and Wednesday, President Obama held a press conference to reveal his recommendations to Congress and signed executive orders to help where he could without having to wait for Congress to act.

The children who wrote to the President about gun violence, some of those who survived the shootings and their parents were with the President as he made his case for a military-style rapid-firing rifle ban, a ban on large ammunition magazines and the need for expanded background checks to include those guns sold at "gun shows."

President Obama said getting these items through Congress will not be easy.

"To make a real and lasting difference, Congress must act," he said. "And Congress must act soon."

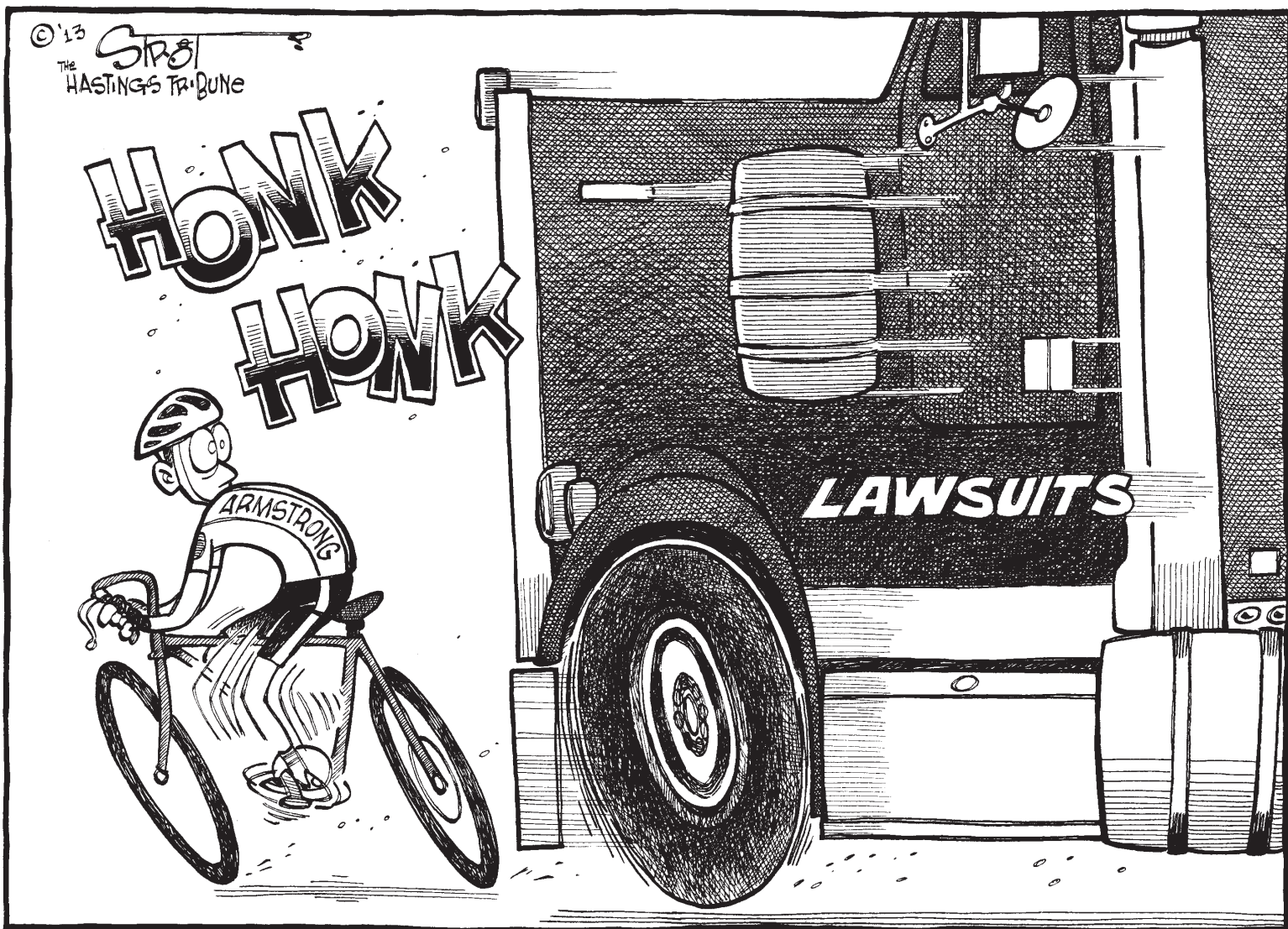
In recent days we have seen the second anniversary of the shooting in Tucson, Ariz., where a man using a handgun and a large magazine killed six and wounded 14 before he was stopped when he tried to reload the gun.

The immediate cry from the National Rifle Association is that none of the proposed laws will be passed because they will make sure Congress does not act.

We do not see these actions as trampling on the Second Amendment rights to own guns any more than the ban on machine guns passed in 1934. We know keeping pressure on legislators to act will take an higher resolve than for any other resolutions we may have made.

There are 350 million people in this country, but despite the fact nearly 60 percent of those favor the gun laws being proposed, the loud voice of the four million NRA members (.11 percent) have vowed to stop the democratic process.

As the days and months go by we hope those who favor the changes maintain their high resolve, and continue to champion reasonable ways to approach reducing the many forms of violence in our country. -Tom Betz

He made the comment that he and the President of the Senate, Susan Wagle, have a goal of finishing the legislative work in eighty days. That would make for an aggressive session, and it would save the state money.

At times, Ms. Spinney didn't know if she was going to continue at the facility, but I believe she felt, at this point in her life, that it was her calling. Her family wasn't all that excited about her teaching at a prison facility, but by looking at the results, she was right on.

For the past five years, I have enjoyed teaching at the pre-GED level and working with her

to send up students that are prepared for her class. Or, at least, I try to prepare them. As Ms. Spinney says: "It's all in the attitude. If they really want to achieve it, they will!"

Recently, Ms. Spinney had knee replacement surgery. The time walking on the facility's concrete floors caught up with her. After her recovery, she will retire from the Kit Carson Correctional Center.

It has been a privilege to teach and work with her. It has been a privilege to see a difference that she has made in students who didn't believe they could achieve a GED. It has been a privilege to commute on I-70 for who-knows how many miles we've ridden and driven.

So, Ms. Spinney, I hope your surgery went

well, your therapy goes quickly and you can start writing the book you always mention about your experiences at the prison. But please, don't mention my practical jokes, or the number of times we ate at fast-food restaurants, we'd both be in trouble with our spouses.

Watching sunsets

Sunlight.

You can sit at the table and watch the sun set a little later each day. It's such a relief after the hypershort days of late December.

It's not much yet. Just 10 minutes since the shortest day of the year, Dec. 21, known as the winter solstice. But it's something.

We only get about 9 hours, 23 minutes of daylight here then. The sun rose at 8:01 a.m. and set at 5:24. Last Monday, it rose at 8:04 and set at 5:37. That's not a lot of progress.

But gaining a minute or more a day, in a couple of short months, we'll be back to even at the spring equinox, March 20. After that, the days just keep getting longer until June.

In the summer months, after the solstice June 21, we may notice the long evenings slipping away, but we'll ignore it until September, when the autumnal equinox sneaks up on us Sept. 23.

People, most of us anyway, prefer light to dark. Scientists says there's an increase in depression in the dark months, something called seasonal affective disorder, brought on by, well, darkness.

If you have only 9 1/2 hours of daylight, then you have 14 1/2 hours of darkness. Five hours more dark than day. It gets to people around

the holidays. And that may be one reason why we're so fond of stringing holiday lights everywhere in November and, especially in the last few years, leaving them up later and later. Why people started putting up orange Halloween lights in October and why you see more and more red and white lights in January and February.

Heck, some places leave Christmas lights up year around, sometimes for commercial purposes, like decorations at a restaurant. And sometimes just because.

While we haven't stooped to Halloween lights at our place - there's enough paganism to go around these days - I'm under the impression we'll have Valentine's Day lights out by the time you read this. They've got to brighten up the long January nights.

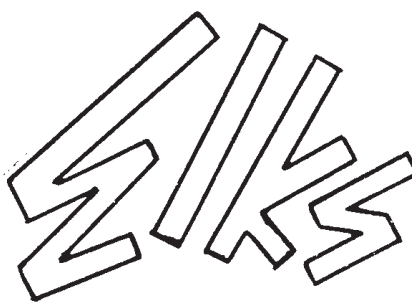

Cowboys end tournament on high note with 62-52 win

The Goodland High School boys basketball team was able to make a little more headway in the weekend rounds of the Trojan Classic tournament at Hillsboro, placing seventh out of eight teams.
