

Sisters reunite 58 years after being separated by the state

It was a reunion filled with smiles, tears, catching up and reconnecting. Phyllis Long and her sister Kathy Brooks of Hutchinson met at the Golden Corral last week in Hays. The sisters had not seen each other for 58 years.

The sisters met in Hays because it was about half way between Goodland and Hutchinson. Brooks has not been in good health having had a stroke and is on dialysis.

The restaurant in Hays set aside the banquet room for them to have some privacy.

The pair had been phoning and texting each other since Nov. 8 but had not seen each other. When Brooks asked Long how she would know her, Long said she would be the naked lady dancing in the parking lot.

With humor and tears the two spent five hours trying to fill each other in. They traded stories about their own families, swapped old photos and took plenty of new ones.

Long said her sister talked about how she colored her hair when they were young by placing melted crayons in her hair. She thought it was very pretty.

The sisters said that while living in Wichita in the 1950s, the three youngest of six siblings were removed from their family home by then Social and Rehabilitation Services because their parents were alcoholics.

Brooks, Long and her sister Judy Taylor were placed in an orphanage. About a year

later Long, almost 7, and Taylor, 4 1/2, were adopted by a couple from Colorado.

Brooks lived in several foster homes before she was adopted. She had reconnected with the rest of her biological family but not her two youngest sisters.

Long tried to find her older sister but would get discouraged when she ran into road blocks. After Long suffered a stroke several years ago began searching in earnest during her recovery.

Last fall Long's neighbor, Carol Baum, said she had located a Kathy Brooks in Hutchinson. Baum is really into genealogy and works with the historical society.

Long said she wrote Brooks a letter mentioning dates and names only the two of them would know. When Brooks received the letter she was so emotional that she had her husband Larry make the phone call to Goodland.

The pair chose to concentrate on ways to keep their communication open and not dwell on the time they were separated.

They had hoped their other sister would be able to come to but was unable to because of her health. Taylor lives in Colorado. The three sisters are the remaining members of their immediate family.

Long said they are planning to get together in the summer. Long hoped Brooks could come to Goodland. Since Goodland Regional Medical Center has a dialysis center Brooks could get the care she needed and Taylor could come from Colorado.

Senator holds town hall by phone

U.S. Sen. Pat Roberts held a town hall meeting by telephone last week, with Kansas voters listening in and asking questions.

Roberts, the senior senator from Kansas, is up for election this year and facing strong opposition in the Republican primary. After running down some of the issues currently in front of the Senate, he took questions from people on the call:

Roberts was asked about his no-vote on the Farm Bill. He said the Senate had been working on the bill for 400 days, which was far too long, but he couldn't support the final joint House and Senate version.

"There was no regulatory relief," he said. "It prioritized food stamps."

February is heart month

February is American Heart Month, drawing attention to heart disease, America's number one killer, and the strides being taken through research and education to raise awareness of risk factors and to decrease death rates. The American Heart Association and its Go Red For Women movement urge everyone to support the fight against heart disease in women by wearing red on Friday, February 7th – National Wear Red Day.

Here are a few facts about heart disease.

1) Heart disease is the number one killer of women age 20 and over, but it is largely preventable. In fact, up to 80 percent of cardiac events in women may be prevented if women make the right choices for their hearts, including diet, exercise and not smoking.

2) While one in 30 American women die of breast cancer, one in three women die from cardiovascular disease.

3) Cardiovascular disease and stroke kill approximately 500,000 women each year, which is about one each minute.

4) Overweight children are more likely to have abnormally thick heart muscle tissue when they become an adult, which increases the risk of heart attack and heart failure. Learn how to get your kids on the right track at www.heart.org.

5) Go to www.GoRedForWomen.org and join the online discussion about heart health.

6) If you or someone you know shows signs of heart attack or stroke, call 9-1-1 right away. An Emergency Medical Services team can begin treatment when it arrives. That means treatment can begin sooner than it would if the patient arrived at the hospital by car. What's more, the team is also trained to revive someone whose heart has stopped, which can save hundreds of lives each year.

7) Today is the 11th annual National Wear Red Day! Join thousands of women, as well as companies and organizations in Kansas and cities across America by wearing red today. It's a simple, powerful way to raise awareness of heart disease and stroke.

8) Choose to speak up, not remain silent. Support legislation that would improve the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of heart disease and stroke in women at www.yourethecure.org.

9) Too many lives have and will be cut short from heart disease and its risk factors; however, early detection, lifestyle changes, and other intervention can improve certain conditions.

10) Plan meals in advance – go to www.heart.org for recipes from a number of heart-healthy cookbooks and use the online grocery list builder to quickly identify heart-healthy products to add to your grocery list.

11) Schedule a doctor's appointment each year and get a complete blood screen. Visit www.GoRedForWomen.org and download "What to Know Before Your Doctor Visit."

12) This year about 900,000 Americans will have a first or repeat coronary attack. About 400,000 of them will die. Coronary heart disease is our nation's leading cause of death.

13) Nearly 8 million Americans age 20 and older have survived a heart attack (myocardial infarction). About 8.9 million have angina pectoris (chest pain or discomfort due to reduced blood supply to the heart).

14) An estimated 24.1 million men and 19.6 million women increase their risk of heart attack and stroke by smoking cigarettes.

15) African-American women are disproportionately affected by

heart disease and its risk factors. Like other ethnic groups, they also confront barriers to diagnosis, disparities in care and poorer health outcomes than their Caucasian counterparts. Learn more on www.GoRedForWomen.org.

16) One of the best ways to reduce your risk of cardiovascular disease is to start getting regular, moderate exercise, at least 30 minutes a day, most days of the week.

17) Some heart attacks are sudden and intense, causing someone to gasp dramatically, clutch her heart and drop to the ground. No one has any doubts about what's happening. But most heart attacks start slowly, with mild pain or discomfort. Often the people affected aren't sure what's wrong and wait too long before getting help.

18) The American Heart Association dedicates more monies to research than any other voluntary health organization. Only the federal government funds more cardiovascular research.

19) Start thinking about your heart. By adding one hour of regular, vigorous physical activity, adults may gain up to two hours of life expectancy. Start by including more physical activity into your daily routine. Take a walk, ride a bike or take the stairs.

20) About 31.9 million American adults have cholesterol levels of 240 or higher — the point at which it becomes a major risk factor for coronary heart disease and stroke. Your total cholesterol should be below 200, and your HDL (good) cholesterol should be 40 or higher.

21) Americans think they are in better heart health than they really are. According to an American Heart Association survey, nearly 40 percent thought they were in ideal heart health, when in reality less than 1 percent of Americans have an ideal profile.

22) To find out how healthy you are, the American Heart Association developed a health assessment tool, called My Life Check, at www.heart.org/mylifecheck. It will give you an overall health score and create an action plan to move you closer to your individual health goals. No matter what you score, any healthy change can help you live a longer, better life.

23) During a heart checkup, your doctor takes a careful look at your "numbers," including your cholesterol and triglyceride levels, your blood pressure and more. Knowing your numbers is an important part of keeping your heart-healthy.

24) Smoking is the single most preventable cause of premature death in the United States. If you smoke cigarettes (or cigars), you have a higher risk of illness and death from heart attack, stroke and other diseases. So if you don't smoke, don't start. If you do smoke, love your heart and quit today. Need more motivation? Visit heart.org for help quitting smoking.

25) Uncovering family history can help you to better understand your risk for heart disease. If you have a blood relative with heart disease or a risk factor for genetic heart disease, your risk for developing it significantly increases.

26) More women die of cardiovascular disease than the next four causes of death combined, including all forms of cancer.

27) Ninety percent of women have one or more risk factors for developing heart disease. Learn about your risk factors and how to reduce them at www.GoRedForWomen.org.

28) On average, Hispanic women are likely to develop heart disease 10 years earlier than non-Hispanic white women.

Museum features rug weavers

The story of Finnish-American weavers in Northern Michigan is told through their vibrant creations in the exhibition "Rags, Rugs and Weavers: A Living Tradition." The opening will be on Friday, March 14, at the Dane G. Hansen Memorial Museum in Logan.

The process of weaving rags into useful household items came to Michigan with immigrants from Northern Europe. Today, Finnish-

Americans in the state's Upper Peninsula continue the tradition, weaving used clothing and other discarded textiles into colorful rugs. Rag rug weaving is a shared cultural activity in these communities. Materials donated by one person may be cut into rags or sewn into strips by another, woven into a rug by still another, and the finished rug purchased by yet another member of the community. Weavers often

learn the craft from family members or neighbors, perfecting their techniques by trial and error.

"Rags, Rugs and Weavers: A Living Tradition" explores this textile tradition through the work of eight accomplished rag rug weavers. Rugs, descriptive panels, sample materials, tools and photographs illustrate all aspects of rag rug weaving. Viewers follow the process from Rag to rug and back to rag and

learn how these weavers and others are keeping the tradition alive.

Personal identity is the modern issue

The curious case of a Canadian rogue who made a new life for himself in this country before his girlfriend turned him in to the government demonstrates how much had changed in our nation and how many layers of “identity” law our government has spun.

The threat may see esoteric, like most of the so-called Patriot Act, but it illustrates another way our government chips slowly away at our liberties.

The man, Wayne Bradley Camick, left behind a checkered past when he secured a copy of his younger brother Leslie’s birth certificate and fled to the U.S. in 2006: past-due child support, back taxes, a 20-year suspension of his driver’s license for drunk driving and “other legal issues.” At the border, he assumed the identity of Leslie, who died at 3 1/2 months, the government alleges.

Since then, he apparently had kept his nose clean until recently, working as a telecommunications engineer, being granted at least three patents, running a business with the girlfriend.

In a civil suit, he charged that the woman and others hoped to acquire his assets, including the company they founded together, and patents he claims to have developed alone.

He describes himself as “an industry innovator in fiber optics,” working with Google, AT&T and Comcast. Another claim is that a patent for a locking manhole cover developed with AT&T could be worth \$5 billion.

You’d think the government would be happy just to depart the guy for lying on his immigration paperwork and leave him to the tender mercies of the Canadian authorities, but the U.S. attorney has filed a laundry list of “identity theft” felony charges ranging from mail fraud to making false statements to a bank, immigration officials and the patent office.

He’s accused not only of violating the Orwellian Patriot Act, but of “undermining its very purpose,” to ensure the true identities of foreign nationals to prevent terrorist acts.

We’re certainly not going to stick up for Mr. Camick, but he’s no terrorist. His case illustrates how far down the road to “true identity” thinking we’ve traveled.

And that runs counter to the Anglo-American legal tradition which holds that a man is who he says he is, and may go by whatever name he chooses – his “real” name, a stage or business name, a nickname, whatever one chooses – so long as his purpose isn’t to defraud someone, especially the government.

In fact, it’s been said, the only person who couldn’t change his name at will is one who’s gone to court and had a judge change it. A court order is plenty official.

His lawyers claim Mr. Camick “gained no advantage from any person based upon his use of the first name Wayne.”

We suppose you still can adopt a new name, if you don’t want to get a driver’s license or a patent or fly on a commercial airline. Centuries of legal practice, it seems, have been scrapped in the name of security.

It’s such a small thing. Perhaps it’s a fair trade. Or perhaps we’ll all wake up one day and realize that we’ve given away far more than we thought. Our phone calls are logged, our lives are on tape, our phones track our every movement.

Ah, well, it’s all for our own good. – *Steve Haynes*

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
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Comments from locals

I appreciate the positive comments about my attempt to keep northwest Kansas informed about events and policy in Topeka. It is not possible to highlight every event, but I like to share with you what I find interesting.

Being a representative from our area, I am well aware of the importance of agriculture to the Kansas economy. I spend a lot of time trying to convince other representatives and senators that we should always consider how new laws and appropriations will affect this area.

Agriculture is the largest economic driver in Kansas, valued at more than \$35 billion and accounting for 25 percent of the state’s total economy. In Kansas, there are 52.3 million acres of land, and farmland accounts for 88.6 percent of this. Eighty percent of our population lives on 20 percent of our land mass.

There are 28 million acres in Kansas devoted to growing crops, and 16 million is pastureland for grazing animals.

Kansas is a strong part of the animal health corridor. Between Columbia, Mo., and Manhattan sits the single largest concentration of animal-health interests in the world.

The comment about where people live means the 20 percent of us who live on 80 percent of the land have to fight harder for a voice and recognition. I believe family-owned

farms are the backbone of Kansas.

The McCarty Family Dairy has done an awful lot for northwest Kansas. The dairy has put us on the map with Topeka. Kansas is quickly becoming the new dairy frontier in the United States. Kansas is home to 123,000 dairy cows that produced more than 2.7 billion pounds of milk in 2012.

With positive growth being shown, the governor has proposed more dollars for rural housing. The new tax plan has also made more companies consider moving to not only Kansas City but to rural Kansas.

It is now up to each of our communities to look for ways to grow and ways to encourage others to come and experience the “good life” northwest Kansas has to offer.

U.N. Arms Treaty should not bind U.S.

In October 2009, President Barak Obama reversed the positions of both President Bill Clinton and President George W. Bush by committing the United States to U.N. Arms Trade Treaty negotiations.

In the years that followed, the Senate made it clear to the president on numerous occasions that it will not ratify any arms treaty that does not secure our country’s sovereignty and protect our citizens’ individual freedoms. These issues have not been resolved, yet in October, the Obama Administration signed a U.N. arms treaty in a direct dismissal of the American people and the bipartisan Senate majority that rejects this document.

Even though the treaty will never be ratified by the Senate, the fact that the administration signed it in the face of such strong opposition by Congress gives us little faith they will not try to implement the Arms Trade Treaty in the absence of ratification. That is why in January, the Senate and House passed bills which include specific language prohibiting any money for enforcing the U.N. Arms Trade treaty unless it is ratified by the U.S. Senate.

Throughout this process, it has been disturbing to watch the Administration reverse U.S. policies, abandon its own negotiation principles, admit publicly the treaty’s dangerous ambiguity and hastily review the final text.

After signing the treaty, Secretary Kerry stated that “this treaty will not diminish anyone’s freedom” and that it “reaffirms the sovereign right of each country to decide for

itself...how to deal with the conventional arms that are exclusively used within its borders.”

While the treaty does include a preamble referencing lawful firearm ownership, it is not binding and the treaty itself does not recognize the ownership and use of firearms or individual self-defense as fundamental rights.

Secretary Kerry says this treaty is about “keeping weapons out of the hands of terrorists and rogue actors.” However, North Korea, Syria and Iran – nations most would agree are “rogue actors” – voted against the treaty. If 50 nations ratify the document, it will take effect, but those rogue actors will not be a party to it and will not follow its provisions, leaving them free to continue dealing in arms. Meanwhile, the United States could find itself handcuffed when it comes to aiding our most vulnerable allies – including Israel, Taiwan and South Korea – due to international pressure exerted under the guise of the treaty.

Texport of firearms from the United States is already subject to a very strict and complex set of guidelines. The U.S. International Trade in Arms Regulations, which were written in accordance with the Arms Export Control Act,

strictly limits the transfer or sale of firearms and have been doing so since the 1950s. Other nations, primarily our allies, have followed our lead, mirroring our controls because they are so comprehensive. Like gun control laws, even with the Arms Trade Treaty, bad actors will continue to act at will.

If the treaty could work, it would not be necessary. There is no reason to believe it will succeed where past U.N. Security Council arms embargoes have failed. Smothering the world with law will not affect nations that choose not to respect the treaty, or are too ill-governed to enforce it.

In fact, the State Department itself has described the goals of the treaty as “ambiguous,” hardly instilling confidence that American rights will be secure. Good treaties are not ambiguous, and our constitutional rights are too important to be entrusted to a dangerous treaty drafted by nations hostile to the ownership of firearms by private citizens.

That is why Congress stands in firm opposition to the treaty’s ratification. Just in case, with this Administration, that is not enough, the passage of language prohibiting any funding of the enactment of the treaty has made it unequivocally clear that Congress is committed to upholding the fundamental individual rights of Americans and rejects the U.N. treaty.

We will not be bound by the treaty and we will not pay for its implementation.

Senator holds town hall event by phone

Roberts said he offered an amendment that kept the food benefits program, but still cut millions of dollars. Those cuts were eliminated in the final bill.

The joining of farm and nutrition programs is a common criticism of the Farm Bill. Roberts said Congress would have to be careful about separating the two.

On immigration, Roberts said the focus should be on border security to end the influx of illegal immigrants. He said he did not support amnesty for those already here, and

that he did not vote for a recent Senate immigration bill.

Roberts responded to allegations that he no longer had a residence in Kansas. He said he owns a home in Dodge City and pays taxes there.

On the attack on the consulate in Benghazi, Libya, Roberts said there are still unanswered questions from the president.

"We had actionable intelligence that there was going to be an attack," he said. "We had people on the ground who could have helped, but someone gave the order not to."

Roberts said Congress has repeatedly asked for more information on

the incident, but so far none has been forthcoming.

Roberts voted against an extension of the debt ceiling, a bill that passed in the President has now signed into law.

"We need to face up to the unsustainable debt and deficit," he said. "It shortstops our ability to deal with any crisis."

Roberts said he was disappointed with the delay in approval of the Keystone Pipeline. He said it has been in review for five years and environmental studies have proven that there would be no measurable impact.

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


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
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


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Two of the budding artists from West Elementary School working on that school's mural.

The program was supported by the Max Alderman Foundation and donations by Rasure Lumber and the Northwest Kansas Technical College Automotive Department.




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

The Goodland High School varsity wrestling team lost a close dual to Norton on Friday at the Max Jones Fieldhouse. The Cowboys won the majority of the matches, but the Bluejays scored a technical fall and major decision, helping them keep pace with the Cowboys until the final two weight classes at 195 and 220, which the Cowboys forfeited. Norton won 33-27. The Cowboys will compete in the Class 4A Regionals at Colby on Friday and

Saturday. The state competition will be Friday and Saturday, Feb. 28 and March 1, in Salina. After the senior night presentation, the varsity teams got down to business: Tate Withington (106), won 9-4 over Skylar Johnson. John Peden (160) put the Cowboys back on top 21-15 with a win by fall over Kendall Miller with 32 seconds left in the first period. Then Colton Cooper (170) beat Cole Renner 3-2. Cooper had been trailing 1-0 going into the third period, but tied it 1-1 with an escape. He scored a takedown to make it 3-1. Renner scored an escape, but Cooper kept him from scoring in the remaining time. Drew House (182) beat Maverick Engel 4-2, making the team score 27-15.
