1984 graduate speaks at Goodland ceremony

The 2013 Goodland High School Graduation has marched into history leaving the 49 graduates with feelings both of excitement for the future and sadness that their high school days are over.

The speaker for the event was the Michael Armstrong, a 1984 graduate of Goodland High School. Armstrong lives in Fairway and is the general manager of WaterOne, Johnson County's Water District No. 1.

He said he wondered when Jacque Elliott called if an error had been found affecting his graduation requirements and he might have to come back and finish it. Continuing his lighter tone he said the one thing he had hoped was that Max Jones had been air conditioned since he graduated 29 years ago.

Armstrong said he wasn't a very good student in high school and really became serious about his studies when he went to college to get a degree in political science from Kansas State University and a law degree from the University of Kansas.

On the practical side, he said, the world is very competitive but Kansans are known to be friendly, hardworking and dedicated people.

"I am successful because of my roots," he said. It's a challenge to make friends. Be friendly and respectful to everyone you don't know where you might run into them again especially in business.

"There is no substitute for hard work. 'Luck favors the prepared mind.'"

Know signs of problem drinking

There has been increased attention in recent years to the problems associated with excesses in alcohol consumption. From college binge drinking to the often tragic results of drunk driving incidents, the media, courts and general public have begun to recognize the serious implications that drinking to excess can have.

But as important as these stories are, for most of us the real issues are usually much more personal and closer to home. Statistics show that across the country, alcohol consumption has increased in recent years, yet most people have little understanding of the signs that point to a drinking problem, or they

don't know what to do when such signs appear.

A simple and easy way to test yourself for a potential drinking problem is to answer a few questions. Ask yourself if you've ever felt annoyed about criticism of your drinking, or do you feel guilty about your drinking? Have you ever felt that you ought to cut down on your drinking? Do you find that you need an early morning drink to get going? Experts say answering yes to even two of these questions indicates a possible drinking problem.

A professional counselor working with someone facing possible alcohol abuse problems would conduct a much deeper evaluation. He or she would look for drinking related issues, such as the client

being unable to remember a previous evening's drinking, a history of alcohol-related violent arguments or physical fights, evidence of neglecting family life or work-related problems. When alcohol has led to losing a job, arrests for drunken driving or the loss of friends, help is clearly needed.

For anyone even suspecting that there is a drinking problem, professional help should be sought quickly. A local hospital or mental health center can provide a list of professional counselors who specialize in substance abuse issues. You can also find professional counselors listed in your local yellow pages or through the American Counseling Association website at www.counseling.org. A profes-

sional counselor can provide both an in-depth evaluation of possible issues as well as assistance in combating the problem.

Taking that first step of admitting there might be a problem may be both difficult and painful, but it's an important one. Only by beginning the process of seeking help can someone can avoid the very serious and often tragic consequences that come with excessive drinking.

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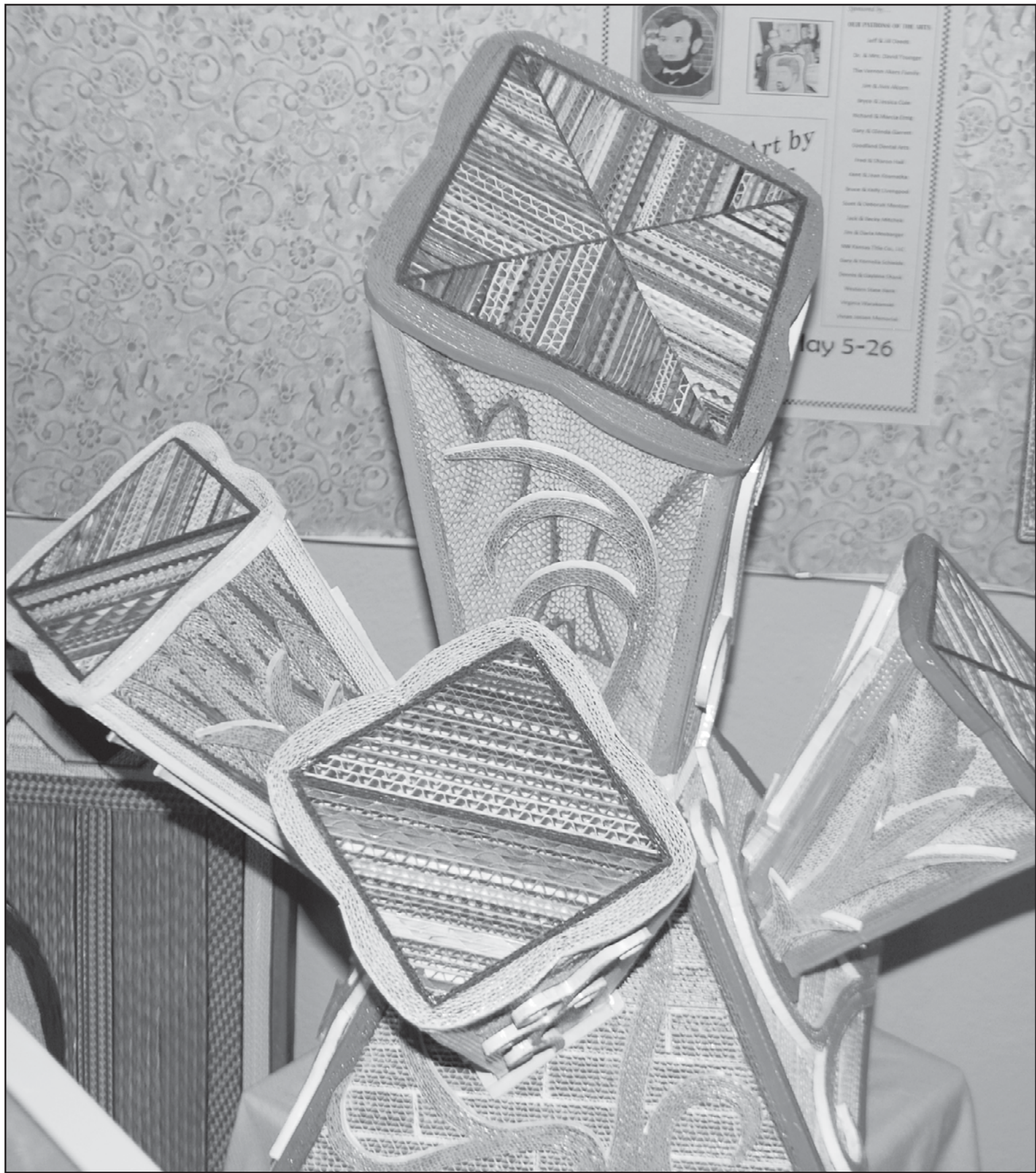
Cardboard, bronze on display

Currently at the Carnegie Arts Center, 12th and Center, is the exhibit of Jessie Montes' cardboard art and bronze sculpture done by Goodland native Greg Todd. The exhibit will continue until the end of June.

Greg Todd's sculptures depict a variety of subject matters including wildlife and the human figure. Some of his works are of a military figure, fire fighters and children at various activities. He is currently working on a ice skater sculpture for Westminster, Colo. and a three-figure piece for the Grand Junction, Colo., police headquarters. Todd has his studio in Greeley, Colo.

Montes of Dodge City creates two and three-dimensional artwork from cardboard. He is a retired custodian for the Dodge City school district. He began experimenting with creations made from cardboard in 1990 when his son and daughter were called to active duty during the Persian Gulf War to relax.

Born in Mexico he had no formal education in the arts but his work has gone on to show across the U.S. His artwork include portraits of famous people, landscapes, architecture and more. His tools consist of cardboard cut in 1/4-inch strips, tweezers, a sharp razor blade and paste.

City-county talks a good decision

We applaud the county and city commissions for being willing to sit down and talk.

Last Tuesday’s meeting at the new fire and ambulance station – which looks great, by the way – was one of the more productive joint meetings in recent history. The commissioners on both sides, while remaining passionate about their viewpoints, were able to get more to the heart of the disagreement over Economic Development.

Economic Development is a tough needle to thread. You want to entice business to come to town or encourage existing businesses to expand, but you don’t want to invest so much money that a failure would be catastrophic.

How Goodland handles economic development now seems to make sense. Help businesses with utilities or other city-related costs (such as helping build a road to a new building), and providing informational resources through the Economic Development staff. In this manner, Goodland can avoid sinking its own money into a large venture and then having it fail. We, and many other cities, have all experienced that nightmare over the years.

But provided a somewhat lower-grade assistance has its drawbacks. If the only incentive is help on utilities, for example, it may not be the decided factor for a business that is relocating. What these incentives do, however, is contribute to making Goodland a business-friendly environment. There are many factors that go into that, and all governments should try to do their part to facilitate that.

But in getting to the root of the city-county disagreement, it seems part of that is that the county commissioners want to be more involved. It’s no surprise things like this come up. When you elect new officials, they come in with different ideas. The previous county commissioners didn’t want to be involved in the decision making process at Economic Development, or they would have pushed for more county oversight. But none of those people are on the commission anymore, and we now have new commissioners with different ideas.

We don’t see anything wrong with involving the county, after all, it contributes tax dollars to something that is supposed to benefit everyone, why shouldn’t they have some oversight? We think both the city and county would benefit from a renegotiation of the agreement with the goal of involving the county more.

Sherman County is far from the first to experience conflicts between its city and county governments. One need only read the *Salina Journal* to see evidence of that. But we are all citizens, all taxpayers, all local and as has been said, there is far more that unites us than divides us. We hope the city and county continue to meet. They have proven in the past that when they do work together, they can accomplish good things. –Kevin Bottrell

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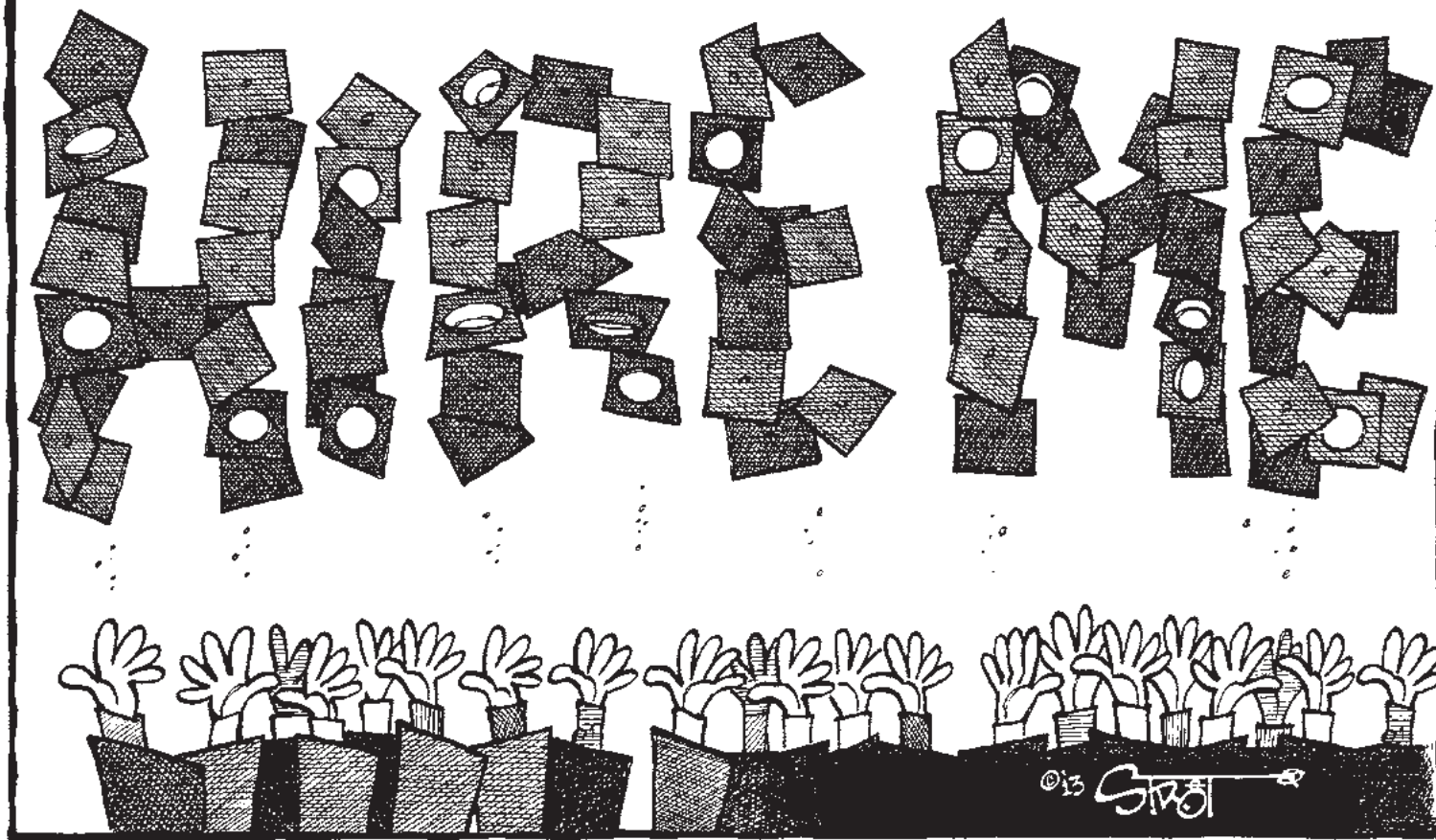

The real legacy of No Child Left Behind

A decade of No Child Left Behind policy has dramatically changed the status of teachers across America.

I visit student teachers across Kansas, and I see the growing disrespect this federal teach-to-the-test system has generated.

In September 2002, before penalties for not making Adequate Yearly Progress were in place, I wrote a commentary in *The Wichita Eagle* titled: “Students Responsible for Learning, Too.”

Kansas had adopted Quality Performance Accreditation and begun accrediting public schools under this plan in 1995, six years before President Bush imposed No Child Left Behind. Both systems were based on Total Quality Management, a business model designed for factories.

Teachers could feel they were becoming the scapegoat for all failures in public education.

Jody Marquardt, a superb veteran biology teacher, astutely observed: “They are blaming us, aren’t they.”

The *Eagle* commentary explained how all students have a responsibility to come to class prepared, to pay attention, to complete their homework, etc. The newspaper commentary included my photo.

I had a student teacher in Wichita in the spring of 2003. I had never before visited the school. As I walked down the main hall to check-in at the office, several teachers I had never seen before greeted me with an enthusiastic “Hi!” After I had evaluated my student teacher, I got the same enthusiastic greetings in the office as I checked out.

“Very friendly school,” I commented.

“Oh, you are posted in the teacher’s lounge,” my student said. “Some teachers read your article to their students.”

And she pointed to my *Eagle* commentary tacked on the office bulletin board.

Fast forward exactly one decade to September 2012. Now these weekly education commentaries are sent to all Kansas newspapers and about 80 run them. The title of the column was “Hitting the Ceiling” and it addressed why it was unlikely that state assessment scores

could go higher, but the theme again was about students having responsibility for their learning too. Regardless of how well teachers teach, students will not score high, and it is not the teachers’ fault.

These two essays were essentially about the same topic: student responsibility. But what a difference a decade makes.

I get much feedback from my colleagues in public classrooms, and I am careful to mask my sources and protect them.

The teachers’ enthusiasm for the message was no less than in 2002. But one teacher said her colleagues secretly passed the commentary around teacher-to-teacher in a brown manila envelope. Another e-mailed that the commentary was taped inside the faculty restroom stalls where administrators never come.

There are still public schools in Kansas where administrators and teachers work together as professionals. But in a growing number of schools, administrators are foremen and teachers are mere assembly-line workers, expected to take orders and shut up. This jackbooted attitude is directly due to No Child penalties that remain today under different wording.

This dysfunction in communication – with parents and teachers at the bottom, and deaf

administrators and school boards at the top – was clearly evident at the May state Board of Education meeting. While over 20 parents and teachers from across Kansas spoke against the national Common Core Curriculum, a representative from the Kansas Association of School Boards reported that they had “... heard no objections from any of our school board members...” against them.

Some veteran teachers in the more repressive Kansas schools have been encouraged to retire early – which they interpret as desire by administrators for younger teachers who are more willing to quietly comply with orders. “Teach Plus,” a Boston teacher-policy organization, released an October 2012 survey of 1,075 teachers. 71 percent of the rookies felt student growth should be part of their evaluation as a teacher but only 41 percent of veteran teachers concurred. 51 percent of rookies wanted student scores to be over 20 percent of their evaluation; only 23 percent of veteran teachers agreed.

The real legacy of No Child is not just overtesting of a generation of students, where memorization replaces creative thinking, but the destruction of professional cooperation among teachers and administrators.

If we ended this teach-to-the-test tyranny today, we will still have many young teachers who have accepted de-professionalized teaching and who have adopted blue-collar attitudes.

This is another commentary teachers can pass around in secret envelopes and hang in faculty restroom stalls.

try Music Charts, including “Only One You,” “Devil In A Bottle,” “I Loved Em Every One,” “Last Cheaters Waltz” and more. During the “Golden Era” of the late 1970s and early 1980s, the success of ‘Urban Cowboy’ helped usher in a new wave of country. Sheppard opened the 1980s with a remarkable run of

a dozen #1’s hits that would forever secure his place in industry history.

Born in Humboldt, Tenn., the young man known as Bill Browder set sail for Memphis at the age of 15 to launch his fledgling career in music in earnest. Using the stage name, Brian Stacy, he released his first record, “High School Days,” which caused enough interest on the pop charts of the mid-60s to

win him spots as an opening artist for some of the biggest names of the day – legendary names such as the Beach Boys, Jan and Dean and the Animals.

Hitting a dry patch with his career as an artist, Sheppard redirected his passion for music to promoting the music of other artists. He established himself as one of the industry’s most successful record

promoters – a career path that led him to form a close personal and professional relationship with Elvis Presley while promoting “The King” for RCA. Elvis gave Sheppard more than encouragement – he gave him his first tour bus and the encouraging words of a classic Elvis hit: “Follow That Dream!”

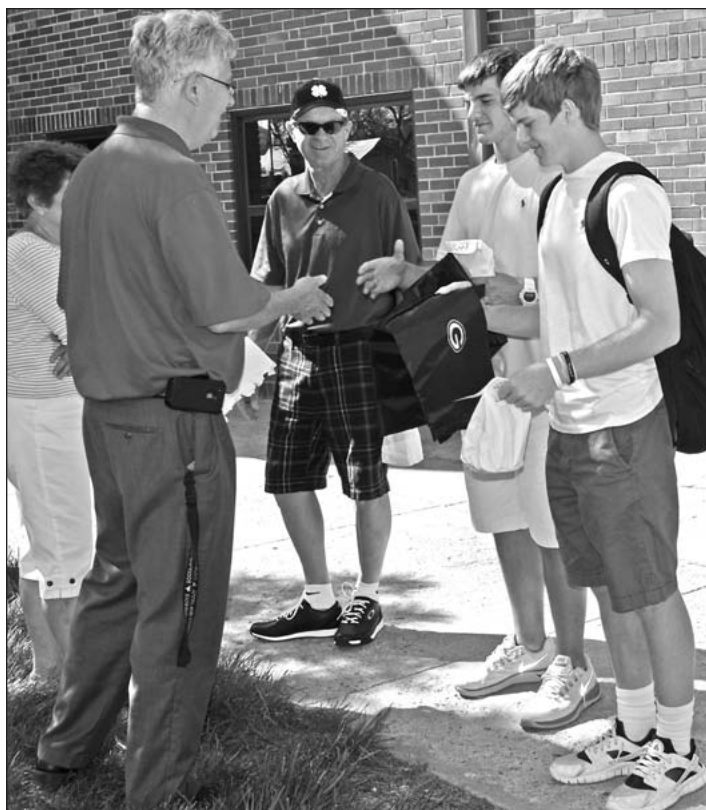
