Weekend brings damaging storms

After a mostly dry week, a series of evening storms dropped one and a half inches of rain over the weekend, bringing with them damaging wind, hail and lightning.

Rainfall reports always vary throughout the county. The National Weather Service station on the north end of Goodland, reported just .03 inches on Friday. Storms on Saturday and Sunday dropped 1.45 inches all together.

With this rain, Sherman County is up to 2.39 inches in June, 1.76 inches above the average. The area is still under the average for the year. The weather service has recorded 6.75 inches so far in 2013, compared to the average of 8.24. However, it has surpassed last year's 5.32 inches.

In between storms, the county has been extremely dry, with fire weather warnings in effect through-

out most of last week.

"We're still hurting," said Dave Floyd, warning coordination meteorologist with the National Weather Service, "It doesn't take much to dry

us out. We're not as bad as last year, especially east of Highway 25. This week should improve things.

Floyd said the area was close to the normal level of thunderstorm

and tornado activity. There have been eight recorded tornados, but only one near Benkelman, Neb., did any damage.

"I would call it a typical year,"

he said.

Sherman County was mainly bypassed by storms on Thursday, but high winds that night damaged a half-finished fertilizer silo at the Goodland Business Park. Bill Shields with Crop Production Services said the structural strength of the silo comes from the top and bottom, and the roof hadn't been put on yet. A strong gust of wind folded the south side inward. Shields said the company building the tank for Crop Production Services has experience with this sort of damage, and it would only set them back about a week.

Speaking to the Star-News on Friday, Floyd called Thursday a "marginally severe event" and said there was a pattern that would bring more of a chance for thunderstorms over the weekend. He was proven cor-

Goodland Elks Club holds Flag Day event on Friday

"Old Glory" was remembered on Friday, Flag Day, by the Goodland Elks. The ceremony was held in the shade under the awning at the lodge with around 30 people there.

Grady Bonsall, Elks Americanism chairman and chaplain for the lodge, was in charge of the observance.

He talked about the evolution of the form of the flag. The flag started out on Jan. 1, 1776, as 13 alternate red and white stripes and the British Union Jack in the upper-left corner. In May Betsy Ross sewed the flag with 13 red and white stripes with a blue union with 13 stars. The stars represented a new Constellation. In 1794 the flag had 15 stripes and stars.

In 1818 the day was to have 13 stripes and a star for each state.

The 13 horizontal stripes represent the original 13 colonies. The red stripes symbolize hardiness and valor, white purity and innocence and blue vigilance, perseverance and justice.

The guest speakers for the occasion were Ian Bonsall and Brian James. Ian Bonsall talked about the nation's struggle for freedom and those who have made the sacrifices to keep it so.

Kaitlyn Coumerilh and Kayle McKenna read their essay winners in the Americanism essay contest.

Dani and Danny Mangus provided music for the occasion.

Gene F. Robinson, 67, Edna, Texas, former Sherman County resident, died Saturday, June 8, 2013.

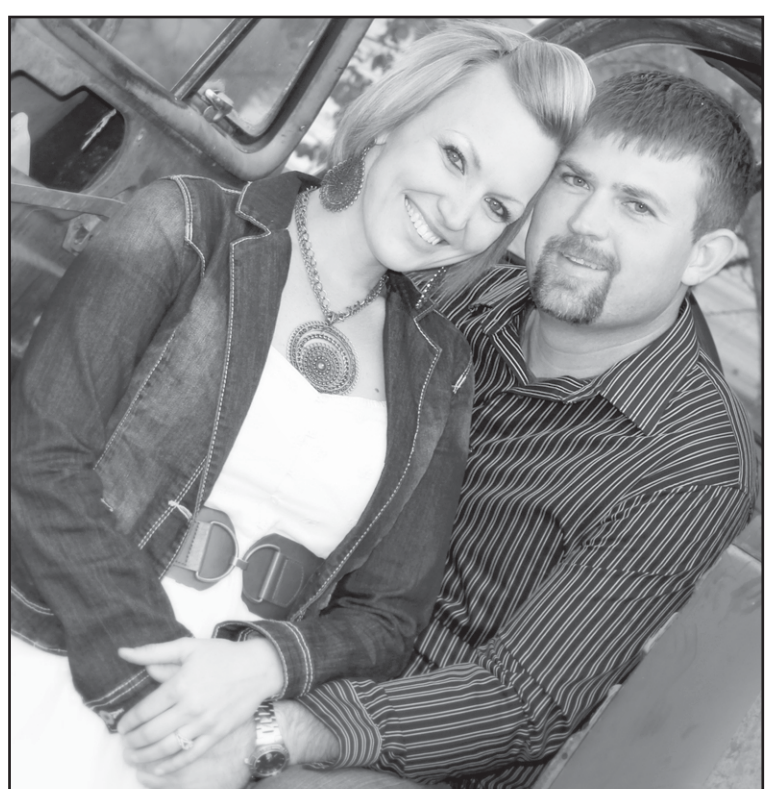

Hot cars can quickly become deadly for children

As summer approaches, bringing with it warmer temperatures, Safe Kids Kansas is working to increase awareness and urge caregivers to never leave children alone in a vehicle. Safe Kids Kansas reminds parents and caregivers to always check for sleeping children before leaving a vehicle, with the goal of having no more children die from heat stroke when they are "forgotten" in cars.

From 1998 to present, at least 569 children died from heat stroke because they were left unattended in vehicles that became too hot for them to survive. "As these tragedies continue to occur, Safe Kids Kansas is intensifying our efforts to get the message out that the inside of a vehicle is an extremely dangerous place

for a child alone in hot weather," said Cherie Sage, Safe Kids Kansas. "Even on a mild day, the inside of a car can quickly become very hot. This is a place no child should be alone, and because children's bodies heat up 3 to 5 times faster than adults, this makes them much more susceptible to heat stroke."

Although most would assume this would never happen to them, there is no common description of the caregiver that has experienced this tragedy. It has happened to caring and responsible families from all socio-economic, geographic and educational backgrounds. "Fatal Distraction," Gene Weingarten's Pulitzer Prize-winning article in *The Washington Post* explains how these heartbreaking and preventable

tragedies can happen to anyone.

"Reaching parents and caregivers with ways to prevent these tragedies will no doubt help keep kids safe. These heartbreaking incidents can happen to anyone, and public education is vital to combating these preventable occurrences," said Sage.

Nine out of 10 parents report that they never leave their child alone in a car, but for the one parent that does, things can end tragically. Never leave your child alone in a car, even for a minute.

Together, we can cut down the number of deaths and near-misses by remembering to ACT.

Avoid heat stroke-related injury and death by:

- Never leaving your child alone in the car, even for a minute.

- Consistently locking unattended vehicle doors and trunks.

Create reminders and habits that give you and your child's caregiver a safety net:

- Establish a peace-of-mind plan. Have your child care provider call you if your child is not dropped off within 10 minutes of their expected time of care. Create a routine of texting or calling other caregivers when you drop your child off at child care so all of you know where your child is at all times.

- Place a purse, briefcase, gym bag, cell phone or an item that is needed at your next stop in the back seat near the child.

- Set the alarm on your cell phone or computer calendar as a reminder to drop your child off at childcare.

Take action if you see an unattended child in a vehicle:

- Dial 911 immediately and follow the instructions that emergency personnel provide—they are trained to determine if a child is in danger.

Washington should get out of the way

Ronald Reagan once said that one of the scariest phrases in the English language is "I'm from the government, and I'm here to help." Nowhere is that saying more true than for our nation's small businesses.

Listening to our local job creators is so important because small businesses provide more than one-half of the jobs in America, especially here in the Heartland. They spend countless hours and sleepless nights building a business, so they provide a little better life for their family. In turn, they are important citizens in our communities by employing their neighbors, paying the taxes that fund our local governments, and often sponsoring the local little league teams.

While big businesses and liberal special interests in Washington negotiate deals on what new regulations will be "acceptable" to them, our small businesses struggle to keep up. They cannot afford to hire an army of lobbyists and lawyers to sift through the mountains of new mandates that are passed each year. Instead, they work extra hours at their office or at their kitchen table trying to demystify the government mandates, make payroll, pay off the loan, and maybe take that family vacation. And, there is no relief in sight.

This year in particular, our small businesses also face the uncertainties that come with the implementation of the Affordable Care Act, or Obamacare. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Kathleen Sebelius has already produced over twenty thousand pages of Obamacare regulations to be implemented on January 1st, and they are not done yet.

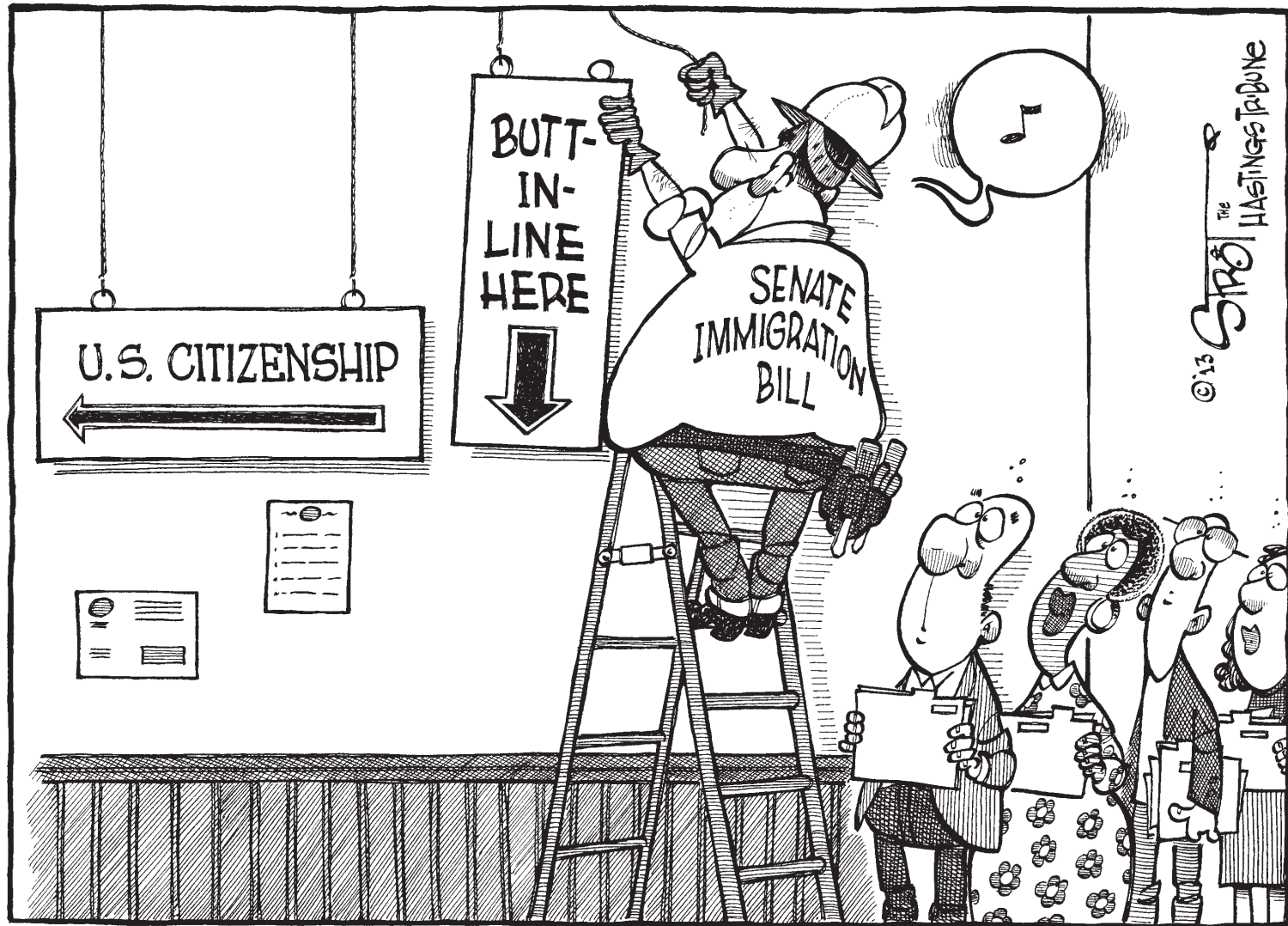
Under Obamacare, once a small business reaches 50 employees, it must either comply with the Obamacare mandates or face a stiff IRS penalty. As a result, many small businesses have been forced to reduce the hours of part-time and full-time workers in order to avoid the excesses of Obamacare. Or they have not hired new employees. What do these small business owners ask for from Washington? Get out of their way. Give them certainty, simplicity and a reduced tax and regulatory burden. Small businesses want to know how to plan for the future. And instead of spending time complying with complex tax codes and regulations, they'd like to get back to their job.

The week of June 17th has been designated as National Small Business Week. What a great time to honor them by giving them what they deserve - not what a legion of Washington politicians and bureaucrats think they need.

In Kansas City, our living room had two sets of french doors leading out to a screened-in porch on the west side and a bright, cheery sunroom on the east. We loved it.

I realized that we weren't unique while taking to Bob and Kay the other day.

Kay said that some friends go walking down their street each night. One of them told Kay that they have a running bet as to whether Kay and Bob will be watching a sporting event or a news show on television.

Bob and Kay have a wall of glass in their living room and another in their dining room. The dining room one looks out on their

gorgeous back yard but the living room one gives a great view of their big television.

They don't care, I guess. They like the light. My youngest daughter and her husband are cave dwellers.

We always knew that our son-in-law Brad was a cave dweller. When he worked in an office, he would take out half the light bulbs overhead in his cubicle and sit all day in half darkness working on his computer. Love that boy, but I swear he's half bat.

When the couple moved into their new home, her sister noted that they never opened the curtains, even the ones where the windows looked over the back yard.

It's true. They live in a perpetual half darkness. A cozy cave. And they like it that way.

The other daughter and son-in-law chose a home with windows and a screened-in porch, where he works from home. If the weather isn't too cold or too hot - that's more common in Georgia - he takes his computer out to the screened-in porch while our work-at-home daughter takes the office with lots of open windows.

I don't know that either lifestyle is the better choice. It just depends on your point of view: Love the light or close the curtains.

What China's space program tells us

On June 11, 2013, China launched Shenzhou 10, its tenth mission since it began its manned space program ten years ago on Oct. 15, 2003. And if you are thinking - similar to our foot-in-the-mouth Vice President Biden, that China just copies Western technology - well, think again.

China's rockets are of a unique design. Unlike the straight-arrow U.S. rockets or the Russian design that looks like the buttress of a tree, China's rockets go up with a series of four firecracker-like engines around the base. It is the unique design of Tsien Hsueh-hsen, "China's Werner von Braun."

How he came to head China's space program is a sad American tragedy that you can read in American journalist Iris Chang's biography: "Thread of the Silkworm."

Tsien was a brilliant young student from Republican-era [pre-Communist] China who won a scholarship to attend the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. When his classmates thought their physics test was too hard and stormed up to the professor's office to complain, the professor had posted Tsien's perfect paper on his office door.

Tsien completed his doctorate at CalTech and was the World War II U.S. military officer sent to Germany to help U.S. scientists decide whether to bring back vonBraun and his team. Tsien held the Goddard Chair at our new Jet Propulsion Laboratory. In the midst of all of this success, he married the daughter of a Nationalist China Kuomintang official and had two children.

Then his life was turned upside down by the stupidity and fear-mongering that can only come from Washington. It was 1950 and the beginning of the McCarthy era witch-hunts that destroyed many scientists' careers. They mistook math table books for code books. Tsien was placed under house arrest

in California for five years as a suspected Communist - something he was not.

In 1955, he and his family were deported to a now-Communist China. Premier Chou En-lai was eager to get him. Abandoned and scorned by the America he loved, Tsien had no other opportunity to use his talent. He became the father of China's rocket systems: the East Wind, the notoriously effective Silkworm, and their early ICBM's that were scaled up to become the 2003 boosters.

China did not have to borrow from anyone. China had a parallel program because we gave them their best rocket scientist. Tsien died in October of 2009. He got to see the next generation of his rockets launch China into manned orbit.

The Chinese public here is giddy and proud. They watch with as much excitement as Americans watched Walter Cronkite describe our Kennedy-era launches. China is committed to a space station, a manned moon landing and base, and even extending that mission to Mars. The role of a national space program in motivating a public cannot be overestimated.

Unfortunately, the U.S. has decided to privatize some of our space efforts, and no one cheers on "Go, Space-X" or any other corporation. But we will still be paying the bill.

Our astronauts are hitching rides on Russian rockets. And the Russians are looking to downsize to unmanned missions.

Meanwhile, Japan and South Korea and India are gearing up their space programs, although China's is far in the lead and ten times larger than South Korea's efforts. China has moved its launch pads to Hainan Island in the south in order to get more "throw" for each launch (a handicap the more northern Russians have always faced). A woman Chinese astronaut on this 15-day flight will broadcast physics lessons to Chinese students from in orbit.

The American student who today wants to pursue a career in space might well consider adding an Asian language minor to their degree.

Tsien Hsueh-hsen left one legacy that we have yet to exploit. With Tsien's experience at MIT and CalTech, and then his experience getting research done as head of China's space program, he became very critical of the Chinese educational system and spoke up in the last days of his life. Former Premier Wen Jiabao reported this general criticism from their discussion - but never revealed the details.

I suspect that his criticism involves China's need to get off of teaching-to-the-test memorization and adopt more questioning; a process they are beginning. If that is the case, for America (a country that is abandoning questioning for teaching-to-the-test), his wisdom could still save our educational system as well.

Weekend brings damaging thunderstorms to Sherman County

ect as early or late evening severe thunderstorms Sherman County on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

During Friday's storm, a nearby lightning strike took out the main phone line at the Goodland Star-News and scrambled at least one garage door opener.

Saturday's storms brought wind gusts

up to 69 miles per hour. Dime-sized hail was reported in Kit Carson, Cheyenne and Sherman counties.

Two accidents were handled by the Kansas Highway Patrol during the storms. At 8 p.m., a 2013 Mazda driven by Valerie Tapsoba, 39, of Baltimore, was driving westbound on I-70 near Brewster when a deer jumped from the median and hit the car, going through the windshield and hitting the

driver. Tapsoba was taken to Citizens Medical Center in Colby with possible injuries. A passenger, Curtis Yancy, 49, of Baltimore, was listed as uninjured.

Two hours later another accident occurred near mile post 29. According to the Kansas Highway Patrol report, a car driven by Michael Circle, 55, of West Milton, Ohio, slowed down in the heavy dust kicked up by the storm. It was hit in the rear

by a Uhaul truck driven by Katherine Kilbourne, 52, of Aurora, Colo. She and Blade Kilbourne, a passenger in the Uhaul, were listed as uninjured. Circle was transported to Goodland Regional Medical Center with possible injuries.

A car driven by Dwight Hall, 51, of Longview, Texas, slowed to check on the accident and was struck by a motorhome driven by Michael Peterson, 47, of Gower,

Mo. The drivers, as well as Jesse Hall, 17, and Angela Hall, 52, both passengers in the car, and Dyson Reno, 19, a passenger in the motorhome, were listed as uninjured.

Sunday evening, hail was reported in Rawlins and Greeley counties. Winds were estimated at up to 68 mph. In Sherman County, gusts from the approaching storm blew shingles off a gazebo, brought down power lines and blew the roof off a shed.

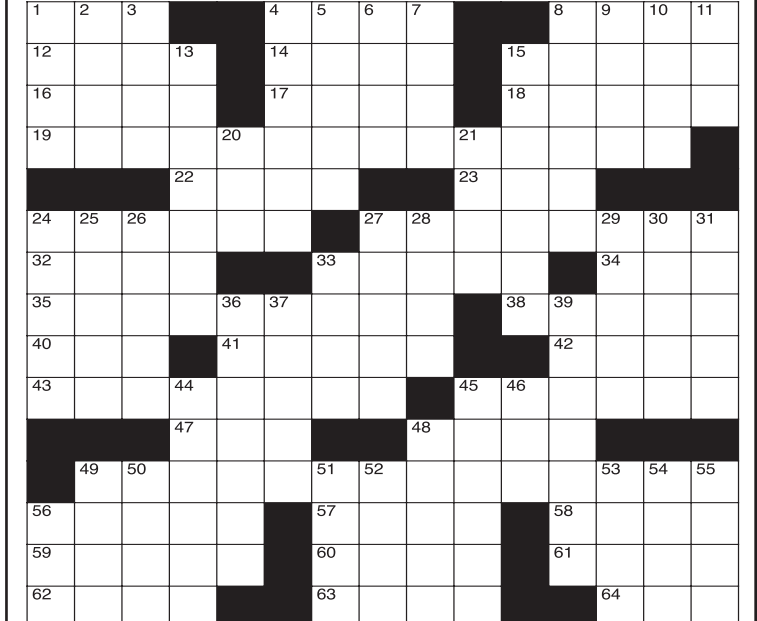
