Sebaaly said he is still acquainting himself with all the programs offered at the college.

"I can't talk enough abut how great the programs are here," he said, singling out the communications technology and cosmetology programs.

Marlin Dwight "Moe" Eberhart

Conservation Service and farmer, died Friday, April 25, 2014, at Kit Carson County Memorial Hospital in Burlington after a long fight with Parkinson's Disease.

He was born on Jan. 3, 1930, to Lena (Lampe) and Rudolph Eberhart in St. Francis. He attended grade school at the

Northrup Center County School near St. Francis until the family moved to a farm southeast of Burlington, where he went to the Smokey Hill School.

In 1944 he started Burlington High School as a freshman where he became known as "Moe." He was active in the high school clubs, activities and sports. Mr. Eberhart played on the state championship teams in football in 1947 and basketball in 1948. He graduated in 1948. It was also during this time that he became a pilot, logging 40 hours on a student license by graduating and owning a 1947 Cessna. He flew with three other senior boys, Stub Dixon, Don Pavel and

After graduation he began farming with his father and uncle Ted

On March 19, 1950, he and Darlene Donner from Kanorado were married. They married at the Burlington United Methodist Church and were married for 64 years. The couple were lifelong members of

The couple bought a place near the Kansas border and adopted two baby boys. They retired from farming in 1975 and moved to Burlington. While living in town Mr. Eberhart grew a sizable vegetable

In 2007 a back injury from a fall at home began his health battle with Parkinson's Disease. He was in rehab from then on in Goodland and finally in Burlington's Grace

Preceding him in death were his parents and two brothers, Dale Eberhart and Jerry Eberhart.

Survivors include his wife of the home; sons Philip (Valerie) Eberhart of Centennial, Colo., and Larry (Lori) Eberhart of Salida, Colo.; a sister Ruth (Russ) Wilcox of Burlington; six grandchildren; five great-grandchildren.

Weather delays tomato planting

Master Gardener vkmelia@yahoo.com Gardeners generally despise those late spring cold snaps that seem to make a mockery of the sometimes stilted planting plans we have been making since early February. It's May, for crying out loud! It's time to plant! Every gardener knows that! And then another period of "sub-May" temperatures and heavy winds passes through and I find myself struggling to keep those beautiful tomato plants warm for a while longer.

The last time we visited at length about tomatoes in the garden was early March when we were discussing the project of growing some of our own tomato transplants, and that it was important to get them started at the proper time so that they would be the right size when it came time to plant them outside. My proposed planting date was May 1. As I sit here with pen in hand and great expectations on my mind, I suddenly realize that May 1 was yesterday! But you know what? It will likely be the middle of next week before I actually plant them outside.

The main reason for the delay is that soil temperatures must get back up after taking a nose dive during the cold and windy final week of April. And lets face it. My average last frost date is May 6th so maybe I shouldn't be in too big of a

hurry anyway. However, my home grown plants are really growing and seem to beg for a less crowded environment outside. So, adding and subtracting the good and the bad, and with a quick admonishment to the weather man, those transplants are going outside before May 8th, barring some kind of stupid May blizzard, which is certainly within possibility.

For the past several years, I have preached loudly about how I felt it was important to set out tomato plants a little earlier than we have in past years. The earlier you plant them in the garden, the earlier you will pick a tomato. The season for picking tomatoes is much too short in this area anyway, But if we can safely put the plants outside sooner, then the picking season will be longer.

In order to plant them a little earlier, you must have a plan to protect the plants from a late frost. If you do not have a plan, then

you must wait until later, which results in a shorter harvest season.

Last year, I set out my plants on May 12, later than I planned. I picked my first tomato, a Northern Exposure, on July 16. My first killing frost last fall came on October 16. My harvest season therefore lasted 90 days. I doubt that you can expect a much longer harvest season in this area. If you plant later, you pick later. If you plant earlier, you risk a freeze.

My plan to protect the early planted fragile plants is to utilize five foot high wire cages, with the bottom two feet securely covered with black plastic. If a frost threatens, I'll drop a page of newspaper inside the cage, on top of the plant, and they're

A victory for open government

Backers of open government achieved a milestone victory last week as the Kansas Legislature approved a compromise bill to open up affidavits filed to obtain arrest and search warrants, making Kansas the last state to make these public.

The bill had passed the House, but bogged down in the Senate over amendments that had nothing to do with these affidavits. In the time between the end of the regular session and the wrapup "veto" session, however, supporters got together with the state's prosecutors and came up with a compromise.

With backing from Speaker Ray Merrick, this version was adopted by a conference committee, then passed with Senate 40-0 and the House 123-1. It's not perfect; provisions allow prosecutors and defense attorneys to delay release as long as 10 days by asking for "redaction" of sensitive information such as Social Security and driver's license numbers, phone numbers and addresses and some police secrets. They can even ask the judge to seal the records for good.

However, the change represents a quantum step forward for Kansas, which had been the only state not to make these documents public. In federal court, for instance, they routinely posted in online files available to any user of the court's computer system. These sometimes make fascinating reading.

Prosecutors had opposed opening up the records, at least partly because they feared it could produce more pretrial publicity which might be endangering a defendant's right to a fair trial. Backers pointed out that wasn't likely, since Kansas has never had a defendant released because of pretrial publicity.

Another argument was it would be a burden on the attorneys to go through every affidavit to seek redaction of specific items, but there's no requirement that either side do so.

A 10-day delay is less than perfect, but it's something people will have to put up with for now. Given some experience with the new law, it might be possible to cut that time down later.

For now, it'll be possible for any citizen to get to the bottom of why someone was arrested or why a house was searched. That would have come in handy for the Kansas City-area family who wound up being held at gunpoint while drug agents ransacked their house.

After a year and thousands in legal fees, they found out it happened because they had bought supplies for their son to grow tomatoes in the basement. The cops thought, after searching their trash and finding wet tea leaves, that the couple was growing marijuana.

One real benefit for the public will be a source of honest, factual information about crimes major and minor, to replace the current flow of rumors. Prosecutors and defense attorneys will be able to turn questioners to this source and avoid making any comments, as court rules require.

Otherwise, in Kansas, it's sometimes six months to a year before citizens' legitimate questions about a crime can be answered. That's one reason why the Kansas Press Association was a major backer of this bill.

All in all, this law, which now awaits the governor's signature, is a major step forward for open government. – Steve Haynes



EPA rule could shut down agriculture

A proposed rule that would expand the regulatory authority of the Environmental Protection and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers could bring farming and ranching to a halt. Ordinary field work and everyday chores like moving cattle across a wet pasture, planting crops and even harvest may one day require a

EPA published its new proposal in the Federal Register March 25. The Environmental Protection Agency contends its new rule clarifies the scope of the Clean Water Act. In reality it provides more confusion and less clarity for farm and ranch families and could classify most water and some dry land as waters of the United States.

Clean water is important to all of us, but this issue is not about water quality – it's about federal agencies attempting to gain regulatory control over land use by using the claim of clean water.

Throughout this republic's history, Congress, not federal agencies, has written the laws of the land. Two Supreme Court rulings have waters of the United States. The new regulatory affirmed the federal government is limited to proposals could do exactly that.

regulating navigable waters. EPA's recent proposal sends conflicting messages and would extend the agency's reach.

Farmers and ranchers are straight-forward people who believe words mean something. Agricultural producers believe the authors (Congress) of the Clean Water Act included the term navigable for a reason.

Is a small ditch navigable?

Is a stock pond navigable?

Ever see any maritime barges trying to navigate a southwestern Kansas gully during a toad strangler?

Because a farmer's field, a homeowner's lawn or a playground collects water after a rain does not mean they should be regulated under

What about the EPA claims that agricultural exemptions currently provided under the federal Clean Water Act should relieve farmer and ranchers of any need to worry about the proposed rule?

Exemptions provided in the act are mostly

limited to plowing and earth moving activities

They do not apply to farm and ranch tasks like building a fence across a ditch, applying fertilizers or other forms of pest and weed control. If EPA's proposed rule becomes law, many farming practices would require government

approval through a complex process of federa permitting. EPA's so-called exemptions will not protect farmers and ranchers from the proposed waters rule. If farmlands are regulated as waters farming and ranching will be difficult, if no

with restrictions for lawns, car washing, pools. An emergency can include watering bans, rationing and the city can even put on a surcharge for water usage.

These levels are set by the city commission and remain in place until they are rescinded.

The city isn't the only entity concerned by the lack of moisture. The Sherman County Commissioners

issued a burn ban Monday, which remains in effect until further notice.

Despite several days this spring with large, hailproducing thunderstorms across northwest Kansas, most of the moisture seems to have missed the Goodland area. Since Jan. 1, the area has received 1.79 inches of precipitation, 2.27 inches below the normal for this time in the year.
