## Cops chase car across county

A 45-year-old man took off during a traffic stop on I-70 Sunday afternoon and led Kansas Highway Patrol troopers and sheriff's deputies on a 30- to 45-minute chase down county roads.

Richard William, 45, of Hays, was booked into the Sherman County Bastille after the chase on charges of possession of a hallucinogenic, possession of drug paraphernalia, fleeing and eluding, reckless driving and speeding.

Highway Patrol Public Resource Officer Tod Hileman said a trooper stopped the vehicle, a red sports car, at 1:40 p.m. Sunday because one of its headlights was out. It had been going eastbound on I-70 near milepost 15. The trooper smelled an odor of drugs in the car and was about to search it when the suspect got back in the car and took off.

Hileman said the vehicle got off the interstate at Exit 17 in Goodland and headed south on K-27 for about two miles. From there it zig-zagged southeast on county roads, traveling at 70 mph or faster.

## State senator holds town hall

Despite the frigid weather, State Sen. Ralph Ostmyer made it to Goodland for a town hall meeting on Saturday.

Ostmyer described the legislative session as "quiet" with little controversy so far. He said the state is in the middle of a two-year budget, though there are some items receiving attention such as prisons.

Another such item is education. Ostmyer said the Gov. Sam Brownback is recommending \$16 million to fund all-day kindergarten.

"A lot of our schools already do all-day kindergarten," Ostmyer said, "but I support this. I would like to see some money follow it."

Ostmyer said he isn't expecting any cuts to education this year, however, a bill that would have shifted some funding to charter schools will not be going anywhere. Ostmyer said the Wheatland-Grinnell district had at one time looked at forming a

Things to know about starting plants

As January has come to a close many gardeners are thinking about the garden. What am I going to plant? The garden catalogs are arriving and the ideas start formulating. If you are going to grow your own transplants here are a few things for you to consider from Kansas State.

Determine the Date to Seed: There are two pieces of information that needs to be known in order to determine the date to seed transplants: the target date for transplanting outside and the number of weeks needed to grow the transplant. The target date for transplanting the cool-season crops such as broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower and onions are the end of March to the beginning of April. Warm-season crops like tomatoes, peppers and most annual flowers are usually planted about Mid-May in this part of Kansas.

**Sowing Seed:** Garden soil should not be reused to germinate seed as it is too heavy and may contain diseased organisms. Use a media made especially for seed germination. **Keep Seed Moist:** Seed must be kept moist in order to germinate. Water often enough that the media never dries. Using a clear plastic wrap over the top of the container can reduce the amount of watering needed. Remove the wrap after the seedlings emerge.

**Light:** Most plants will germinate in either darkness or light but some require darkness (Centurea, Larkspur, Pansy, Portulaca, Phlox and Verbena) and others require light (Ageratum, Browallia, Begonia, Coleus, Geranium, Impatiens, Lettuce, Nicotiana, Petunia and Snapdragon). All plants require adequate amounts of light once

emergence occurs. South facing windows may not provide adequate amounts and so fluorescent fixtures are often used. Suspend the lights 2 to 4 inches above the top of the plants and leave the lights on for 16 hours each day.

**Temperature:** The temperature best for germination is often higher than what we may find in our homes especially since evaporating moisture can cool the germination media. Moving the container closer to the ceiling (top of a refrigerator) can help but a heating mat is best for consistent germination. After plants have germinated, they can be grown at a cooler temperature (65 to 70 degrees during the day and 55 to 60 degrees at night). This will help prevent tall, spindly transplants.

**Plant Movement:** Plants react to movement. Brushing over the plants with your hand stimulates them to become stockier and less leggy. Try 20 brushing strokes per day. However, brushing will not compensate for lack of light or over-crowding. Plants grown under inadequate light will be spindly regardless of any other treatment.

**Hardening Transplants:** Plants grown inside will often undergo transplant shock, if not hardened off. Plants are hardened off by moving them outside and exposing them to sun and wind before transplanting occurs. Start about two weeks before transplanting and gradually expose the plants to outside conditions. Increase the number of hours and degree of exposure over the two-week period.

## Talk to legislators about origin labeling

Did you know that in January, the European Parliament called for stricter labeling rules for fresh and frozen meat within the European Union?

Parliament is demanding that the place of birth be added to the current labeling system of indicating where goats, swine and sheep products are raised and processed. In Europe, beef already has Country of Origin Labeling, indicating where it is born, raised and processed. A British Labor member, Glenis Wilmott, says it is not acceptable for consumers to not know where their food comes from.

Other countries around the world understand the importance of such a program, yet in the United States, cattlemen continues to struggle to get this implemented. There was a tremendous push by big money and corporate interests to kill it in the 2014 Farm Bill. The bill did pass with Country of Origin unscathed, but those groups are already on the attack to find other ways to kill a program that would benefit U.S. beef production and help consumers to make more informed decisions.

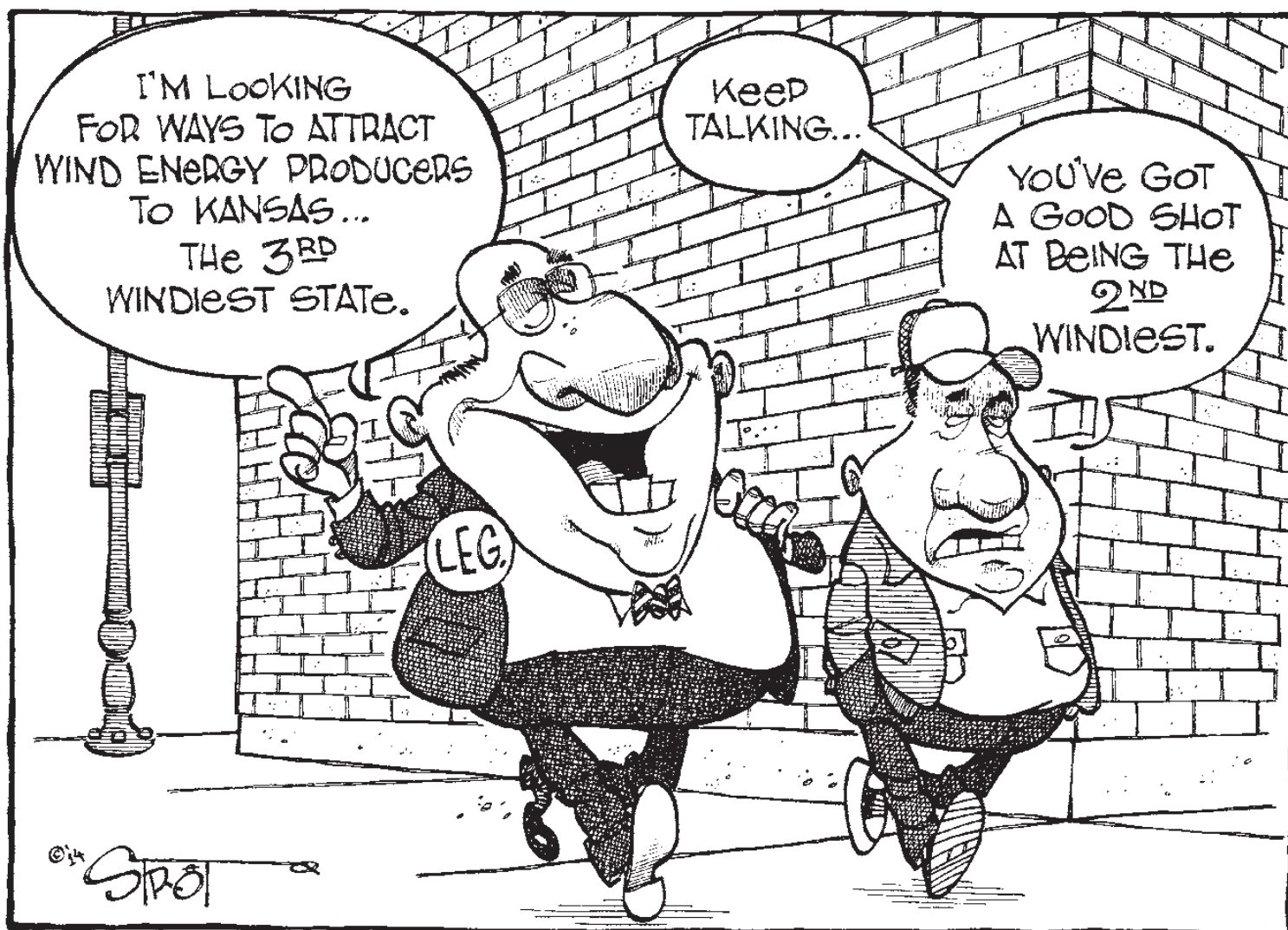
Kansas Sen. Jerry Moran voted in favor of the Farm Bill, but in a statement right after the vote he said, "... the fight is far from over when it comes to regulatory reforms. As a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, I plan to keep COOL and GIPSA front and center this year. I am committed to working with my colleagues to complete the work still needed on these issues...."

Why are some members of Congress so opposed to this program? What ever happened to "proud to be an American?" What about working for the U.S. citizen? What about representing the people that voted you into office? The United States of America is "for the people, by the people." Big business only wins when we, as citizens, give it the power. It is up to each individual to have his or her voice heard. As U.S. citizens, it is our right, our First Amendment right.

## Joining an orchestra

One of the things on my bucket list was to play in an orchestra. When the music club I belonged to moved their monthly meeting to Sunday night that gave me at least two Mondays in a month I could go to practice.

About three years ago Birkley Barnes asked me if I wanted to play bass clarinet in the orchestra and I said yes before realizing their rehearsals were on Mondays. At that time I was tied up with two school board meetings a month and music club. I had no illusions that I could go once a month and be able to do the group any good.

Starting in January I began attending — when I could — the Pride of the Prairie Orchestra rehearsal in Colby. The instrument I play best anymore is the alto recorder but I was willing and they were willing to let me work at playing the bass clarinet. In high school and some college I played the clarinet.

When I first started thinking about playing I had to find a bass clarinet to buy or borrow. The first place I asked was the school if they had one I could use. When they didn't I started on a hunt to find a used one to buy. When I was visiting Garden City I saw a store that worked on instruments and asked if they knew where I could find a used clarinet. Those people steered me to a company that buys instruments and refurbishes them and sells mainly to schools

located in Liberal. They said they had several and I decided to buy one. When I went to Garden City to visit my mother I took her with me to Liberal to retrieve the instrument.

For those who know nothing about clarinets the one most students in school play are the B flat alto clarinet. The bass clarinet is a bigger and lower pitched member of the clarinet family. One advantage is that it plays in the treble clef, is in the same key as the common clarinet and uses the same fingerings.

In the recorder ensemble that I belong to with Birkley and Martha Gunderson until the last two years I had been playing the bass recorder. It too is a bigger and lower sounding instrument. One main difference is that its music is written in the bass clef.

Some people have small enough hands they can not reach all the keys to play the bigger instruments but I have enough stretch in my hands so that it is not a problem.

The reason I digressed to talking about

recorders is that the alto and bass have quite a number of the same fingerings as the clarinet. That helped so at least I knew some of the fingerings. The soprano and tenor recorders are a fifth different so a C is an F in clarinet fingerings.

Back to the orchestra, playing the recorder has trained my ear to tune with the other instruments. The one problem I ran into was I expected the note I was playing to sound an octave higher and by having too tight an embouchure I was playing the higher note.

I did some looking on the Internet and one thing it said you needed to do when playing the bass clarinet was put more of the mouth piece into your mouth. That makes it harder to pitch the reed and get the higher note. It seems to help.

It is taking some getting used having all those keys on the side. Recorders don't have many keys.

At the orchestra concert a week ago on some of the music I actually could play it. But others that had a lot of runs so I didn't do so well. The runs will come as I get more used to playing the instrument. One advantage to having played any instrument for a long time is knowing how to simply the music.

As I have been told by others it is amazing what a little practice can do.

## Turnaround day

Friday was "turnaround day," when all bills, aside from exempt bills, must be passed by the chamber were they originated to be considered in the other House in the "back half" of this year's legislative session.

Since this was the last chance to pass House bills, we spend the last three days of February debating many bills on the floor. Trust was broken last year, and no one is taking for granted any bill without thoroughly vetting it.

The minority leader is calling for a 70-day session, and I would have to agree. We could save the state money in case we have to return to deal with the pending school lawsuit.

A bill I liked and voted for, which passed the House last week, dealt with "ballot language." When constitutional amendments are placed on ballots, the legal language is often hard to understand. To help ensure voters are able to

understand what an amendment does, HB 2518 allows for ballot language to be explained in plain English instead of legal jargon. The most recent example was in 2012, when voters approved a change to property tax rules for boats. The language was much longer and more complicated than most believed necessary.

This bill will create ballot language statements that provide a "plain English" explanation. These would be available to read online and at the polling station and would accompany advance ballots, but only the legal

language would be on the ballot itself. These statements would be approved by both the attorney general's office and secretary of state's offices and would be purely nonpartisan and unbiased.

Here are some interesting items I heard in committees last week: 18,000 people married in Kansas last year. The divorce rate is 56 out of 100. Each divorce costs the state an average of \$40,000. Ergo, a proposed law requiring eight hours of marriage counseling before you can tie the knot.

Most people don't remember, but the Department of Wildlife and Parks has added Tourism to its name and list of duties. Last year, Kansas had 32 million visitors, generating tourism expenditures of \$8 billion. Tourism provided for 14.4 percent of all state and local tax receipts.

## Bill opens floodgates

You cannot be online for more than a few minutes before college ads will pop-up on your screen. Click on them and you may find that they reduce or even disappear when you enter your zipcode.

There are a few states that have partially held back the flood of "cheap" online college courses. Kansas has been one of those states.

But House Bill No. 2544, approved this last month, will now move to the Kansas Senate Ways and Means Committee. This bill opens the floodgates to every online course and program that is "accredited" in other states that have also joined the "State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement" or SARA.

Just as the National Governors Association and the CCSO have worked to give away state curricular oversight and jurisdiction of K-12 education to a uniform nation-wide common core, this act supported by the Kansas Board of Regents abdicates state decision-making and will automatically admit online programs.

SARA is touted as offering "...a process to make state authorization more efficient, more uniform in regard to necessary and reasonable standards of practice that could span states, and more effective in dealing with quality and integrity issues that have arisen in online/distance education offerings. It also aims to be less costly and less complex than the current

system for both states and institutions."

The Kansas Board of Regents has been approving out-of-state online courses and programs at a steady clip for the past decade — about as fast as they flow in. The board operates under the illusion that they have little choice but to approve online programs if they are approved in some other state. But the paperwork and monthly procedures kept this flow limited to a steady stream — a half-hearted "finger in the dike." But passage of this bill will automate the process. It opens the floodgates to online operations across the United States.

Where is the evidence that accreditation can detect the superior programs from the diploma mills? Most K-12 superintendents know that student teachers vary widely in competency from different Kansas colleges. Yet every Kansas teacher college is NCATE-accredited. That accreditation is useless.

Most online operations are for-profit. In the May 3, 2013 Chronicle of Higher Education, a doctoral study at the University of Washing-

ton used data from the national Longitudinal Survey of Youth that tracks nearly 9,000 teenagers each year since 1997 and controlled for background traits. The wages of graduates of for-profit colleges "were more than 20 percent lower than the wages of those who attended two-year programs at public colleges...." An additional survey commissioned by the Chronicle of Higher Education of employers who hire graduates with baccalaureate degrees found that "employers were least likely to hire graduates of online colleges. For-profit colleges scored the next lowest...."

The workplace has good reasons to question the quality of many online courses and programs. A growing number of graduate programs are no longer accepting transfer credit from so-called online science "labs" and performance arts.

In Kansas, the gatekeeper on course and program quality is the Board of Regents.

House Bill No. 2544 allows them to abdicate that responsibility. And out-of-state online courses and programs will not be subject to the rigorous program review of regent's schools.

That leaves the Kansas Senate as our last line of defense to preserve the value of a bonafide degree, and defeat this bill.

# State senator holds town hall

charter school. "It wasn't going to work for us," he said.

Technical schools are also getting attention, he said. Technical schools have a quick turnaround and the graduates are finding jobs more quickly than those who graduate from four-year colleges. There was a time when cuts to technical school funding were proposed, he said, but those proposals were stopped.

"It would kill this community to take it away," he said, "and I think the state knows that."

Ostmeyer praised Northwest Kansas Technical College President Dr. Ed Mills, who he said is making news at the state level, particularly in the school's iPad program and the effort to add athletic programs, something other technical colleges have been reluctant to do.

In other issues:  
 • A bill that would remove taxing authority from extension

districts is not likely to pass the Senate, Ostmeyer said, and even if it does it would never pass the House. Ostmeyer described it as a "rural versus urban" issue. The bill would have harmed local 4-H clubs, he said.

Ostmeyer discussed a possible repeal of the mortgage registration fee, a tax that home buyers and real estate borrowers pay to the county. Ostmeyer said the tax started as a way to fund registers of deeds offices. He described the effort to repeal the fee as a "battle between banks" because federally funded institutions such as Farm Credit don't have to pay that tax while regular banks do.

Ostmeyer said he doesn't know which way to go on this issue yet, but said he would like to see counties weened off the tax so that it could be done away with. The debate has started in the Legislature, he said, and if something isn't done this year, it will likely be done next year.

• Valuations on farmland are going up, he said, shifting the burden

to commercial property. Oil and gas valuation had been going up, but has taken a loss recently.

Ostmeyer was asked about the effort to list the Lesser Prairie Chicken as endangered.

"The federal government is out of hand," he said. "They are bypassing everyone."

Ostmeyer said he supports efforts to establish wind farms, but said the industry has to start carrying itself without subsidies.

"If it takes a subsidy to make it show a positive note, then it ain't working," he said.

The ethanol industry is the same, he said.

Ostmeyer was asked about water policy. He said decisions should be made at the local level. He said there is already talk that the conservation effort in Sheridan County should have included more land.

"We need to plan better in order to survive," he said. "We don't have to shut it all off, but we need to get serious and make some cuts."

gan County Sheriff's Offices sent deputies to assist while a Sherman County deputy remained the lead vehicle in the chase. Wallace County deputies set up a roadblock at a bridge on the Smokey Hill River, but the vehicle was able to avoid them. A trooper coming from Oakley reported slick roads. The Highway Patrol's airplane was also called out to assist.

The chase went south toward the corner of Sherman County. The suspect went into a ditch and got a flat tire, but continued on a ways. It ended at about 2:15 p.m. on the Logan county line road when the Sherman County deputy pushed the suspect's car into a ditch. The suspect tried to get the car out of the ditch but was unsuccessful, and after a short standoff, officers were able to take him into custody. No injuries were reported in the chase.

# Severe weather week is March 3-7

Severe weather season is coming and we can be sure of one thing — somewhere, sometime in the coming months, Kansas is going to be hit with a severe storm, tornado, flooding and flash floods. Based on past years, we'll be hit with severe weather more than once.

Now is the time to prepare.

To urge Kansans to start planning for springtime weather-related emergencies, Gov. Sam Brownback will sign a proclamation Thursday, Feb. 27, designating March 3-7 as "Severe Weather Awareness Week in Kansas." The proclamation coincides with the national Severe Weather Awareness Week.

"It just makes sense to plan ahead

and heed storm warnings," said Brownback. "This winter, when snowstorms were forecast, Kansans by and large did the wise thing and stayed off the roads as much as possible and made sure their emergency kits were stocked. Even though warmer weather is coming, we need to continue to be prepared and alert to the possibility of severe weather."

According to the National Weather Service, Kansas had 56 tornadoes in 2013, including 15 in one day; 45 of those tornadoes hit in May. However, Angee Morgan, deputy director of the Kansas Division of Emergency Management, said that does not mean May is the most dangerous month for severe weather.

Morgan said a home emergency kit should include everything needed for each family member to survive for a minimum of three days without power. Kits should include one gallon of water per person per day; nonperishable, high energy foods; a battery powered NOAA weather radio; flashlights; extra batteries; a safe, alternate heat source; blankets; medications and other essentials. Additional information about preparing an emergency kit may be found online at www.kready.gov.

Morgan also advised everyone to have emergency plan for their home or place of business and ensure that everyone knows the plan.

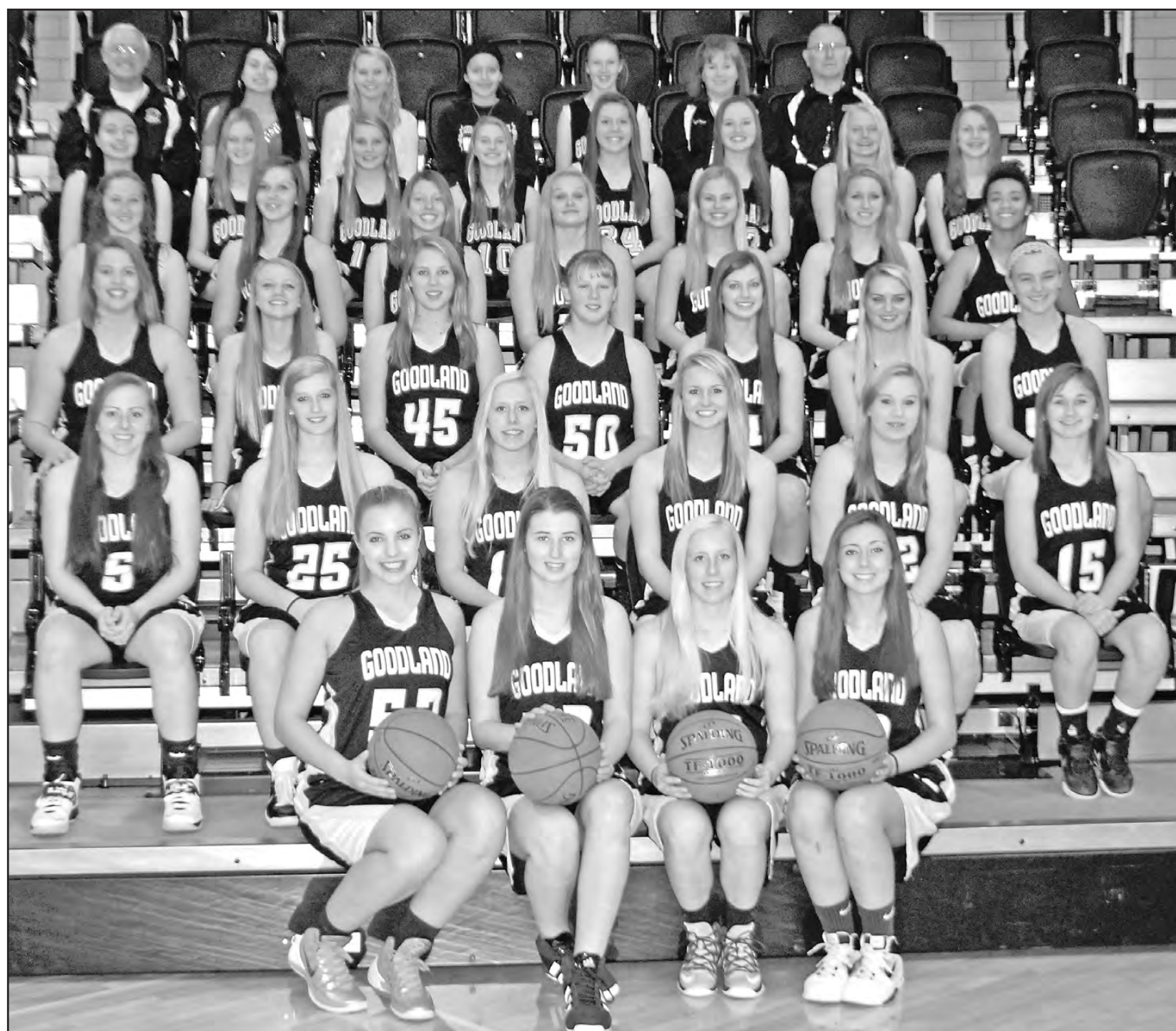

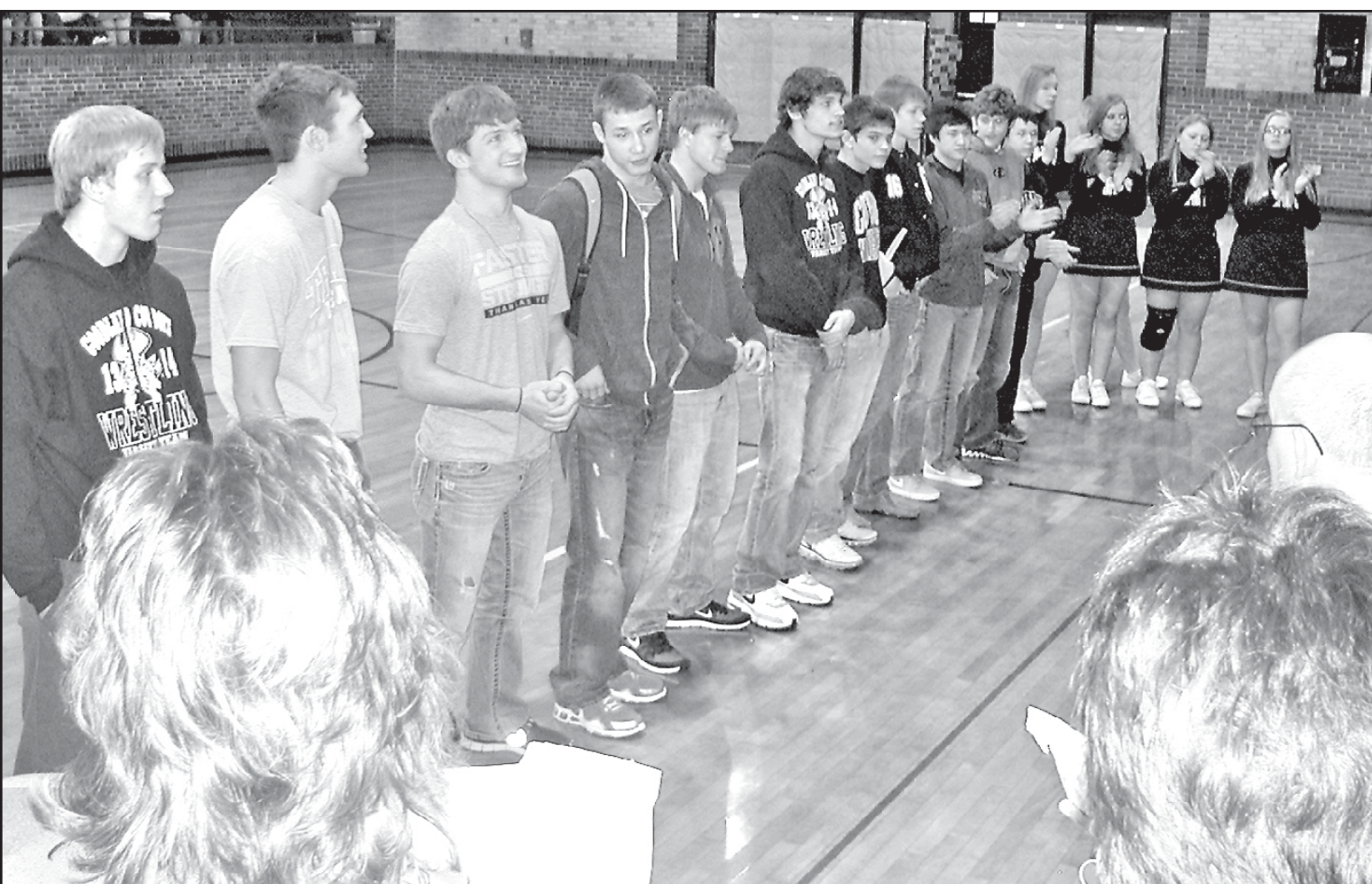

# Two Cowboys place at state

The Goodland High School varsity wrestling team had two wrestlers place at the Class 4A State Tournament on Friday and Saturday in Salina. John Peden, 160 pounds, placed fourth. Tate Withington, 106 pounds, placed sixth.

Eight Cowboys qualified for the state tournament. Two of them – Tristan Cooper, 113 pounds, and Austin Hernandez, 132 pounds – were eliminated on Friday. Peden, Withington, Aaron Avelar, 120, Brook Bahe, 138, Colton Cooper, 170, and Garrett Taylor, 182, all made it to Saturday play.

The Cowboys ended up 22nd out of 54 teams. They scored 33 team points. Holton was the winning team with 114. Colby placed fifth with 61.5 points; Ulysses, ninth with 49 points; and Hugoton, 39th with 15 points;

**John Peden**  
Peden won an 11-0 major decision over Mleh Landford of Bishop Ward High School in the first round. In the second round he lost 6-4 to John Hughes of Fort Scott in overtime. Peden had been trailing 4-3 in the third, but tied the match, sending it into overtime.
