people get rid of tree branches and other storm debris, the Sherman County Landfill has returned to its regular hours.

There were plenty of branches, large and small, to take to the landfill after three weeks of high winds, thunderstorms and hail.

Regular landfill hours – which were altered by the commissioners in May – are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8 a.m. to 6 week of June 9.

The Sherman County Commissioners discussed the landfill at their meeting Tuesday, wanting to know how the extra hours two weeks ago worked out and whether more extra hours would be needed.

The commissioners called supervisor Mark Felzien, who said that many people took advantage of the extra hours, and some people even continued to come after the hours had

missioners had extended the hours during the were on hand installing the new baler, and were able to help

Felzien said he thought most people were caught up with the branches brought down by recent storms, and added that the city is doing much of the hauling. He recommended that the landfill remain at its normal hours.

In other business, the commissioners:

• Met with Roberta Pianalto about an upcoming event. Roberta said she is part of an effort by the Western Child Advocacy Center,

which asked 100 women to raise \$1,000 each for the organization. She said she wants to do a dance at the Gulick Park tennis courts on July 3, but she was told by the city that part of the park is actually county property and is only maintained by the city, so she came to the commissioners for approval.

Sheriff Burton Pianalto said the Western Child Advocacy Center is an invaluable tool. The organization helps conduct forensic in-

Accidents around area claim one life

Traffic accidents in Northwest Kansas claimed the life of a Winona man Wednesday as he drove across a set of railroad tracks, and sent a Colorado on K-25, behind a 2013 Ford Explorer, the patrol woman to the hospital after she rear-ended a car at a construction zone.

Adam Meska, 29, crossed the tracks at Front Street and U.S. 40 in Page City at 4:40 p.m., according the Kansas Highway Patrol. He headed south, and an eastbound train struck the 2009 Dodge Ram he was driving, apparently killing Meska at the scene, since he was not taken to a hospital. State races show some similarities

Kansas and Virginia?

Is there any relationship between the coastal state where voters in the Republican primary last week rose up to smite their party's No. 2 leader in the House of Representatives, and the plains state where a virtually unknown Leawood radiologist is running against a venerable three-term incumbent U.S. senator?

Only time will tell, but the halls of the Statehouse echoed the talk last week, as reported by the Associated Press, after House Majority Leader Eric Cantor lost a Republican primary to retain

Supporters of Kansas "tea party" candidate Milton Wolf were cheered by the victory in Virginia of a largely unknown, poorly financed challenger against a top Republican leader. Roberts' backers say things are different here, however.

In Washington, Rep. Cantor was widely seen as the next speaker of the House, with Rep. John Boehner of Ohio expected to step down next year. Now, he'll likely be out of a job – and Mr. Boehner may be stuck with his.

Opponents labeled Mr. Cantor as a Washington insider who'd grown out of touch with his nearby district. His support for a compromise on immigration reform, though widely seen as necessary for the party, may have cost him at home.

Sen. Roberts' campaign says that's not him. After 18 years in the Senate and 16 before that in the House, representing the 1st District of western Kansas, they say he hasn't forgotten who sent him to Washington. He's opposed any "amnesty" for illegal immigrants, played to his conservative base and has support from groups such as the Kansas State Rifle Association and Right to

He has solid backing from farm groups after years of helping craft the "Farm Bill" and serving as chair of the House Agriculture Committee and, later, the Senate Intelligence Oversight

Dr. Wolf has been running since October, however. He attacks Sen. Roberts for owning a home in Virginia while listing a rented room in Dodge City as his residence for voting purposes. The challenger claims Roberts really lives in the Washington area and seldom comes "home." In fact, he's worked in Washington since 1967, when he became an aide to Sen. Frank Carlson, later serving Rep. Keith Sebelius of Norton.

A solid record, yes, but there are many who may vote for Mr. Wolf. We've heard more than one person say on the streets of western Kansas that Mr. Roberts has been there "long enough." His visits out here have not been that frequent.

If money means anything, Sen. Roberts should have a big edge. The AP reported he has \$2.25 million to spend compared to \$278,000 for Dr. Wolf. Money meant little in Virginia, but observers point out that only 65,000 people voted in that race and five times as many are expected in Kansas, maybe more, making it harder for a determined minority to score a coup.

The senator says he's never taken his race for granted. "In the first place, I'm not Cantor," he told the Associated Press.

"This is not going to happen in Kansas."

In fact, he says he's pumped by the prospect of Republicans taking back control of the Senate.

The night of Aug. 5, we expect the veteran will come out on top, in line for a committee chairmanship, but he'll get a scare. However, at this point, anything's possible. – Steve Haynes

The two sides of science

I was unhappy. The new state-of-the-art molecular biology lab building had just opened last year at one of China's premier universities. I attended one of the first presentations in that immaculate room. There was just one new high definition projector beaming the speaker's programmed slides on a huge white screen – and nothing more. No black board with chalk. No white board with markers. Not even an "elmo" platform that projects your handwriting on the screen. And that was the problem.

"So you don't want Nobel Prizes?" I asked the chair, after the students were gone and we were walking down the hall. That was definitely impolite, even if my Chinese hosts are very courteous toward guests.

"The PowerPoint is fine for reviewing past science, but how are you going to engage students in questioning and pursuing future avenues of research? No one gets Nobels for knowing what is already in textbooks. You get Nobels for asking new questions and finding new techniques, and that takes brainstorming - on the board," I continued.

That graduate research building had just opened and it only had one lecture room. The rest of the facility was laboratories arranged in suites of 2-4 labs around each researcher's office, and there were four wings and four stories – over 30 empty lab facilities waiting to be filled.

So this year, when I had the opportunity to visit that molecular biology research lab, my first question was: did they add boards? Three-fourths of the labs are now occupied.

And although it was a Sunday, most labs had students and professors hard at work. Thanks to the labs having glass windows to the hallway, I could easily walk the building, all 4 wings, top to bottom, and view it all. Every lab had a large white board with a holder full of markers to the side. It was obvious from the smears left by markers (I still prefer chalk), that these boards were heavily used. And indeed, as I passed by one laboratory, the professor and students were gathered around the board arguing over some lab dilemma. I could not hear if it was a technical problem or change in procedure or a new direction when results are unexpected. But it was science and it was not in the textbook or cookbook lab manual.

There are two sides to the science coin. Part of science is what is already known. Students can memorize that from the textbook, although it does not guarantee they know what it means. The other half of science is the questioning skills to search beyond what is known. Chinese students are great at memorizing the textbook science - what is known. They memorize in order to score high on that single critical endof-high school gao kao test.

But it has been the unique strength of the American classroom that our science teachers ask students to read, and then think, compare

and question. Is there another way to interpret that graph? How could we discover the cause. How can we measure it? We attempt to train our students in questioning and analysis - an experience that until recently, Chinese students never had.

But Chinese students have come to the United States by the hundreds of thousands and have experienced that questioning in their masters and doctoral research here. Large numbers have now gone back to become the science professors in their new universities. And many are now standing with their students at those boards, markers in hand, figuring out the questions and methods to answer new problems. Because their students have three times the science content knowledge under their belts as American students, this bodes well for future science breakthroughs here. And to be really effective, introducing this second aspect of science – this questioning – needs to begin across China in their K-12 classrooms. And that has barely begun. But China is on the right track.

Meanwhile, back in the United States, no less than 10 states are now basing teacher evaluation on students' test scores. That is continuing the NCLB tyranny that forces teachers to replace open questioning, labs and field work with teach-to-the-test drill work. Along with our continued anemic coverage of science under the Next Generation non-standards, we are decimating our science education.

China is going the right direction. A direction many schools in America are abandoning.

Kansas State expert has tips on poison ivy

"leaves of three, let it be" when it comes to detecting poison ivy. Kansas State University horticulturists say it is a bit more complicated than that.

"The leaves of poison ivy can have a smooth edge or a coarsely toothed edge, or even a lobed edge, said Ward Upham, university extension agent in horticulture. "There are many different forms the leaves can take, so you need to look at other aspects of the plant."

Poison ivy also grows in many different forms. You can find it covering the ground, in a shrub or climbing up a tree.

Charlie Barden, Kansas State University forestry extension specialist, says poison ivy is often confused with other plants like Virginia creeper, fragrant sumac and box elder. He says there are three key

- The middle leaf of the poison ivy plant is on a longer stem than the other two leaves.
- The two outside leaves are attached directly to the main stem.
- The branch holding the poison ivy is brown, not green.

More than 90 percent of people are allergic to poison ivy, and it often takes 10 to 12 hours before the symptoms show.

"A poison ivy rash is different from a bug bite because it will start out just being red and irritated and then blisters will actually raise up," Barden said. "People say those blisters will spread and believe they are spreading the oil, but the spreading is just because it takes awhile for the reaction to occur."


The team's next meet will be in Colby on Saturday.




