Graduation season begins this week

The 2014 graduation season will kick off this Friday, starting with the Learning Center's commencement ceremony at 10 p.m. in the Goodland High School auditorium.

The high school graduation ceremony will be at 2 p.m. Saturday in the Max Jones Fieldhouse.

Speaking at this year's ceremony will be retiring Spanish teacher and AFS sponsor

Mary Porterfield.

Porterfield has spent 46 years in the Goodland School District, teaching many subjects such as typing and law as well as Spanish. She is the longest-serving teacher at Goodland High School, and has served on the school improvement and professional development committees and as the senior class sponsor for 16 years.

Porterfield's involvement with AFS helped bring 92 exchange students to the high school and helped send 14 local students abroad. Four AFS teachers have come to Goodland and one was sent from here to teach in Thailand. She is currently the chair of the AFS-USA Board of Directors, helping to oversee a professional and volunteer staff of more than 5,000 people, and more than 3,000 exchange

students each year.

Porterfield is married to Dr. Clifton Porterfield. Their daughter, Heather Musil, is a special education teacher at Hays Middle School. They have three grandchildren and have served as a host family for five AFS students.

Specialist to join staff at Goodland hospital

A new ophthalmologist will be joining the roster of specialists at Goodland Regional Medical Center later this month.

Dr. William Richheimer will begin his clinic and surgery schedule at the Goodland hospital's Specialty Clinic on Wednesday, May 28, and continue on the fourth Wednesday of every month.

"We have been working with Dr. Richheimer to establish his practice here since shortly after Dr. Ronald Wise left the medical staff," said Marion A. "Tony" Thompson, chief executive officer at the hospital. "Dr. Wise had to leave due to commitments to the Department of Ophthalmology, University of Colorado School of Medicine."

Dr. Richheimer earned his Bachelor of Science degree from Cornell University, followed by a Medical Doctor degree from Duke University. He pursued an internal medi-

cine internship in Denver and then completed an ophthalmology residency in San Francisco at the California Pacific Medical Center. He then completed a fellowship in cornea, refractive surgery and external disease at the Moran Eye Center in Salt Lake City.

After providing education and surgical support abroad and in the Ophthalmology Residency Program at the University of Colorado, Dr. Richheimer is expanding his Denver practice to Kansas.

"This is a significant addition to our visiting specialist program and helps us, as a hospital and a medical staff, provide a broader range of service for our patients right here in Goodland," said hospital Chief of Staff Dr. Travis Daise.

Cowboy poetry contest starts in June

For 2014, the Kansas Cowboy Poetry Contest will have qualifying rounds at new sites around the state and will culminate with the finals on Friday, June 13 in Alma.

Qualifying contests will be held as follows: Sunday, May 18, 2 p.m., Old Cowtown, Wichita;

Friday, May 30, 4 p.m. (Mountain Time), Carnegie Center for the Arts, Dodge City; and Saturday, June 7, 3 p.m. (Mountain Time), Flint Hills Rodeo Grounds, Strong City. Cowboy poets must finish in the top three at one of these contests to qualify to compete at the state finals. There are two divisions: serious and humorous poetry. Contestants must present original work.

"We are excited to feature cowboy poetry at these venues," said poetry contest chair Ron Wilson, Poet Lariat. "Old Cowtown celebrates our pioneer history in Wichita along the Chisholm Trail, Dodge City is the Queen of the Cowtowns, and Strong City is host to one of our state's most historic rodeos."

The Final Round of the Contest will take place at the St. John's Lutheran Memorial Hall (218 Kansas, Alma), with the contest beginning at 6 p.m. (Mountain Time) The event is free. The public is invited.

As the honorary chair of the Symphony in the Flint Hills, Governor Brownback will be signing the winning certificates of the Kansas Cow-

boy Poetry Contest and the grand prize will be the Governor's Buckle. The award is titled the Saddlejack Bradrick Kansas Cowboy Poetry Award. "Thanks to the Flint Hills Discovery Center Foundation for being our major sponsor," Wilson said.

The first place competitors in each division will receive the coveted Governor's Buckle. A Champion will be named in each division, receiving two tickets to the Symphony in the Flint Hills where they will receive recognition from Kansas Governor, Sam Brownback. Winners will be asked to recite their work again in the Patron's Tent at the Symphony, as well as at the Flint Hills Art Fest in El Dorado.

Changing focus on events may slow recovery

Across the country, domestic violence shelters provide a safe harbor for women and children fleeing terrifying predicaments and abusive relationships. However, research at the University of Kansas shows that survivors' overall recoveries may be impeded when they are forced to "box" themselves into certain narratives in order to receive assistance.

Adrienne Kunkel, a professor of communication studies, found survivors' stories could shift several times while navigating the constraining labyrinth that exists to rescue and serve them. This may slow the emotional healing process, which is linked to having people portray their individual struggles as personal narratives.

Kunkel has spent several years as a volunteer and advocate at a women's domestic violence shelter, collecting data on employees and survivors. Analysis of 28 interviews with women who stayed at the shelter shows that a survivor must accommodate her story of abuse relative to who is listening. That story varies depending on whether she is calling 911, seeking help from a crisis hotline, asking for shelter, obtaining a protection from abuse

order, seeking housing or providing proof that she is fit to parent.

"It's not that they aren't telling the truth. It is just that they are in a position, depending on the audience, to have to tell their stories in different ways to acquire the particular resources they need," Kunkel said.

Kunkel, along with Suzy D'Enbeau, assistant professor of communication studies at Kent State University, and Jennifer Guthrie, one of Kunkel's former graduate students who is now an assistant professor of communication studies at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas, is working on a research program that examines the empowerment and disempowerment processes associated with domestic violence centers and with survivors sharing their narratives to center staff. Led by Kunkel, the team will present on the topic throughout the year.

As a volunteer, Kunkel observed advocates coaching women to share their experiences and stories in such a way so criteria could be met to receive assistance such as housing or an extension at the shelter. Unfortunately, this coaching process can marginalize the survivor's

perspective and her role in her own recovery.

For Kunkel, this coaching contradicted the organization's mission of empowering the survivor to represent herself and make choices to improve her own life.

"Throughout the training, we were told again and again, trust the survivor. It is her story, her lived experience, and we are there to listen and be supportive," Kunkel said. "Yet there is a lot of coaching that goes on and changing of what might have actually happened."

For example, Kunkel points to a series of questions that volunteers and staff ask when women seeking shelter call the crisis hotline. A woman who may be scared of her abuser, but in a safe location, may not meet the checklist for staying at the shelter. However, if the woman says she feels endangered, that could be enough to receive refuge.

"They have to change the way they construct their story just to get into the shelter, but really it goes even beyond that," Kunkel said.

While it's beneficial in that survivors receive the resources they need to move past abusive relationships, Kunkel claims that requiring

survivors to adapt and fragment their stories can be detrimental to processing their experiences and reaping the subsequent mental and emotional health benefits.

"The stories are getting told in so many different ways, you don't actually know what the real story is anymore. Part of that is just life. But when survivors tell their full, unedited story, they actually get a chance to heal and make sense of the potential trauma they have endured," she said.

Kunkel's work on survivors' narratives is just one of several research areas she has explored since volunteering at the women's shelter.

In 2013, with D'Enbeau, she published an article in the Journal of Applied Communication Research that identified the paradoxes of a domestic violence center, which

espoused empowerment for survivors but whose policies actually hamstrung them and the staff that tried fervently to assist them. They also studied the shelter employees, who work long hours, receive low wages, experience burnout and have high turnover rates.

In addition, she is working on a first-person account of what it is like to deal with the support dilemmas and dialectical tensions faced when volunteering at a domestic violence shelter as a feminist scholar and professor of communication and gender studies.

At the heart of Kunkel's research is studying ways for survivors to use social support networks to break out of the cycle of violence. Kunkel would like to see an environment where survivors can fully and accurately express their experiences and feelings without jeopardizing their chance of receiving assistance. Kunkel hopes to share her findings with domestic violence centers across the country so that they may then best help the survivors they serve.

Government as innovator? You bet!

Both government and industry are needed to solve big problems. Collaboration puts us in a stronger competitive position than either sector acting alone.

Five years ago, the federal government spent \$169 billion to fund basic research and development. This fiscal year, it's down to \$134 billion.

People who believe in public belt-tightening applaud drops like that. I understand why: there are many reasons to reduce government spending. But in this case they're wrong. We need to boost the government's investment in research, not slash it.

Let's begin with the federal government's record, which is nothing short of impressive. The bar codes that revolutionized inventory control and tracking were developed with a grant from the National Science Foundation. Google's founders depended on government grants for their early research into search algorithms. Computer touch-screens, computer-aided design, global positioning system navigation, voice-activated "virtual assistants," the Internet - all based on government research or funds. So were key advancements in agriculture (including the "easy-care cotton" you'll find in your permanent-press slacks), the horizontal drilling techniques that have turned the U.S. into a natural-gas powerhouse, and many life-saving pharmaceuticals.

The plain truth is that much of the research that catalyzes and accelerates technological advance is too risky, too slow to pay off, or too expensive for the private sector to undertake. "Today, the scope, duration and cost of breakthrough research is either beyond the private sector's corporate and philanthropic resources or outside its profit model," wrote Teresa Tritch in the *New York Times* last year.

There is no question that there will be waste in research and development, just as private corporations sometimes veer onto the wrong track. All you need do is think back to 2012 and the scandal surrounding Solyndra, the Silicon Valley-based solar panel manufacturer that collapsed, leaving taxpayers on the hook for \$535 million in federal loan guarantees.

Oponents of public spending often seize on cases like this to make their point - conveniently forgetting that Apple, too, benefited not just from the government research that created many of the technologies it uses, but from early support from the Small Business Investment Company program.

The point is not that government investment in research and development is better or worse than private-sector investment, but that collaboration between government and industry puts us in a stronger position competitively than either sector acting alone. Both are needed to solve big problems.

Which is why the cuts we're seeing in federal research and development spending are so alarming. We're already down to a level of funding last seen over a decade ago, and a study last year by the American Association for the Advancement of Science sees some \$53 billion in federal research investment at risk if the sequester remains in place for another three years.

We live in an era of pervasive anti-government sentiment. There is no question, as I have argued many times before, that both Congress and the executive branch need to improve their game and learn how to become more effective and less wasteful of both time and money. But the importance of federal spending on research and development is undeniable. At a time when we as a nation face mounting economic challenges and a raft of eager business competitors, cutting investment in research, rather than expanding it, is foolhardy.

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Police chief warns of scams

To the Editor

I still remember the first time I found one of the old Publisher's Clearinghouse prize letters in my mailbox. I ran excitedly to my dad and showed him the part that described how we would soon be millionaires. My dad patiently pointed to the small print indicating we had in fact only been entered in a drawing amongst millions of other people. Then, he gave me what has probably been the most useful life advice I've ever received: "If it seems too good to be true, it probably is."

That advice has proven itself true many times over throughout my life, and I think it sums up the best way to protect oneself from fraud. I've noticed a marked increase in the number of frauds that the Goodland Police Department has dealt with recently. In some of the cases, someone has called the victim pretending to be their grandchild. They've advised that they are in jail and need "grandma" to send money to bail them out. Another new scam involves someone calling and saying they are (ironically) from Publisher's Clearinghouse. They make references to the person's house and try to get details about when they

will be home. They will sometimes mention the color of the person's house or car, so as to appear legitimate. This information is, in fact, something they obtained from the internet.

Other scams typically involve the person claiming that the victim has won an award. They tell the victim that they need to send a "processing fee" before their prize can be sent out. The victim usually sends in the "processing fee," and never hears from the bad guy again.

The scams constantly change, and there is no way to always stay abreast of the latest scam. If you want to avoid being the victim of a scam artist, I would repeat the advice my father gave to me long ago: "If it seems too good to be true, it probably is." Don't be too anxious to believe you've won something. Trust your instincts. If you don't think someone is legitimate, take

down their contact information and do some research before you call them back. A legitimate person should never have a problem with you taking a little time to check their credentials.

Finally, remember that there is nothing wrong with being a little suspicious. The people who perpetrate these heinous crimes know that people are generally very trusting. That is a positive trait, but these criminals prey on that. They don't care who they hurt.

If you do fall victim to one of these scams, be sure to report it to law enforcement as soon as possible. Once someone has your personal information, they can victimize you over and over. They can take out credit cards in your name, steal your tax return money, and many other things. If you file a report with law enforcement, we can help you start to pick up the pieces and make sure that you don't get victimized again.

Making sense of truck regulations

Once again farmers and ranchers are scratching their heads about how the new CDL (commercial driver's license) regulations will impact them when they transport livestock and crops to market.

Kansas transportation regulations already impose an extensive array of documentation, testing, certification, inspection and record keeping on the trucking industry. These regulations are further complicated when farmers and stockmen operate their vehicles across state lines where other states may have different rules than Kansas.

Agricultural producers received help in July 2012 with the announcement of expanded exemptions from federal and state rules, says Mike Irvin, legislative counsel for Kansas Farm Bureau.

"Farmers and ranchers may be exempt from the requirements of commercial driver's

license drug testing, physical examination or hours of service regulations if their farm vehicles meet certain criteria," Irvin says.

First, the vehicles must be operated by a farm or ranch owner, an employee or family member of the farmer.

Second, the vehicles must be used to transport agricultural products, machinery or supplies from a farm.

Third, farm or ranch vehicles cannot be operated for hire (hauling for others for compensation).

Fourth, vehicles of 26,000 pounds or less

can be operated anywhere in the United States.

Finally, farm or ranch vehicles, between 26,000 and 80,000 pounds can operate in Kansas and may also operate across state lines within 150 air miles of the farm or ranch.

All CDL holders must apply for medical self-certification with the Department of Revenue Driver's License Agency when they receive, renew, upgrade or transfer their license no later than Jan. 30 of each year, Irvin says.

Unfortunately, the manner, time, implications and consequences of these proposals have made it difficult for farmers and ranchers to fully understand and participate.

"We believe extension of the certification process will help alleviate some of the fears farmers and ranchers are having over these requirements," Irvin says.
