## Fort Hays president pays Goodland a visit

Fort Hays State University President Ed Hammond is focusing on the Kansas Board of Regents' new master plan, called "Foresight 2020," as he visits counties around the state on his annual media tour.

The plan includes three objectives: increasing higher education retention, producing graduates for in-demand jobs, and maintaining quality education programs.

Hammond said 49 percent of

the Kansas workforce has some kind of post-secondary education, from technical schools all the way to PhDs.

"If you lose ground on that percentage, the amount of money in the workforce goes down," he said.

The regents' goal is to get that to 60 percent by 2020. Hammond said Fort Hays State is leading that charge.

"High school graduation rates are pretty flat," he said. "But Fort Hays is up 21.5 percent in enrollment over

the past five years."

Other schools in the regents system are up one to two percent, he said, while Kansas State University, the University of Kansas and Emporia State University have seen enrollment declines.

"What that says is that the students who used to go to those are coming to Fort Hays," he said.

This is mainly due to maintaining a quality education along with low

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## Authorities locate robbery suspect

A manhunt for a suspect in an armed robbery case in Colby came to an end at 10 a.m. Monday morning when the man was found about five miles south of the city. Thomas County authorities had been looking for the man in connection with an armed robbery Sunday night at the Quality Inn in Colby.

After the robbery at 10:10 p.m., officers conducted a traffic stop on I-70 at milepost 56, just east of Colby, when a white male bailed out of the vehicle and ran into a nearby milo field. Law enforce-

ment officers searched the field but were unable to find him. As of press time Monday morning, the search had been called off, but authorities were requesting that if anyone saw the suspect, they should not approach him and call law enforcement.

The man has been identified as Shawn Gill. He is approximately 18-19 years old, five-feet, eight-inches tall, 130 pounds. He has short, brown hair with a pencil thin beard along his jaw and Chinese lettering tattooed on the underside of his forearm.

## Watch for deer on the roads

Deer can be spotted near Kansas roadways any time of the year. However, deer breeding season peaks in mid-November, and this marks the period when deer-vehicle collisions are highest. That's why the Kansas Department of Transportation, the Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism, and the Kansas Highway Patrol are working together to raise awareness and help drivers avoid collisions with deer.

Not only are deer more active during the fall, shorter days mean dusk and dawn occur when commuter traffic is highest. According to Transportation Department spokesperson Steve Swartz, 15 percent, or 8,695, of all traffic crashes in 2012 involved deer. Two people were killed and 322 were injured in these crashes.

Motorists should be especially watchful at dawn and dusk when deer are particularly active, watch for more than one deer, as they seldom travel alone, and should reduce speed and be alert near wooded areas or green spaces.

## Commissioners question value of Revitalization Act

The Sherman County Commissioners questioned Economic Development Director Michael Solomon about the Neighborhood Revitalization act at their meeting last Tuesday.

The act, which is administered by the county, provides a tax rebate for new residential or commercial buildings or improvement projects on existing ones as long as the project is more than \$5,000.

The commissioners said they had seen numbers that said the Neighborhood Revitalization Act has resulted in \$295,000 less in taxes coming in. Solomon argued that many projects would not have been done in the first place if not for the program, and now there is increased payments in taxes over time since the new or improved buildings

increase the value of the land, and increased utility revenue.

Solomon said the original intent of the Neighborhood Revitalization act was to target specific areas. However, he said, most counties joined as a whole.

"This could be reworked," he said, suggesting that the city and county commissions could sit down and determine some target areas and set up revitalization zones, rather than have the whole county be involved.

Solomon also provided an Economic Development budget for the commissioners. His expenses, he said, go to wages for himself and a half-time assistant he shares with the city manager along with marketing, printing, professional services and project development.

Economic Development is paid for by a \$50,000 contribution from

the county and a larger contribution from the city, including \$75,000 transferred from the city electric fund. The commissioners questioned this amount, saying that the money might be better used to keep electric rates down for current businesses.

"We hear complaints from some businesses that rates are too high," said Commissioner Larry Enfield. "People come in and get a rebate, but those businesses are the ones paying for it."

Commissioner Ken Klemm said he still does not see good value for the taxpayer and that he doesn't think the incentives are helping increase the local economy.

"It is moving wealth, rather than creating it," he said.

In other business, the commissioners:

• Heard from County Clerk Janet

Rumpel, who said that since July 1, the county valuation has increased from \$72,733,661 to \$73,706,620. This is mainly due to state-certified utility improvements in the southern part of the county. Rumpel said this will allow the county reduce its tax levy slightly, as each mill will be bringing in about \$960 more.

• Discussed prescription drug discount cards from the National Association of Counties. Rumpel said these cards are available to those who don't have insurance to cover pharmacy visits. Currently, she said, county residents have been seeing about a \$6,000 benefit, but few people know about the cards.

The cards are available at the county clerks office and will soon be available at the Sherman County Health Department.

• Talked with representatives from Good Samaritan Sherman

County, who are planning to replace heating and air units in two halls in the spring. The current boiler-chiller system dates back to the 1960s. Two of the halls have been updated, and this new project would affect about 16 resident rooms. The commissioners requested a plan be drawn up so they can see exactly what the project will include.

• Heard from City Public Works Director Rich Simon, who said the City Cleanup Week went well. He said they were happy with the new tire policy, although some people had not heard about it and piled their tires up anyway.

Simon also suggested that drainage issues at the fairgrounds be discussed at the next city-county meeting.

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# Kansas has more West Nile Cases, two in Sherman

Twelve additional cases of West Nile virus were reported to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment in the past week, bringing the total number of 2013 cases to 32. Of the 32 total cases reported in Kansas, two patients have died due to West Nile Virus.

"Cases are on the rise in Kansas. We want to bring this to everyone's attention as we expect an increase in this disease before winter is here, and we strongly encourage the use of methods that prevent mosquito bites," said Robert Moser, M.D.,

department secretary and state health officer.

As of Oct. 7, the case count by county in Kansas is: Sherman two, Sedgwick seven, Barton six, Johnson three, Wyandotte two, Atchison one, Butler one, Chautauqua one, Decatur one, Ellis one, Logan one, Marshall one, Republic one, Rice one, Rush one and Saline one. No other details about the patients or the two deaths will be provided at this time.

West Nile Virus can be spread to people through bites from infected

mosquitoes, but it is not contagious from person to person. Although most persons will not develop any illness at all, symptoms can range from a slight headache and low-grade fever to swelling of the brain or brain tissue and in rare cases, death. People who have had West Nile virus before are considered immune.

The department recommends the following precautions to protect against West Nile Virus:

When you are outdoors, use insect repellent containing an EPA-

registered active ingredient on skin and clothing, including DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, or IR3535. Follow the directions on the package.

Many mosquitoes are most active at dusk and dawn. Be sure to use insect repellent and wear long sleeves and pants at these times or consider staying indoors during these hours.

Make sure you have good screens on your windows and doors to keep mosquitoes out.

Get rid of mosquito breeding sites by emptying standing water

from flower pots, buckets and barrels. Change the water in pet dishes and replace the water in bird baths weekly. Drill holes in tire swings so water drains out. Keep children's wading pools empty and on their sides when they aren't being used.

Cases are most common in the late summer and early fall months. In 2012, 57 cases of West Nile virus were reported in Kansas.

Birds are not tested for West Nile Virus in Kansas and the department will not be collecting information about dead birds. If you find a dead

bird, they recommends that you wear gloves, place the bird in a plastic bag, and dispose of it in the garbage.

## Can companies act with impunity?

Can the world's biggest corporations act with impunity? When it comes to General Electric—the eighth largest U.S. corporation, with \$146.9 billion in sales and \$13.6 billion in profits in 2012—the answer appears to be “yes.”

Let us begin with a small-scale case in upstate New York, where in late September 2013 GE announced that it would close its electrical capacitor plant in the town of Fort Edward. Some 200 workers will lose their jobs and, thereafter, will have little opportunity to obtain comparable wages, pensions, or even employment in this economically distressed region. Ironically, the plant has been highly profitable. Earlier in the year, the local management threw a party to celebrate a record-breaking quarter. But the high-level financial dealings of a vast multinational operation like GE are mysterious, and the company merely announced that the Fort Edward plant was “non-competitive.” The United Electrical Workers, the union that has represented the workers there for the past 70 years, has already begun a vigorous campaign of resistance to the plant closing, but it is sure to be an uphill battle.

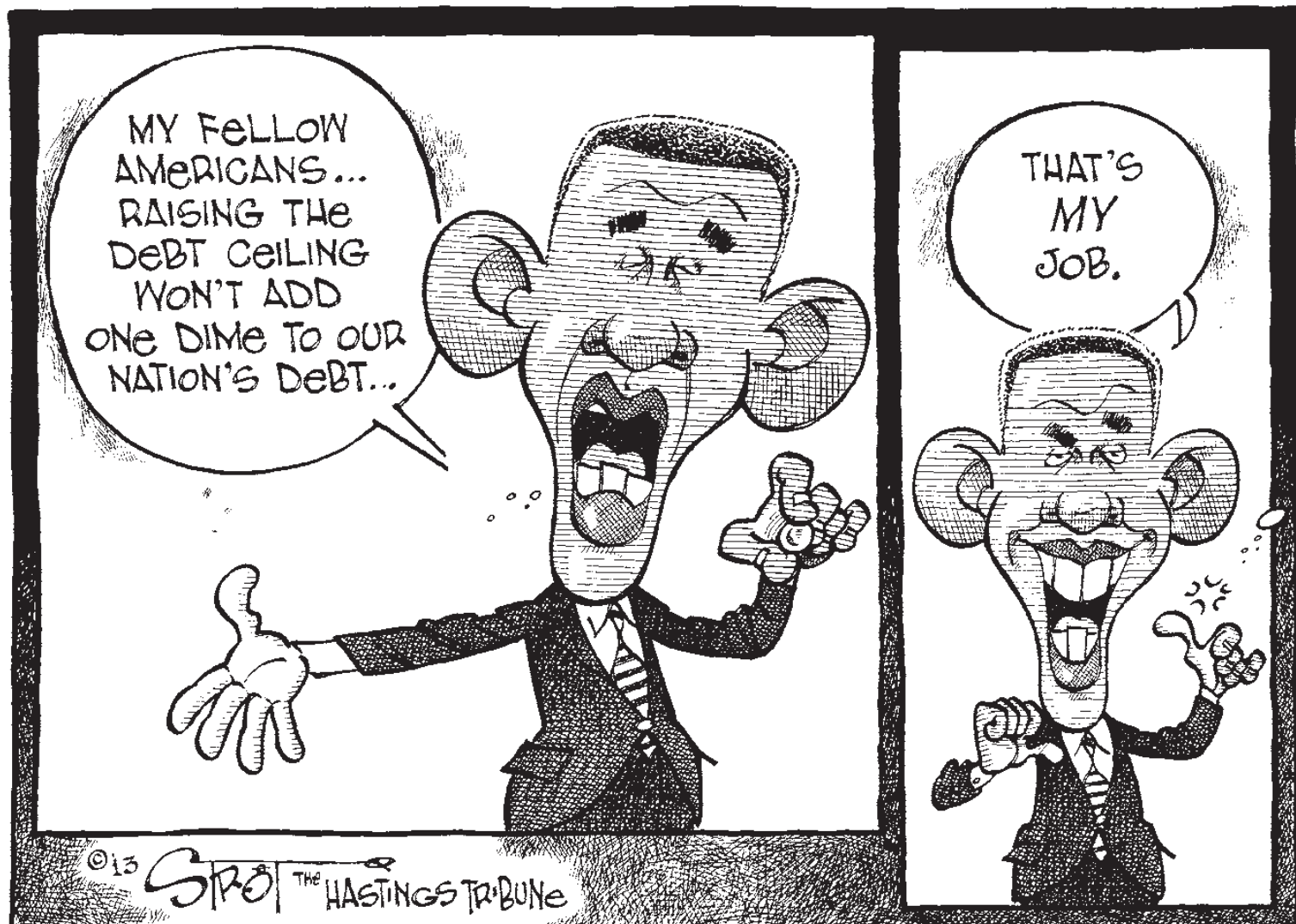
If we dig deeper into the record, a broader pattern of corporate misbehavior emerges. Indeed, the Fort Edward factory is one of two GE plants that polluted the communities at Fort Edward and nearby Hudson Falls, as well as a 197-mile stretch of the Hudson River, with 1.3 million pounds of cancer-causing PCBs for several decades. When the extent of this environmental disaster began to be revealed in the 1970s, GE began a lengthy campaign to deny it and, later, a multimillion dollar public relations campaign to prevent remedial action by the Environmental Protection Administration. GE lost this battle, for the EPA insisted upon the dredging of the Hudson River and ordered GE to pay for it. Thus, the Hudson Valley became the largest Superfund cleanup site in the United States, with a project that will take decades to complete.

GE has produced other environmental disasters, as well. Three GE nuclear reactors at the Fukushima Daiichi nuclear power site in Japan melted down and exploded on March 31, 2011. This was the world's worst nuclear accident in three decades, and quickly spread radioactive contamination nearly 150 miles. Indeed, the stricken reactors are still sending 300 tons a day of radioactive water flooding into the Pacific Ocean.

Despite this appalling record, the U.S. government has been very generous to GE. During the financial crisis of 2008-2009, the federal government's Temporary Liquidity Guarantee Program loaned approximately \$85 billion to GE Capital, the company's huge finance arm. GE needed the bailout because, among other reasons, GE Capital was marketing subprime mortgages. The Federal Reserve also bought \$16.1 billion worth of short-term corporate i.o.u.'s from GE in late 2008, when the public market for this kind of debt had nearly frozen. In yet a further indication of GE's influence, President Obama appointed Jeffrey Immelt, GE's chief executive officer, as chair of his Council on Jobs and Competitiveness, which strategizes about how to revive America's manufacturing base. One of Immelt's favorite panaceas is to end taxes on the overseas profits of corporations.

Thus, it might seem that those 200 embattled workers at Fort Edward have no possibility at all of effectively challenging a corporation this wealthy and influential. But stranger things have happened in the United States—especially when Americans have had their fill of corporate arrogance.

## Formula 1 season anything but boring

I've read a lot of news stories lately saying that the 2013 Formula 1 season is boring. Even though this year is my first foray into the sport, I think it's anything but boring.

I understand the arguments. Sebastian Vettel and his Red Bull car seem unstoppable. Going into Sunday's race in Japan, he had won five out of the last six races and during those he led most of the time, often pulling out tremendous leads over the competition.

He's also far ahead in the points. Before Sunday, he had amassed 272 points, far ahead of the 195 points held by second-place Fernando Alonso.

We were going into a situation where the driver's championship could be decided with four races left to run. There was almost no chance of a gripping last-second contest, such as the 1976 shootout between Niki Lauda and James Hunt, depicted in the new Ron Howard movie “Rush.”

Vettel won again on Sunday, but Alonso scored high enough to stay in the running, barely. There could be an upset, but something pretty extraordinary would have to happen.

So why do I think this is exciting? Because of everything that is going on behind first place.

Take the race at Yeongam, Korea, a few weekends ago. This was another example where Vettel got out to a big lead at the start and stayed their for most of the race. However, there was a lot of riveting racing going on behind him.

Sauber is not a team that you see at the front of the pack a lot. They don't have the fastest cars and certainly don't have the money of the giants like Red Bull and Ferrari. They are the Buffalo Bills of the F1 world. Esteban Gutierrez hasn't gotten above 11th all year and Nico Hulkenberg had been in that vicinity as well. But at Yeongam, Hulkenberg got up to fourth place and amazingly held off former world

champion Lewis Hamilton in his much faster Mercedes until the end. It was one of the most epic battles I've seen all year.

My analysis, which admittedly is based on no experience at all with the sport, is that with the Driver's Championship all but sown up for Vettel, the main motivation for most of the other drivers is securing a seat for next year.

In Hulkenberg's case this is particularly crucial because he's a bigger guy than most of the other drivers and there are new weight limits in 2014. Nico could find himself being rejected as “too heavy.” But with his performance in Korea generating him a lot of press, he's now being mentioned as a possible driver for Lotus next year.

A lot of the other drivers are going to be trying to distinguish themselves to either shore up their position at their current team or to try and secure a position at one of several teams, such as Lotus, that are already known to have an open spot. I think that's going to create some exciting battles, just not for first place.

I missed the Japan race because I went back to Colorado this weekend. I had, thanks to the owner of the paper, a pair of tickets to the Colorado State University homecoming game on Saturday.

Even though I cover a lot of sports for the paper, I'm still not much of a sports fan apart from Formula 1. I do enjoy going to games, however, and what better game to go to than homecoming, since I'm a CSU alumnus. I took

a good friend of mine who, although she did not attend CSU, is really the only football fan among my friends.

We had a great time, even though CSU lost to San Jose State 34-27. Even with my knowledge of football—which is mostly based on watching the Cowboys the past couple seasons—I could see what was going on: the defense couldn't tackle to save their lives. The offense seemed to do quite well and could have won if the defense had been able to bring down the Spartan ball carriers without giving up so many first downs.

It was still an enjoyable day at the stadium. I have no officially been to more CSU football games as an alumnus than I did when I was a student there. I'll definitely miss Hughes Stadium, as the effort to build a new on-campus stadium doesn't seem to be slowing down. I have a lot of good memories of that stadium, and not just for football games. When I was in high school in the early 2000s, I performed with the Loveland High School marching band on that field several times. It's a great stadium to play in, in some ways even better than Mile High in Denver.

I'm sure the new one will be nice and all, but it'll be a nightmare to get in and out of. That part of Fort Collins is already a slow-moving traffic jam. But, since I don't have millions of dollars to donate to the school they're unlikely to listen to me.

As the saying goes, “the only permanence is change.” There have been a myriad of changes in the six years since I graduated from Colorado State, and there will be many, many more in the years to come. Hopefully I'll still get the opportunity to go to a few games, I'm sure I'll enjoy the experience no matter where the stadium is.

## A lot of changes over the years

While we were on our way to Arkansas a couple of weeks ago, my sister and I started talking about what you used to be able to do that you can't do now.

She told a story, related by her mother-in-law, of her husband, who at the age of 16 was driving a school bus to pick up the youngsters in his area of rural Kansas. Down in Arkansas, our cousin George, who is 70, said that he remembers being on a school bus driven by a high school-age boy when he was a student.

Can you imagine a 16-year-old taking a school bus around today? It would be a state-wide, if not nationwide, scandal.

Still neither my brother-in-law nor cousin George could recall any accidents, and these boys drove in all kinds of weather, because in those days, they didn't cancel school every time there was half an inch of snow. If the roads were slick, you drove slowly and there weren't dozens of other vehicles on the roads.

Don't ask me how that led us to hot dogs.

I asked George if his mother had boiled the hot dogs when he was a boy.

Oh, yes, he said. That's the only way his mother, our Aunt Adele, or our mother, or anyone else ever cooked them. You tossed the hot dogs into a pot of water and cooked them until they split.

We would sometimes roast them over an open fire when we were camping, but barbecues were rare and we were probably in our teens before we had a roasted hot dog.

Of course there, was a little device Mom bought that basically electrocuted the wiener. You put the hot dog between two probes, closed the lid and plugged it in. In just a few minutes, the dog was cooked to a turn—no boiling water needed. Mom loved it.

My sister remembers it as similar to those

gadgets you find in stores marked “As seen on TV.” I think that's about right. It was a one-trick gadget that was fun for awhile and then got put on a shelf—sort of an early chocolate fountain.

I was surprised when George said that another thing you don't see anymore is people paying with cash. He said he remembers the Army paying troops off in cash each month.

Now, George graduated from West Point in 1966 and rose steadily through the ranks until he retired as a three-star general about 10 years ago, so I was not surprised that he had been the head of a company (I'm not sure how many

soldiers in the late 1960s and early '70s. However, I was amazed that the Army still paid in cash that late in the game.

Today, I'm sure that the Army doesn't even hand out checks, much less cash, but George said he remembers going down to the payroll center once a month and being handed a box of cash. He remembers it as being about \$10,000, a small fortune in those days. He had to sign for it and could count it or not as he pleased.

“I always counted it,” he said, “and as I counted, I put it in envelopes marked with each soldier's name. That way when I was done, I knew the amount was correct and that each man would get the correct pay.”

Wow! Shades of westerns, when they stopped the train and stole the Army payroll.

Yep, times have changed, some for the better, other maybe not so much, but at least the hot dogs are better from the microwave.

tuition costs, he said. While Fort Hays often appears on top education quality lists, Hammond said the real test is how students do on national exams and licensure tests. Fort Hays has two students who scored in the top 10 in the Certified Public Accountant exam, and of the 266 elementary education graduates of 2013, 260 passed their licensure exam.

"That tells me we're doing things right," he said.

Hammond said a Kansas Department of Commerce study identified five areas where there is a lot of demand for new college-educated workers: education, manufacturing, professional science, hospitality and healthcare.

"We've got programs in all those,

and we're spending 40 percent of our instructional budget in those areas," he said.

Hammond pointed out that although agriculture is not on the list, Fort Hays still maintains a strong agriculture program that focuses on family farm operation.

Hammond said one idea he's been kicking around is to recruit the best and brightest students from rural counties and put them in a business entrepreneurship program. When they come out of the program, he said, teams of two students each would have a business plan and a loan for startup money as long as they opened that business in a rural county.

"Our research shows lots of graduates would come back in the jobs were available," he said.

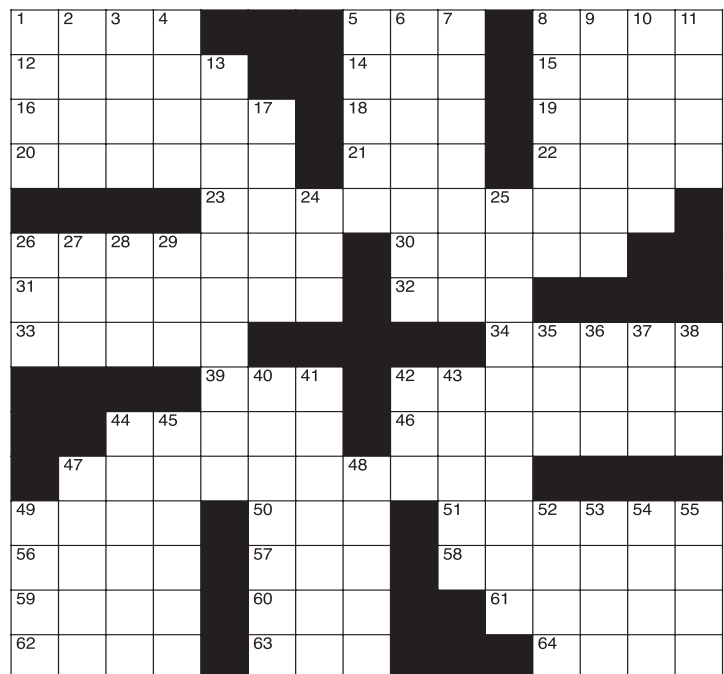
