Former resident found dead

A former Goodland resident was found dead in a canal in Arizona on Wednesday.

The Arizona Republic reported last week that a body was found by a bike rider in the Arizona Canal Wednesday morning just outside the city limits of Peoria, Ariz., a suburb of Phoenix. The body was pulled from the water and later identified as Rolland Lee Tockey, 35. Maricopa County Sheriff's Office spokesman Lt. Brandon Jones said the department believes the death to be a homicide, and the investigation is ongoing.

Tockey had been in custody in Maricopa County until Aug. 16, after pleading guilty to one count of disorderly conduct. Among his numerous other convictions was a 16-year prison sentence in Alabama for sexual assault.

Tockey spent several years living and working as a contractor in Goodland, where he had numerous run-ins with law enforcement. According to records published in the Goodland Star-News, in 2010

he was arrested on a warrant from Alabama and had several parking offenses. In August of that year he was arrested by a sheriff's deputy for driving while suspended, two counts of obstruction, attempting to flee and elude law enforcement, bribery, kidnapping and assault on law enforcement officer.

In June of 2010, Tockey called 911 to report the mobile home he rented was on fire. The mobile home was heavily damaged, and Tockey had to break a window to escape. He was treated for minor smoke inhalation on scene by emergency medical technicians. The Kansas Fire Marshal's Office determined the fire was accidental.

In 2011, he was arrested by a sheriff's deputy on a warrant for criminal threats, criminal restraint and driving while suspended, and later that year he was arrested again on a hold for the Kansas Department of Corrections.

Last year, he was arrested by the Goodland police for driving while suspended or revoked.

County updated on pheasant hunt

The Sherman County Commissioners met with Convention and Visitors Bureau Director Donna Price and Carol McClure, who will be organizing the Governor's Ringneck Classic pheasant hunt, at their regular meeting last Tuesday.

The hunt rotates between several northwest Kansas communities, and will take place in Sherman County next year. Price said the Ringneck Classic Board oversees the events, with some involvement from the Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism.

McClure explained the schedule from last year's Norton hunt. On Thursday was registration, trap and clay shooting and a light reception. On Friday was a sporting clay tournament, lunch, a meet and greet for hunters and guides, and the concert, dinner and auction in the evening. On Saturday was the hunt itself and then an awards dinner in the evening. Some people stay Sunday to hunt more, she said.

"We'll change a few things," she said.

McClure said she is planning to sit down with the school district to see if the event could be held at the Max Jones Fieldhouse.

Klemm said the county would support their efforts, and suggested that there is an opportunity to tie in with economic development.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Appointed Karen Weber to the Convention and Visitors Bureau board. There were two vacancies on the board. Branda said they would come back with another name to fill the second.

- Received a report from County Health Department Director Donna Terry, who said the department has increased the childcare licensing fees. The department handles licensing for childcare facilities for six counties.

The department is the recipient of several state and federal grants,

## Norbert "Norb" Bussen

Lifelong Logan County and Wallace County resident Norbert "Norb" Bussen, 91, passed away Thursday, August 21, 2014, at Logan County Manor in Oakley, Kansas.

He was born July 25, 1923, near Tipton, Kansas, the son and fourth child of nine, of Barbara M. (Fueser) and Theodore J. Bussen. When Norb was three years old, the family moved to a farm one mile southeast of Wallace, Kansas, when his dad became the manager of a grain elevator at Wallace. He attended first grade at the Wallace Grade School. They later moved to a farm just over into Logan County, and Norb attended Gill School through the eighth grade.

He served his country in the United States Navy during World War II, completing basic training at Great Lakes, Illinois, and serving aboard the destroyer 'Hillery P. Jones, D.D.427' as a machinist mate. He and his shipmates were able to watch from a distance as President Truman walked up the gangplank onto the 'Missouri' to sign the Peace Treaty on September 6, 1945.

On February 3, 1947, he and Joanne L. Kennedy were married and to this union three sons and eight daughters were born. He was a farmer, rancher, and mechanic. For twenty-five years, he was a school bus mechanic and bus driver for the Winona Schools. He was a member of St. Joseph Catholic Church, Knights of Columbus, and Veterans of Foreign Wars, and was proud to donate blood to the Red Cross. Hunting, fishing, especially with his friends, children, and grandchildren, were times he loved. He was well known for raising watermelons and potatoes that he sold to the public, and he almost always planted rows of zinnias wherever they lived. Norb and Joanne raised pheasants and released them into the wild, when they lived on a farm south of Monument.

Norb suffered from Parkinson's Disease and moved into the Logan County Manor in September of 2006, and Joanne moved there to be with him in the spring of 2009.

Preceding him in death were his wife Joanne; two sons Michael James and Daniel Joseph;

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# Agricultural history goes online

A team of Kansas State University librarians has received its second Project Ceres contract to digitize more than 70 years of Kansas agricultural history.

The contract, worth more than \$7,000, allows the team to digitize and preserve important Kansas youth-in-agriculture, agricultural education and rural life publications. Titles include Kansas 4-H Journal, 1955-1988; Kansas Future Farmer, 1929-1979; and five additional newsletters and magazines.

In 2013, K-State Librarians received a \$3,125 Project Ceres contract to digitize issues of Kansas Farmer from 1863 to 1954. That digitization process will be completed this year and available online by early 2015. Kansas Farmer documents changes in farm practices, livestock management and other aspects of rural life such as cooking and foodways.

"The work our librarians are doing will ensure that students, historians and agricultural researchers will have access to generations of farming knowledge and culture," said Lori Goetsch, dean of K-State Libraries. "The online collection will be freely available for anyone to search. The collections have academic applications, and they could also be of interest to the region's farmers, casual genealogists and the general public."

Project Ceres funding is provided through collaboration among the U.S. Agricultural Information Network, the Agriculture Network Information Collaborative and the Center for Research Libraries. The project's mission is to support initiatives that preserve print materials essential to the study of the history of agriculture and make those materials accessible online.

The digitized publications will be available through Kansas State University's institutional repository, Kansas State Research Exchange, or K-REx, at <http://k-state.edu>. They will also be accessible through the Agriculture Network Information Collaborative catalog. The Kansas State librarians working on the project include Diana Farmer, content development librarian; Amanda Harlan, metadata librarian; Linda Marston, digital collections coordinator; Livia Olsen, faculty/graduate services librarian; Beth Turtle, scholarly communications librarian; and Michelle Turvey-Welch, head, metadata/preservation.

# Wild horse, burro adoptions planned

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management will hold a wild horse and burro adoption Friday and Saturday in Garden City. The two-day event at the Finney County Fairgrounds will feature dozens of adult and yearling horses and burros that once roamed free on public lands.

The bureau periodically removes excess animals from the range in order to maintain healthy herds and to protect other rangeland resources. The adoption program is essential for achieving management goals. This event is free and open to the public.

The adoption schedule runs from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. (Mountain Time) Friday and 7 to 9 a.m. (Mountain Time) Saturday.

Application approval is required and can be done onsite. To qualify to adopt, one must be at least 18, with no record of animal abuse. Adopters must have a minimum of 400 square feet of corral space per animal, with free access to food, water and shelter. A six-foot corral fence is required for adult horses, five feet for yearlings and four and 1/2 feet for burros.

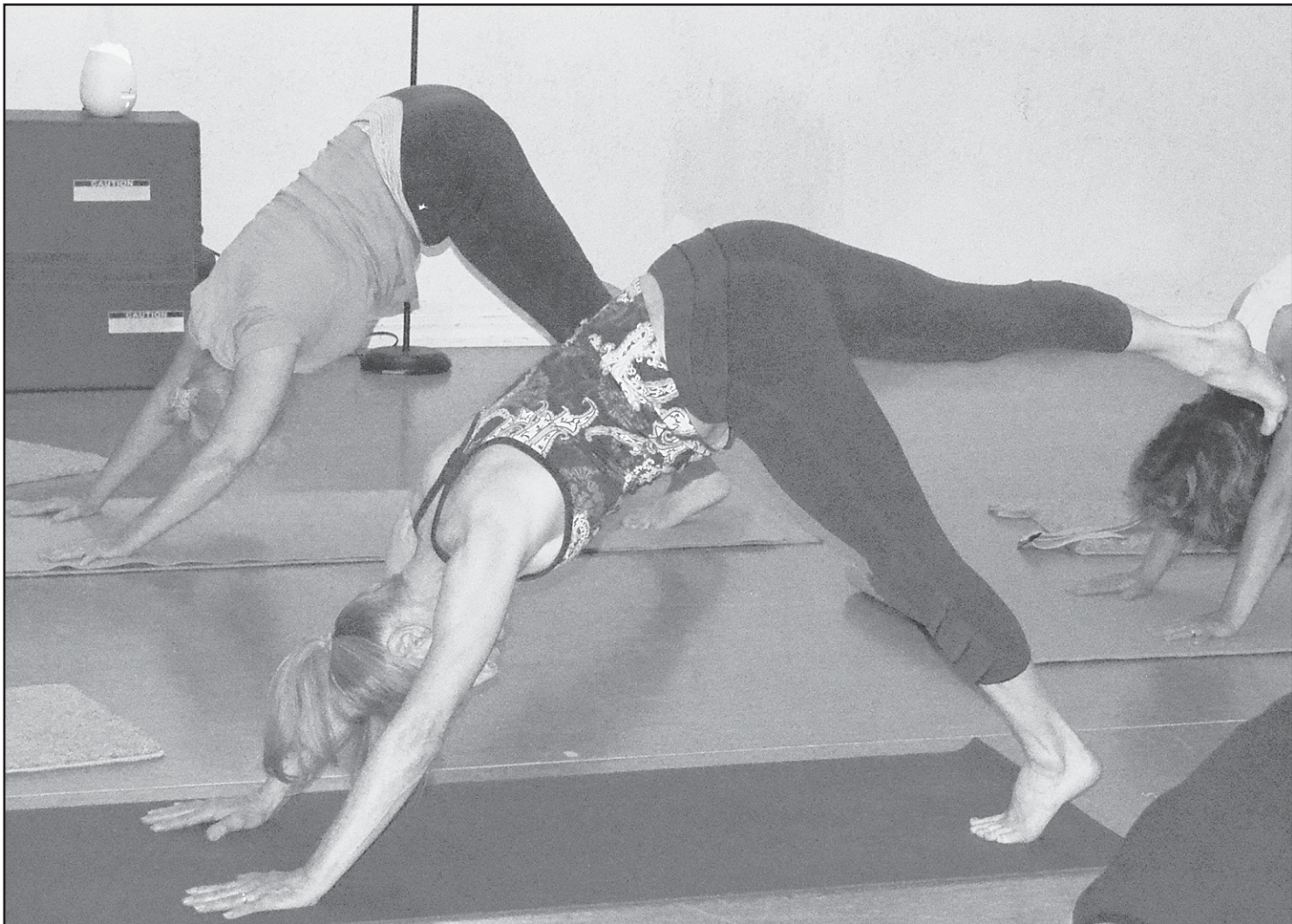
All animals must be loaded in covered stock trailers with swing gates and sturdy walls and floors.

All animals will be offered on a first-come, first-served basis for the minimum adoption fee of \$125, set by law.

**\$500 adoption incentive**  
The bureau pays a one-time \$500 care-and-feeding allowance to adopters of horses at least four years old, paid in full after one year when adopters receive official ownership title. All standard adoption conditions and fees apply. Younger horses, burros and trained animals are not eligible. For information call (866) 468-7826 or go to [www.blm.gov/nm/whb](http://www.blm.gov/nm/whb).

To get to the fair ground at 209 Lake Avenue, go west from U.S. 83-Business (South Main Street) on West Maple to South Ninth Street, then south to facility.

## CIA seems to be a rogue agency

In yet another emerging scary scandal, not well publicized, the CIA recently acknowledged that it “had secretly searched Senate computer files related to an investigation of the agency’s Bush-era harsh interrogation program.” Searched Senate computer files!!! Good grief, that is our own government that they spied on!! Is there nobody safe from spying? Their admission that they had lied for several months when accused of having done so and their apology to the senators to whom they had spied, does not make such acceptable. They readily placed the blame on three lower level technology staff members who, they said, “demonstrated a lack of candor” when doing so. Is there no punishment?

Left out of their “limp” apology is who directed them to spy on the Senate in the first place? Also minimized by existing coverage is the fact that this wasn’t just any group of U.S. Senators that the CIA decided to spy on, it was the Senate Intelligence Committee, charged with overseeing all spying sponsored by our government. In effect, the CIA was spying on its congressional boss.

The loudest complainant, and the one to take to the Senate floor to blast the unruly organization of lifting material from committee computers, was the Senate Intelligence Committee Chairwoman Dianne Feinstein. Six months ago, Feinstein insisted that the CIA removed from committee computers information that cast the agency’s post-9/11 interrogation tactics in a harsh and negative light, this presumably to avoid embarrassment and legal entanglements.

What caused the CIA to spy on its own government was that the Senate was investigating them and about to release its incriminating findings. Despite CIA interference the Committee voted 11-3 to release a 431-page summary of its four-year 6,200 page, \$40 million scathing indictment. Just why the complete document will remain classified, and thus secret, has not been disclosed but it can be assumed that the released version is the sanitized version. As a result the extent of the Bush-era CIA torture practice continues into the Obama-era and CIA misdeeds will not come to light fully until those responsible are safely out of danger of prosecution. With respect to the part that remains classified Committee Chairwoman Dianne Feinstein threatened, “If someone distributed any part of this classified report, they broke the law and should be prosecuted.” Perhaps she should be reminded that secrecy and free government are incompatible.

Maine Senator Angus King, an independent on the Committee, called the practice torture. “I don’t have any doubts on that fact. It’s a pretty hard read. It’s very disappointing.” But he was especially bothered by the amount of inaccurate statements emanating from the CIA that influenced the president and congress for years. He might have included the mainstream media and the falsehoods that will continue for decades in our history textbooks until everything is declassified and scrutinized by historians.

What appears clear is that the CIA used interrogation methods reportedly not approved by the Justice Department, that the agency evaded congressional oversight, and that the agency self-empowered itself as though independent and accountable to only itself. Also, clear is that the extent of its wrongdoing will remain hidden and classified so that no one is punished. This is the sanitized version.

But back to our original concern, apparently the CIA is so brazen that it spies on, and removes evidence from, the Senate Intelligence Committee charged with its oversight. Amazingly this to the point that they too, knowing more than any other organization the power and danger of the way-ward child, participated in keeping a part of the organizations wrong doings secret. One wonders if the U.S. Senate is that independent of the CIA, especially when this organization receives little more than a verbal retribution for spying and lifting evidence on it, an activity that should be criminal.

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## Leadership scams

Twenty years ago, a few colleges and universities had some minor “leadership” programs. Usually based in business schools, students were experienced business folks. Today, public universities across the country are touting “leadership” programs, both majors and minors, to all of their student body.

This is more about recruiting students than actual production of leaders. It misleads some students into thinking there is a fast track to the top. And it defies all logic, striving to produce “all chiefs and no Indians.” (I will be criticized about being politically incorrect but there is no better phrase to capture this insanity.)

The courses in these programs, now often starting the freshman year are generic with no substantial enduring academic content. Textbooks are modeled after the twelve-ideas-of-highly-rich-people genre. The curriculum is mostly an expansion of I’m-okay-you’re-okay feelgoodism.

But the qualities for various vocations are unique. Where is the evidence that an educational leader has the same skills as a factory manager or a colonel in the military? Where is the evidence that you can train in honesty or commonsense or other personality traits. And those facets that are trainable are part of the regular communication and writing and math curricula. But not generic one-size-fits-all “leadership”?

Aside from wasting many students’ money on tuition for a questionable curricula, there are serious down sides to instant-leader programs. And they have harmed higher education and K-12 schooling.

A few long-standing programs actually accept undergraduate students into leadership career paths. You can plan to take coursework to become an educational leader. Nationwide, the August 22 Chronicle of Higher Education reports an increase in higher administrators who did not come up through the ranks as professors themselves.

Administrators who lack any experience as a classroom teacher and researcher promulgate rules and regulations that are at best naive. At worst, they undermine the teaching and research. Having never served as a faculty member on curriculum or promotion committees, they impose procedures that do not work and which undermine faculty morale. And one of their first actions is to develop or expand the leadership curriculum.

At the K-12 level, the result has been disastrous in those states that have sidestepped the requirement to come-up-the-ranks. Since career military can retire after 20 years of service while in their mid-40s, many states have recruited these captains and majors and colonels to become school administrators. This reflects an anti-teacher attitude that somehow military commanders can “shape up our schools.”

Most states still require school administrators to have been teachers and to have experi-

enced students in the classroom before moving into leadership positions. As a former high school teacher, I needed a school administrator who treats teachers as the professionals and provides us with the support we need. Unfortunately, that perspective is being lost as the corporate reformers and “leadership” crowd treat school teachers as assembly line workers.

If pure leadership was a skill separate from the job being done, then we can turn the military-education example around. Why not hire a 20-year veteran teacher to be general? No need to go through boot camp. No need to serve time ascending the ranks or experience what soldiers experience before you are in charge of them.

Most people with common sense – and no leadership training – realize that there are many good reasons generals should come up from the ranks. Otherwise, there would be a lot of lives lost; indeed, in times of war, we have made that mistake.

The real way to train leaders is to train the best folks at the entry level and let time and experience sort those who have the additional skills to lead. In these cases, there may indeed be a few courses that might help those exceptional people.

But the massive recruitment of students across this country into leadership programs is little more than an appeal to ego in order to attract tuition dollars.

Any small child can tell you: when everyone’s special, no one is special.

including grants for daycare licensing, family planning, the Women, Infants, and Children nutrition program and for an immunization action plan.

The department is looking to add a Women, Infants, and Children nutrition program clinic in Wallace County, Terry said, as it would serve people better than asking them to drive to Goodland.

Terry said one of the budget issues she deals with are salaries, which have to be paid out of several line items depending on what the employee is working on. As an example, she said, hours spent on the

Women, Infants, and Children nutrition program are paid for through a grant, but if full-time employees spend fewer hours on that, the county has to make up the difference. The commissioners decided to build in another \$10,000 for salaries to cover that kind of eventuality.

Klemm asked if the department was seeing any illegal immigrants. Terry said the department doesn't necessarily check, as some of the state and federal programs such as the Women, Infants, and Children nutrition program do not require proof of citizenship. Sherman County has so far not had any health issues stemming from illegal immigrants, she said.

# First West Nile case of the year reported

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has announced the first reported case of West Nile virus for 2014. The individual that tested positive is an adult from Republic County.

West Nile virus can be spread to people through bites from infected mosquitoes, but it is not contagious from person to person. Symptoms range from a slight headache and low-grade fever to swelling of the brain or brain tissue and in rare cases, death. People who have had West Nile virus before are considered immune.

The department recommends the

following precautions to protect against West Nile virus:

When you are outdoors, use insect repellent containing an EPA-registered active ingredient on skin and clothing, including DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, or IR3535. Follow the directions on the package.

Many mosquitoes are most active at dusk and dawn. Be sure to use insect repellent and wear long sleeves and pants at these times or consider staying indoors during these hours.

Make sure you have good screens on your windows and doors to keep mosquitoes out.

Get rid of mosquito breeding sites by emptying standing water from flower pots, buckets and barrels. Change the water in pet dishes and replace the water in bird baths weekly. Drill holes in tire swings so water drains out. Keep children's wading pools empty and on their sides when they aren't being used.

West Nile virus cases are most common in the late summer and early fall months. In 2013, there were 92 cases of West Nile virus in Kansas. In addition to tracking cases of human illnesses caused by West Nile virus, the department assesses the potential for West Nile virus

by conducting limited mosquito surveillance, including laboratory testing. At this time, there has not been a positive mosquito sample in Kansas.

Birds are not tested for West Nile virus in Kansas and the department will not be collecting information about dead birds. If you find a dead bird, the department recommends that you wear gloves, place the bird in a plastic bag, and dispose of it in the garbage.

The film recognizes that life is full of challenges, but when 75-year-old Beverly Burns stumbles upon something she initially finds horrific, she determines she has a choice: she can dwell on the tragedy or she can find the comedy.

"Sideshow" has been accepted at the San Francisco Documentary Film Festival, among others. The film highlights a day behind the scenes at the Kobe Bryant rape trial in Eagle, Colo., and the sideshow created by the media and public.

"Proud Alumni," a film precipitated by her

alma mater's refusal to print her and her partner's same-sex wedding announcement, has been shown around the country and received an Award of Excellence from the Berkeley Film and Video Festival.

Her 2002 release, "See What I Got: A Story of Girls, Basketball, Confidence and Courage," documents a year in the life of a program designed to build self-confidence in girls through basketball. It received a runner-up for best documentary award at the Danville International Children's Film Festival.

Schroeder holds a doctorate from Indiana University, where she developed her interest in sport, gender and media and where she shot her first documentary films, "Padanaram: Communal living in the 90s" (1995), and "Sisters of the Earth" (1996).

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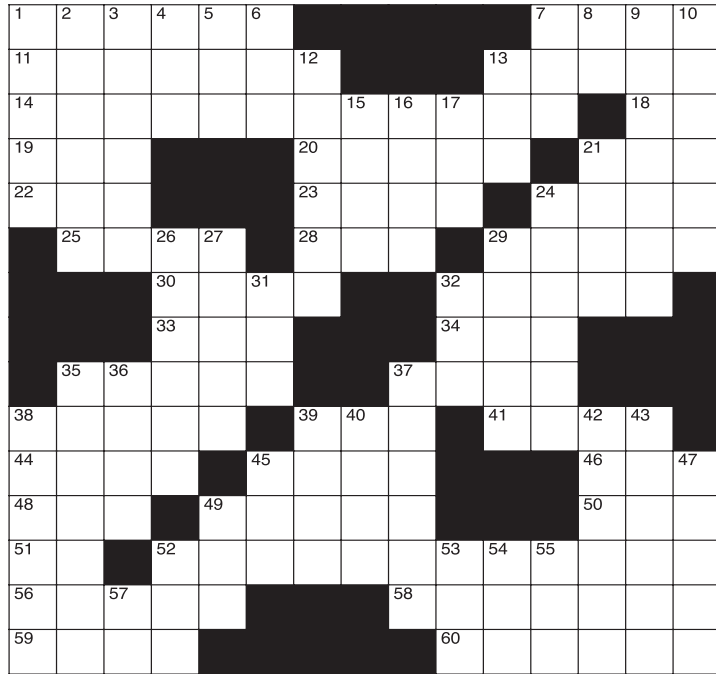
