## Prairie chicken decision expected soon

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is expected to make a decision this month on whether or not it will go ahead with listing the Lesser Prairie Chicken as endangered.

Ken Klemm, Sherman County Commissioner and president of the Kansas Natural Resource Coalition — a group of 33 Kansas counties that was formed to oppose the listing — said a judge had instructed Fish and Wildlife to make a decision by March.

The process to list the bird as endangered has been going on for more than a year. The Fish and Wildlife Service listed threats to the species and conservation efforts as the reason to begin an assessment of whether or not to list the bird.

Klemm said his organization feels the service has not done its due diligence in both science and economic impact during the process of deciding whether or not to list the bird.

The service is supposed to look at the whole scope of impact that a listing would have, he said, instead of piecemealing the process like it has been.

"What we've done is been very diligent about documenting the science and all the regulations involved," he said. "All of this has been entered into the federal record."

**Science**

In the 1930s, the Lesser Prairie Chicken was thought to be extinct. Klemm said rewards were offered to anyone who found one. The population eventually recovered.

Klemm said the coalition has been looking at the same scientific studies that Fish and Wildlife has, and these studies indicate the prairie chicken population has been expanding north for decades.

"They are very adaptable birds," he said, referencing a Kansas State University study on how the birds have adapted to wind turbines. The birds also adapt to oil and gas

production, he said.

The bird population numbers have been down in recent years, he said, but the same thing has happened to other bird species during the drought.

"We've determined that the science does not warrant listing," he said. "As little as 18 months ago, all the U.S. agencies agreed, until the Fish and Wildlife Service was sued by an environmental group."

**Economics**

One of the things Klemm criticized the Fish and Wildlife Service for was the lack of economic impact studies.

"We identified very large economic impacts," he said.

These include a wind farm that pulled out of one of the coalition's counties, he said, which that county estimated to be an \$800,000 loss in tax revenue. Other industries, especially power companies, are also concerned, he said, because of the money they would have

to put toward reducing impact on bird habitat at their building projects.

Klemm said the coalition is still figuring out what the impact would be on agriculture.

"Some sizable adjustments will be mandatory," he said. "It will mean a big change in the way business is done."

Some of the things Klemm said his organization found were that farmers would be required to harvest fields from the center out. Combines would have to be fitted with bird flushing devices — which may void warranties — and vehicles such as four-wheelers could be banned.

"You wouldn't be able to run equipment in the fields in late evening to early morning hours during their mating season," he said.

If land hasn't been tilled or harvested in five years, he said, regulations say it could never be harvested again.

Companies allowed to extend policies

Sandy Praeger, Kansas Commissioner of Insurance, announced today that the Kansas Insurance Department will allow companies selling health insurance in the state to continue to renew policies that don't meet the requirements of the Affordable Care Act that went into effect on January 1, 2014.

Under this transitional policy, companies will be allowed to renew certain "non-grandfathered" plans for policy years beginning on or before October 1, 2016. Non-grandfathered plans are those issued after March 23, 2010, but prior to January 1, 2014.

The decision comes following the

announcement Wednesday by the Obama Administration to extend the transitional policy originally announced in November 2013, which allowed the renewal of plans with policy years beginning on or before October 1, 2014. The insurance department had previously allowed a modified version of the first transitional policy and had advised companies about the decision in

December 2013.

"We are telling companies selling health insurance in Kansas today that, at their discretion, they can renew non-grandfathered policies currently in force through the new deadline," Commissioner Praeger said. "We still have concerns about the delay and the potential long-term effects on the health insurance market, but the department will give our companies and consumers the flexibility to work through the Affordable Care Act changes."

Commissioner Praeger said that

as soon as the federal Health and Human Services announcement about the health care rule came out yesterday, department personnel reached out to the companies to get input.

"Earlier, the department and the companies believed it was in the best interest to phase out non-compliant Affordable Care Act plans at the end of 2014," Commissioner Praeger said, "but with the new announcement we acknowledge the administration's decision and will comply with the flexibility provided under the extension."

# Beef recalls include Kansas

Ampride and Conoco stores in Kansas have received recalls for beef. These are the only two store chains that are located in Goodland.

The recalls were on whole carcasses, hearts, livers, tongues, heads and veal.

The recalls by Rancho Feeding Corporation were on nearly 9 millions pounds of beef across the U.S. The meat was being recalled because the company processed diseased and unsound animals and did it

without federal inspection. The recall was originally issued in February but was recently expanded.

This was a class 1 recall as a health hazard situation where there is a reasonable probability that the use of the product will cause serious health consequences or death.

So far there have been no reports of illness due to consumption of these products.

Cheyenne Center for Creativity was launched in St. Francis May 2, 2012, for the purpose of inspiring and promoting the growth of a creative community through exhibits, recitals, workshops and classes. The center recognizes that the creative community extends beyond Cheyenne County to include the North-west Kansas and tri-state areas.

In 2013, the center rented gallery and classroom space at 109 N. Quincy and established Quincy Gallery. Since that time, the gallery has hosted art exhibits, dramatic presentations, piano and instrumental recitals, an Irish "craic," as well

as classes in glass fusing, acrylic painting, pottery and children's activities.

Quincy Gallery recently received an entry for the "What is War?" exhibit from a Viet Nam veteran in Illinois. This submission shows how music played a part in war. It is titled "The Silver Flute", and features the story and photo of a family artifact, a fife or silver flute, which belonged to a great-great-grandfather who was a Yankee prisoner of war during the Civil War. (More details of this story will be revealed at the exhibit, which begins May 26.) Every generation of this family includes veterans, from the Revolutionary War to the war in Afghanistan.

# Severe weather tips offered

While the threat of severe weather in Kansas is year-round. In 2013, the National Weather Service reported about 56 tornadoes statewide. Kansas also experiences numerous other high impact weather events, including blizzards, severe thunderstorms and floods.

"When severe weather strikes you often have only a few minutes to respond and seek shelter. It is essential for you and your family to be prepared in an emergency," said Cherie Sage, Safe Kids Kansas. Safe Kids Kansas recommends becoming familiar with the type of weather you may encounter, prepare an emergency disaster kit, and practice your emergency plan frequently with your entire family.

Many people do not understand the difference between a watch and a warning. When conditions are favorable for severe weather to develop, a severe thunderstorm or tornado WATCH is issued. Information from weather radar, spotters, and other sources is used to issue severe thunderstorm and tornado WARNINGS for areas where severe weather is imminent. Severe weather warnings are passed to local radio and television stations, and broadcast over weather alert radios. These warnings are also relayed to local emergency management and public safety officials who then activate the local warning systems to alert communities. Remember, thunderstorms are very dangerous and can become tornadic quickly so shelter is advised for those warnings as well. Getting to a safe shelter in advance of a storm is especially important for families with children or individuals with a disability.

Safe Kids Kansas recommends assembling an emergency disaster kit in advance. If you determine you

need to take shelter, be sure every family member puts on hard-soled footwear and take your emergency disaster kit with you. An emergency disaster kit should contain:

- non-perishable food items and water;
- a manual can opener if your kit contains canned food;
- blankets or sleeping bags;
- a change of clothing for each family member;
- a first-aid kit;
- prescription medications;
- sun block;
- a flashlight and batteries;
- a NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) weather radio;
- a set of car and house keys;
- a whistle to signal for help;
- a highway map that marks the counties to follow the storm;
- identification and a credit card or cash;
- and, any specific items you may need for children such as diapers or formula.

Additional supplies and equipment may be necessary for family members with disabilities or medical conditions.

Don't forget your pets will also need supplies, including food, water, collars and leashes. For smaller animals you may want to have a crate or a cage to help keep them safe and close.

Another good preparation tool is to designate an out-of-state friend or family member as your family contact in case weather strikes while your family members are apart. "Each family member should know the phone number of the emergency contact person, and call to alert them they are safe and where they are going to be," said Sage.

Safe Kids Kansas reminds par-

ents to develop an emergency plan for severe weather in advance, and practice the plan often with your children, just as you do for other emergencies, such as a house fire. Be sure to include scenarios when you are at home, work, school or outdoors.

If a tornado warning is issued, your family should immediately go to your designated tornado shelter which may be a storm shelter or a basement. If you are not able to get underground, then move to an interior room, hallway, bathroom, or closet on the lowest level. If possible, get under a sturdy piece of furniture to protect you from debris, and stay away from windows.

If you are in a vehicle or mobile home, get out immediately and head to the nearest shelter. Do not try and outrun a tornado in your vehicle. If you are outside, lie flat in a low location, and cover your head with your hands. Do not take shelter under an overpass or bridge. Flash flooding causes more weather related deaths annually, so be aware of your surroundings if you seek shelter in a ditch or ravine.

After a severe storm has passed, be careful to watch for fallen power lines and structures that may be weakened from storm damage. Use a flashlight to inspect your home. Do not use candles, matches or lighters, as there may be leaking natural gas pipes or fuel tanks nearby.

Safe Kids Kansas also recommends that your family learn basic CPR first aid, and teach young children how to call 9-1-1. Severe weather can strike at any time with little or no notice. The best way to protect yourself and your family members is by being prepared in advance.

## Pay attention to dust warnings

Northwest Kansas weather forecasters are unhappy that three people died in a fiery pileup near Rexford earlier this year despite a forecast for high winds and the possibility of blowing dust.

Dave Floyd, warning coordinator for the Goodland weather station, said the National Weather Service had the forecast right, predicting winds high enough to raise dust and issuing a warning more than two days ahead of the storm.

Still, dozens of people drove into a dust cloud that blotted out visibility west of Rexford on Jan. 16. Three died in the fiery 11-vehicle mashup that resulted.

What were they doing on the road? And why did they all just keep driving when they couldn't see a thing?

While there could be more questions than answers, one is that people tend to go about their business unless they hear of actual danger. If the weather service issues a tornado watch, for instance, indicating tornadoes are possible today, we don't go home and wait. School classes continue. Work goes on. Trips are made. We just keep an eye on the clouds and an ear on the radio.

With a tornado warning, signaling imminent danger, it's different. Sirens sound. Most of us head for the basement or a nearby shelter. School kids gather in safe places and hunker down. Even then, more often than not, nothing happens on our block, and of course, that's part of the problem.

Mr. Floyd pointed out that no one has died in a tornado in northwest Kansas in the last decade, but five people have been killed in dust storms. However, neither the warning system nor the terminology used is the same between the two types of storms.

People here are used to the lexicon of tornado watches and warnings. We have severe thunderstorm warnings all the time, tornadoes most summers. Dust storms are less frequent, and the technology to detect them on the ground isn't as advanced. Weather radar today can show a tornado, but dust storms can form under the radar, as it were.

In the case of the Rexford storm, where only a couple of miles of highway downwind from some open fields were involved, but by the time a dust warning could have been issued, it was too late.

One partial answer might be to align the terminology. A high wind warning doesn't sound life threatening. A tornado warning does. Would a dust storm warning, accompanied by instructions not to drive into a dust cloud, be more effective? Should a "dust storm watch" be issued with a high-wind warning, aligning the terminology?

Tornado and severe-thunderstorm warnings today include instructions to take cover. Would a dust-storm watch or advisory include a caution not to drive into a dust cloud?

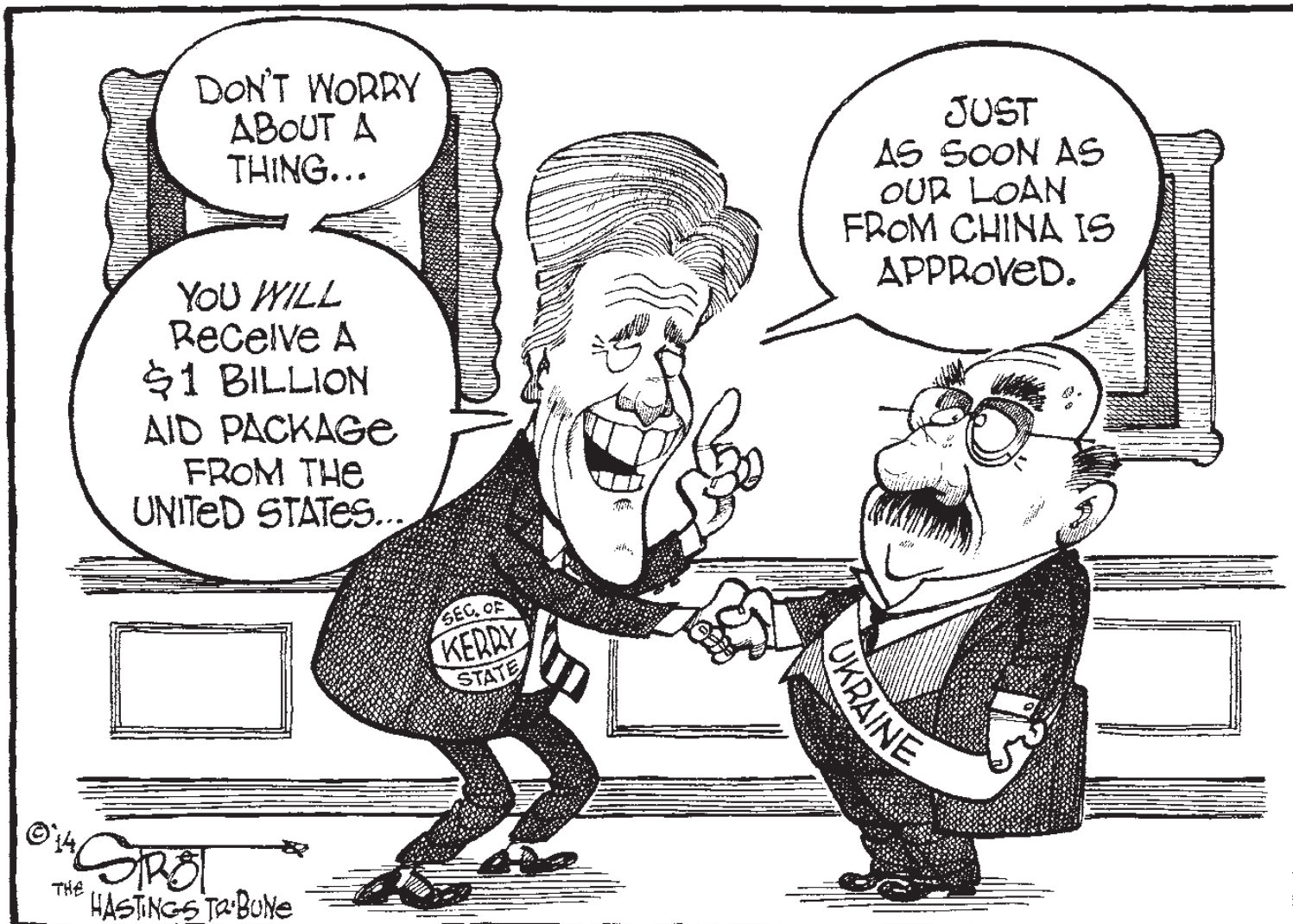
Teaching people what to do when facing a dust storm is vital. Most people really don't know. Most just keep driving and pray, and sometimes, that doesn't work. You can't stop without the threat of being run into, and you can't go on without the threat of running into something you won't see.

The best advice we've heard came from the Sherman County Sheriff's office, where an officer advised us that the only safe thing to do is to turn at right angles to the road and proceed slowly until you feel the fence. Turn your lights off and wait out the dust.

Driving on a dusty day, it may be hard to tell when to get off the road, but it's critical if you want to live.

Above all else, when it's apparent that lives are in danger, the service should be able to send a message to all cell phones in an area urging people to take action. To some extent, that's possible today, but warnings have to be limited to immediate danger.

If we're to get a beep on our phones every time a child is kidnapped, then why not get one when we might be about to die, telling us to get out of harm's way? —Steve Haynes



## School finance ruling

There was only a two day legislative session last week. The big news came from the state Supreme Court on Friday morning, when its ruling in the school-finance case was posted.

The high court ordered a three-judge district court panel to consider whether the Legislature, by session's end, can eliminate disparities in funding school district Capital Outlay and Local Option Budget supplemental funds. The basic idea is that wherever the students are, they should have a suitable and equitable education. Equalizing those two funds together would be about a \$130 million cost to the state, far less than many had expected.

The issue puts the three-judge panel squarely between the Legislature and school districts. Most districts want the money, but they are aware that if the panel rejects the Legislature's efforts, they would lose lots of dollars, because

the panel was ordered to freeze funds if the inequities are not solved.

My belief is that if the Supreme Court would have ruled for a \$440 million settlement, which was the figure most thrown around, there would have been tremendous unrest between the Legislature and courts. I also believe our leadership would have just said no to the courts. This week should give us a good indication on how the governor and Legislature will deal with the additional expense.

School lawsuits have gone on in Kansas

since 1972, and it would be wonderful if a lasting solution could be found. I have said all along that western Kansas education is not a problem. Everything I have seen shows me higher graduation rates, attendance rates and outstanding student achievement from our area. Unfortunately, there is only one school finance formula.

Issues are heating up and it will become interesting in Topeka the next few weeks. There is no doubt that the upcoming election will play a big part in how leadership proceeds.

A good news item: Kansas exports grew by more than 6 percent in 2013 to \$12.45 billion, the second highest total in Kansas history. The three biggest areas we export to: Canada, China and Mexico.

## Alzheimer's research needs investment

Every 68 seconds, someone in America develops Alzheimer's disease—a devastating and irreversible brain disease that slowly destroys an individual's cognitive functioning, including memory and thought.

Alzheimer's currently affects more than 5.2 million Americans and more than 35.6 million worldwide. As the population ages, the number of people diagnosed with Alzheimer's will double every five years, while the number 85 years and older with this disease will triple by 2050.

These statistics provide a much-needed Alzheimer's reality check. This terrible disease is the sixth-leading cause of death in the United States and there is currently no diagnostic test, no treatment and no cure.

The U.S. Senate recently held a hearing in the Senate Appropriations Committee on the devastating impacts of Alzheimer's—both personal and economic—and the state of current research initiatives. I invited my friend and former colleague, Congressman Dennis Moore of Lenexa, to share his personal testimony at the hearing. Rep. Moore was diagnosed with Alzheimer's in June 2011 after serving Kansas' 3rd District from 1999 to 2011.

"An epidemic is upon us" Rep. Moore told the committee, "and too many families are in

situations like mine facing a fatal disease that currently has no way to prevent, cure or even slow its progression."

I asked my friend what health care professionals are telling him he can do about his diagnosis. Dennis responded, "Basically to take the medication that they diagnosed for me ... and also to get some exercise, which I try to do on a daily basis. My wife very much encourages me to do that. I'm a smart husband; I say, 'Yes dear.'"

I appreciate Congressman Moore's willingness to testify before the Senate on behalf of the thousands of Americans and people around the world who have encountered Alzheimer's disease. The way he is living his life gives others courage and hope, and I commend him and his wife for their continued public service.

As a nation, it is critical that we confront the pending Alzheimer's crisis and its financial costs as the Baby Boom generation ages.

Caring for those with Alzheimer's and other dementias is expected to cost \$203 billion this year, with \$142 billion covered by the federal government through Medicare and Medicaid.

A study by the Rand Corp. stated that the cost of dementia care is projected to double over the next 30 years, surpassing health care expenses for both heart disease and cancer. Yet, for every \$270 Medicare and Medicaid spends caring for individuals with Alzheimer's, the federal government currently spends only \$1 on research. Alzheimer's has become a disease to define a generation, but if we focus and prioritize our research capacity, it does not need to continue as an inevitable part of aging.

Research suggests that more progress could be made with a boost in investment. One study found that a breakthrough against Alzheimer's that delays the onset of the disease by five years would mean an savings of \$447 billion a year by 2050. It is time to pledge to defeat Alzheimer's disease in the next decade. The health and financial future of our nation are at stake and the United States cannot afford to ignore such a threat. Together, we can make a sustained commitment to Alzheimer's research that will benefit our nation and bring hope to future generations. The challenge is ours and the moment to act is now.

## Legislating language divides people

The Ukrainian conflict has highlighted the instability of nations in which languages and cultures compete for dominance.

Despite fundamental differences, parallels have been drawn with the situation in the U.S., where Spanish is now sometimes seen as a challenge to English. Although there is no danger of a Ukrainian-style conflict in the U.S., more must be done to encourage linguistic integration and equal access to economic opportunities, and thus minimize the potential for tension between language communities.

In Ukraine, the division has been oversimplified by many commentators as an east (Russian-speaking) and west (Ukrainian-speaking) divide. Past polls indicate that a majority of Russian speakers living in the country express loyalty to Ukraine and not Russia. Also, some people who identify themselves as Ukrainian-speaking may speak Russian in their day-to-day lives.

However, the country's politics have been dominated by the linguistic divide since the breakup of the Soviet Union. Back in 2004, governors in eastern Ukraine warned that Russian-speaking regions in the east would secede if Viktor Yushchenko became president. The disputed election of Viktor Yanukovich, a Russia-backed candidate, was overturned and Yushchenko won in a second election.

The country remained politically divided, but discussion of eastern secession quickly

waned. Ten years later, Yanukovich, elected in 2010 after disappointment in the Orange Revolution, has been ousted, and the east-west divide has again come to the fore.

Making Ukrainian the sole national language back in 1991 was a divisive move on which politicians have played. Yanukovich is a Russian speaker from the east, and despite his efforts to please nationalists by promoting the language, he still makes mistakes in Ukrainian. Yulia Tymoshenko (just released from jail), who lost the 2010 election, has spent years mastering Ukrainian, yet she called the 2012 law making Russian an official language "a crime against the state."

The lesson from Ukraine and other diverse nations is that the creation of an official language leads to division rather than unity. It is usually a ploy to cater to nationalistic minorities for political gain. Furthermore, the groups that speak unofficial languages become constitutionally excluded as their languages and cultures are delegitimized. In the U.S., where some states and cities have enshrined English as the sole official language, we should learn

from this experience and allow languages to develop without governmental intervention.

While Spanish is an important language in the U.S.—almost 40 million Americans speak it at home—English is the de facto language of the nation and does not need official recognition. No matter how unjust it may be, the reality is that Americans who don't speak and write relatively well in English have less chance of economic success than those who do. Nobody knows that better than non-English speakers themselves, who are clamoring for classes, books, apps, CDs—anything that will help them to learn the language.

Instead of wasting time, effort and money and amplifying divisions by creating a sole official language, we should be providing more free or low-cost programs to adult English learners and increasing investment in research-proven methods to help young English learners achieve language competency and content knowledge.

Of course, the more forward-thinking English learners—and native English speakers—will see it as an advantage rather than a threat to be competent in another language as well.

# Prairie chicken listing decision expected soon

## Coordination

One of the coalition's main tactics against the listing is to invoke "coordination." Klemm said federal laws such as the Federal Land Policy and Management Act and executive orders that predate the Endangered Species Act require federal agencies to coordinate with local governments during the decision-making process if those entities assert their authority. He said the coalition invoked that principle on Sept. 11.

"The Fish and Wildlife Service is refusing to cooperate," he said. "We sent them a letter on Nov. 29 detailing all the other times they had coordinated with local entities. We have received no answer."

Whether or not the bird is listed, he said, there will still be a conservation plan put in place by the Western Area Fish and Wildlife Agencies. This was developed by five states—including Kansas—in an attempt to allay the concerns put forward by the Fish and Wildlife Service. There are several very complicated plans out there, he

said, and though they appear voluntary, landowners who don't sign on could face fines and jail time.

"These are things we found during our two-day hearing in Garden City earlier this year," he said.

Klemm's coalition includes nearly a third of Kansas counties and has a different plan, one that has been adopted by each member county. Klemm said this plan does not include the kind of costly mitigation that would be required if the bird is listed as endangered. It also calls for further investigation into what the birds need to continue to thrive.

"Our plan says 'let's look at this and see if there are low-cost ways to preserve their habitat,'" Klemm said. "Maybe there are low-cost things that oil and gas can do, we want to look at that."

While waiting for the Fish and Wildlife Service to make their decision, Klemm said the coalition still has administrative actions it plans to take, including securing legal council on what steps to take next.

Klemm said anyone with questions should contact their county commissioners.

# High school student in college program publishes game app

Ashley Coleman, a Colby High School senior attending Northwest Tech's Career Academy, published an app in the Apple Store after one semester of instruction in the Mobile Application and Entertainment Development program.

The app is called Memory Squared and is currently optimized for the iPhone. It is a memory game where the user is presented with a pattern that they must repeat, similar to the Simon Says game. The game can be viewed in the App Store and downloaded from <https://itunes.apple.com/us/app/memory-squared/id818568680?mt=8>

"The Career Academy courses have been challenging and rewarding," Coleman said.

Students in the Career Academy complete technical coursework primarily online in a monitored lab

at Colby High School and travel to Northwest Tech twice a month to meet with Northwest Tech instructors. Students earn both high school and college credit. The hybrid Career Academy courses are offered tuition free to Kansas high school students as a result of Senate Bill 155 state funding to promote career and technical education and credential attainment.

"The Career Academy students are eager and willing to learn," commented Andrew Strange, the Mobile Application and Entertainment Development instructor at Northwest Tech responsible for teaching the hybrid courses to Career Academy students. "Ashley is a talented young man with an excellent grasp of software design. He is motivated and dedicated and will go far."

Career Academy courses of-

fered through Northwest Tech are available tuition free to all Kansas High School students. The Mobile Application and Entertainment Development program is a particularly unique program to the state, both in content and because the tuition-free courses can be made completely available online for high school students. Additionally, hybrid courses are available in Computer Graphics, Engineering Technology, Electrical Technology, and Heating, Ventilation, Air Conditioning and Refrigeration. Northwest Tech is expanding the Career Academy courses to Goodland High School and other area high schools in the 2014-2015 academic year.



# Cowboys defeat Hugoton, fall to Scott City in final game

The Goodland High School boys basketball team made it to the finals in the Class 4A Substate Tournament before falling to Scott City.

The Cowboys staved off a late-game rally by Hugoton on Friday with good free throw shooting, winning that game 59-51. On Saturday they faced Scott City – who ended the regular season ranked second in 4A Division II. The Cowboys hung in there in the first half, but the Beavers pulled out a double-digit lead and held on to win 57-45.

The Cowboys end their season with a 9-13 record. Scott City will go on to play in the state tournament later this week.

## Hugoton – Friday

The Cowgirls really got fired up in overtime in the first game of the Class 4A Division II Substate tournament on Thursday against the Colby Lady Eagles.

Sounds reverberated off the ceiling and walls as supporters for both teams yelled encouragement. The Cowgirls and Lady Eagles were tied at the end of the fourth quarter 28-28. Goodland pulled ahead in overtime to win 40-31.

Goodland lost to Hugoton – ranked second in 4A Division II – on Saturday. The Cowgirls end their season with a 14-9 record. Hugoton will go on to play at the state tournament later this week.

## Colby - Thursday

The four minute overtime period in Thursday's game against Colby started with Kate-Lynn King and the Lady Eagles' Haileigh Shull going for a jump ball. As King blocked a Colby shot she was fouled. She made both free throws to give Goodland the lead, 30-28. King made another block to take control of the ball. She was fouled on her shot and made the free throw. That gave Goodland a five point lead. When Colby missed a shot Maddie Mayer rebounded the ball, threw the ball to King, who made a bucket. Goodland had a seven point lead.

The only shot Colby made in overtime was a three-pointer by Brooklyn Bange to make the score 35-31. The Eagles suffered a set-back when senior season-long leader Shull fouled out as she tried to force a Goodland turnover. Berkley White made one of two free throws. # 'What a game!'

## Mavericks knock off No. 1 ranked team in triple-overtime win; lose to Hutchinson

The Northwest Kansas Men's Basketball team put themselves on the map with a strong showing at the National Junior College Athletic Association Region VI tournament Friday and Saturday at the Koch Arena in Wichita.

The ninth-seed Mavericks burst onto the stage Thursday with a 97-92 triple-overtime win against first-seed Independence in the quarterfinals, but fell 92-81 to fourth-seed Hutchinson in the semifinals on Friday. Hutchinson went on to lose the championship game to Pratt on Saturday.

In just the second season for the college basketball program, the Mavericks finished with a 20-13 record and had their best tournament showing to date.

### Independence - Thursday

Gian Clavell and Marcus Walden got things started with a three pointer and a two pointer. Independence came back with six points to briefly take the lead. The Mavericks took it back by adding five points, including a three pointer from James Sylvester.

The Pirates tied the game 10-10 with 12:48 remaining in the first half. Northwest Tech again retook the lead, this time holding it for the rest of the half, scoring 28 points to the Pirates' 17. Clavell and Luis Huertas hit three pointers and Lamar Britton made a two-handed dunk. Clavell alone had 12 points in the half and Sylvester, nine. Malachi Jacquart made several key blocks, contributing to the 38-27 Maverick lead at halftime.

Britton made his second dunk of the game to open the second half. Sylvester made an offensive rebound and was fouled, adding two free throws. Independence put in a free throw to make it 42-28.

John Caraballo and Walden put in baskets, followed by four points from Independence and another basket from Sylvester to make it 48-33. With 17 minutes to play, the Pirates went on a 13-0 run, cutting the Mavericks' lead to 48-46. Northwest Tech finally put a stop to it with a free throw from Walden.

Over the next several minutes, the Mavericks scored seven points to the Pirates' one, increasing their lead back to 56-47.

With nine minutes left in regulation play, the Pirates closed the gap again to 59-56. Clavell hit a three pointer to make the score 62-56, but Independence kept at it until the score was 62-61 with 3:40 on the clock.

The Pirates' Chris Ikuenobe fouled out, followed shortly thereafter by Britton. Caraballo put in a pair of free throws, followed by a basket from Walden, making it 66-62. The Pirates put in a basket, then tied the game 66-66 on a pair of free throws with 1:30 to play.

Independence got the ball back with 1:12 on the clock, but Clavell blocked their first shot attempt. On their second attempt, Sylvester got the rebound and was called for traveling. He got another rebound but missed an attempt at a three pointer. After a timeout, Huertas missed a shot attempt. The shot clock expired, giving the ball back to the pirates with 3.1 seconds left. The Pirates tried for a half-court shot, but were unsuccessful, sending the game into overtime.

Independence went ahead on a free throw in first overtime period. Sylvester put in a basket, followed by a two pointer from the Pirates. Caraballo's dunk attempt was rejected, and with 1:59 on the clock, the Pirates put in another pair of free throws.

Sylvester scored to make it 71-70 in favor of Independence. Walden fouled out with a minute to play, and the Pirates got two more free throws. Clavell scored, followed by two Pirate free throws to make it 75-72.

With 23 seconds left, Sylvester put in a basket to make it 75-74. Independence added another free throw, then with just a few seconds remaining, Clavell made a game-saving layup to tie the score 76-76. The Pirates' last shot attempt was no good, sending the game into double overtime.

The Mavericks won the tipoff in the second overtime period. Sylvester

scored, followed by a two-pointer from the Pirates. Caraballo put in a free throw. With four minutes left, the Pirates took an 80-79 lead on a pair of free throws. Sylvester briefly put the Mavericks on top again with a basket, but the Pirates hit a three pointer to make it 83-81. Sylvester tied the game 83-83.

Izais Hicks put in a basket but it was waived off in favor of a blocking foul on the Pirates' leading scorer Tarik Phillip, who fouled out. Clavell missed both free throws.

With 1:20 to play the Pirates went up 85-83, but Sylvester put in another two points to keep the game tied. A foul on Caraballo resulted in a free throw for the Pirates. Sylvester was fouled nearly at the buzzer and put in the game-tying free throw. He missed the second, rebounded and attempted a shot, but the ball went out of bounds. The Mavericks got the ball back with two tenths of a second on the clock, not enough time to score, so the game was headed to triple overtime.

Caraballo put in the first basket of the period. The Pirates tied things up 88-88, then with 3:37 to play, Sylvester scored his 30th points of the game. Caraballo was fouled and put in two free throws to make it 92-88.

The teams traded turnovers, then the Pirates put in a three pointer, making it a one-point game with two minutes left. The Mavericks got the ball back with 1:15 to play. Sylvester put in a basket to make it 94-91. Independence missed a game-tying three point attempt, but got the rebound. Their next shot attempt was blocked by Hicks, giving the possession back to the Mavericks. Huertas pulled down a rebound on a missed three-point attempt and was fouled. He made one of two free throws.

The Pirates added a free throw to make it 95-92. With less than 10 seconds left Clavell was fouled and added the final nail in the coffin for the Pirates by making both free throws. Independence was unable to score in the remaining time, ending the marathon three-hour game with a 97-92 victory for Northwest Tech,

prompting KKCI announcer Brice Kesler to exclaim "What a game!"

Sylvester was the top scorer with 32 points, 19 of them in overtime. Clavell had his third straight 20-point game. Caraballo had 17 points, 11 rebounds and went nine of 12 at the line.

### Hutchinson - Friday

The Mavericks came out strong against Hutchinson on Friday, dominating the first half of play.

Neither team scored in the first two minutes. With 17:14 on the clock, Clavell was fouled on a three-point attempt and made all his free throws. Britton made a layup, putting the Mavericks ahead 5-0.

Hutchinson got on the board at 15:35 with a layup. Clavell put in a three pointer and Caraballo got a putback to make it 10-2. Hutchinson scored, followed by two free throws from Sylvester and a coast-to-coast layup from Britton.

The Blue Dragons were able to put six points on the board, then Huertas made two free throws to make it 16-8. Hutchinson added another basket, then Clavell got back-to-back buckets, one of them a three pointer, to make it 21-10 with 9:49 to play in the first half.

Both teams added eight points. After Walden missed a pair of free throws, the Blue Dragons made one of their own to make it 29-18. Hicks

got a putback and then blocked a slam dunk at the other end of the court. With 4:53 to play, the Blue Dragons got another pair of free throws, then Clavell put in another three-point shot to make it 34-21.

Caraballo was fouled after missed three point attempts by Clavell and Huertas. He made both free throws. Hutchinson put on five points, then their leading scorer was called for a personal and technical foul and was put on the bench for the most of the remaining minutes. The Mavericks and Blue Dragons would be called for five technical fouls in the game.

Hutchinson went on an 8-0 run in the final 1 1/2 minutes of the half, closing the Mavericks lead at halftime to 41-36.

The Blue Dragons had all the momentum going into the second half. They made the first score and within three minutes had taken a 44-41 lead. Sylvester put an end to the run with a two-point shot. An offensive foul gave the ball back to the Mavericks, but they were unable to capitalize on the turnover.

The Blue Dragons put in a three pointer, answered by a jump shot from Hicks to make it 47-45. Both teams traded baskets, but the Blue Dragons were able to pull out to an eight-point lead with 10 minutes

to play.

Sylvester put in a basket, answered by a pair of baskets from Hutchinson. Jackson Hussey and Clavell hit three pointers, cutting the lead to four points.

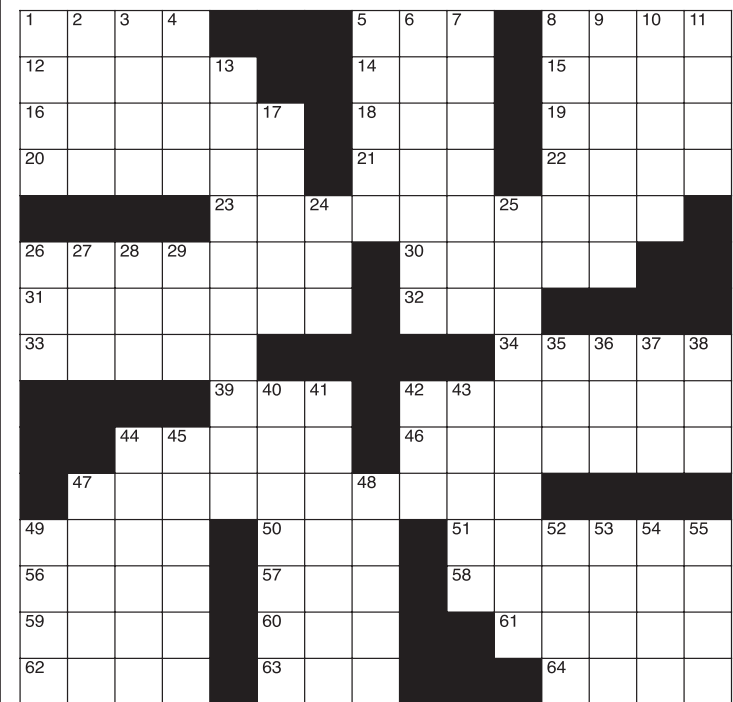
Hutchinson went on a six-point run before Sylvester put in a free throw with six minutes to play. Hutchinson added another five points to take a 76-62 lead.

The clock ran out on the Mavericks, who ended their season with the 92-81 loss.
