

Storms drop one inch of rain here

It's been a stormy week for the tri-state area.

The National Weather Service in Goodland is reporting just under one inch of rain since Sunday, mostly falling in the evenings.

Storms on Sunday dropped .02 inches of rain in Goodland, with .12 falling on Monday, .71 on Tuesday and .09 on Wednesday. Goodland is at 13.89 inches for the year, 1.75 inches below the normal for this time of year.

Wednesday afternoon, spotters in Rawlins county reported the Beaver Creek, which also runs through Sherman County, was out of its banks. Flash floods were also reported in Gove, Logan, Sheridan and Graham counties in Kansas and in Yuma County, Colo. In Logan County, a spotter reported 1.8 inches

of rain fell in about 15 minutes. Some small hail was reported in Logan and Yuma counties.

Tuesday's heavier rain filled the retaining pool in Pioneer Park and left standing water and muddy roads in many places around the county. Hail was reported about eight miles south of Goodland. Torrential rainfall dropped visibility to about 50 yards.

On Monday, hail was reported in Wichita and Wallace counties, with golf-ball size hail reported near Weskan. There were also reports of three to four inches of water on county roads between Sharon Springs and the Wichita County line. That area received an estimated two inches of rain in a one-hour period.

Girl's quickbread
business is taking off

Goodland teenager Jade Artzer is finding success in the business world with "Made by Jade," a selection of quickbread mixes.

Artzer, 13, said she has been selling the bread mixes for about a year and a half.

"It started from a 'framily' recipe," she said. "That's friends who are close enough to be family."

There are 13 flavors including beer bread, garlic bread and cream soda bread. Artzer said she is planning a gluten-free line of bread mixes.

After deciding she wanted to begin a college fund, Artzer began selling the mixes at a Christmas craft fair, and got noticed by Anne Meyers from Westport Grill

& Ice Cream Shop. Artzer is now selling the mixes on consignment at Westport and also Designs Unlimited, as well as taking them to the farmers market.

"It does pretty good," she said. "I've had people from Texas come back a couple times to get it."

Meyers and Bill Peterson helped mentor Artzer, helping her learn how to package the mixes and follow the requirements

Artzer got a gold medal at FCCLA nationals last school year for her business portfolio. For that project, she made a business plan that included information on costs, rules, taxes and more.

Recently, Artzer, with help from her mother and a family friend, set up a website for the business: madebyjadeks.com.

Arrest made in murder
of former Goodland resident

An arrest has been made in the murder of former Goodland resident Rolland Tockey.

The Arizona Republic reports that investigators in Maricopa County, Ariz., arrested Nathan Carl Perez, 41, earlier this week, alleging that he shot Tockey at a home in Peoria, Ariz., and then dumped the body in a canal. The body was found Aug. 20 in the canal just outside the city limits.

Tockey had recently spent six months in jail on a domestic assault conviction. The victim in that case had sent a message to Tockey's mother while he was in jail,

saying a "hit" had been put on Tockey.

After an interview with Perez, a witness told authorities Perez said he had "killed a child molester and needed help getting rid of the body" and that there were bloody rags and towels at Perez's house. A search warrant turned up that evidence.

Police also arrested Perez's wife, Billie Jean Perez, for hindering prosecution. She has since been released while Perez's bond was set at \$750,000.

Tockey lived in Goodland for several years prior to 2014, working as a contractor.

Dodge City paper wins awards

July 30, 2014. Indianapolis, Indiana. The American Agricultural Editors Association is announcing its national awards, including the Story of the Year. And the winner is: The High Plains Journal from Dodge City. Today we ll learn about this remarkable publication and its emphasis on quality and innovation.

Tom Taylor is publisher and Holly Martin is editor of the High Plains Journal, which was originally a local newspaper in Dodge City. During World War II, a young Air Force pilot named Joe Berkely came from Chicago to Dodge City to help train French pilots. He met and married a Kansas girl and decided to stay. He bought the Dodge City Journal in 1945. The paper had five employees and only 132 subscribers. Ouch.

Leaders in the community, including the local county extension agent, asked for agricultural coverage in the paper. In response to the community need, Joe included more ag stories and the paper grew. In 1949, the paper was renamed the High Plains Journal.

Tom Taylor grew up at Dodge City, went to Kansas State, and began a career in business. Joe Berkely brought Tom on board as a salesman for the High Plains Journal in 1974.

When I began, we were doing hot typesetting, Tom said. Our photographs were produced in Oklahoma City which took five

days lead time. Now it s all digital. It s a very streamlined process, from computer to plate.

Holly Martin joined the Journal as a reporter after graduating from Kansas State in 1993. Her husband is from the nearby rural community of Bucklin, population 713 people. Now, that s rural. Holly became editor in 2004.

There is great continuity at the High Plains Journal. After Joe Berkely retired, Duane Ross became publisher. After Duane retired, he was succeeded by Tom Taylor.

Tom is the third publisher and I am the third editor that the High Plains Journal has ever had, Holly said. The newspaper continues to embrace new technology and special projects to serve its subscribers.

I don t care if it is delivered through print or producer meetings or online videos, as long as we are providing high quality content to our farmers and ranchers, Holly said. One innovative project is found at www.allaboardharvest.com, which chronicles the annual progression of the wheat harvest. In addition to print, this includes blogging, video, and social media to reach a broad audience.

One couple from New York drove out to Nebraska just to meet a harvest crew. Holly said.

Today the High Plains Journal produces five editions weekly, tailored to the cropping regions which it serves. These different editions serve western Kansas, the southern plains, the western plains, and eastern Kansas. The fifth edition is the Midwest Ag Journal, which serves Iowa, northern Missouri and eastern South Dakota and Nebraska. All told, the publication

reaches all or part of 10 states.

The High Plains Journal now has 75 employees and nearly 50,000 subscribers. Many other newspapers have been cutting back but we ve been able to grow, Holly said.

That is a testament to the high quality employees that we have here, Tom said. We re like a family.

The High Plains Journal has shown that community or niche publications can succeed in today’s tough market, said Gloria Freeland, director of Kansas State University’s Huck Boyd National Center for Community Media. Physical factors affect fertilizer

When using ammonia as a nitrogen source, there are a number of reactions which come into play that will affect ammonia retention in soils, nitrogen response and efficiency. These include chemical reactions, physical factors relating to soil conditions, and how deeply the ammonia is applied. One important question many years in Kansas concerns dry soils. Will a dry soil be able to hold anhydrous ammonia or will some or most of the ammonia be lost shortly after application?

Chemical reactions of ammonia in soil. Ammonia (NH₃) needs to react with water shortly after application in order to convert into ammonium (NH₄⁺), which is the molecule that can adhere to clay and organic matter in the soil. Ammonia is very soluble in water. After it is placed in the soil, NH₃ with water in the soil to form ammonium-N (NH₄⁺), which is retained on the soil cation exchange sites. This process takes a little time – it does not occur immediately upon contact

with the soil. The main controlling factors in the conversion of NH₃ to ammonium-N are soil temperature, soil moisture and soil pH. The higher the soil temperature and the wetter the soil, the more rapid the conversion occurs. If the ammonia does not react with water, it will remain as a gas that could escape from the soil. Also, equilibrium between NH₃ and NH₄⁺ is affected by soil pH. More NH₃ will remain unconverted in the soil longer at higher application rates and at higher soil pH levels.

Physical factors that influence sealing and ammonia loss. Dry soils may be cloddy, with large air spaces where the soil has cracked. Getting the soil sealed properly above the injection slot can also be a problem in dry soils. This can allow the gas to physically escape into the air

before it has a chance to be converted into ammonium. On the other hand wet soils tend to smear, leaving application channels open to the surface and providing a path-


way for ammonia loss also. It is very important to make sure at the time of application that the slot created by the shank is sealed shut and that there is adequate soil moisture present for the NH₃ to be retained in the soil. If the soil is too dry to retain NH₃, or is not sealed well, gaseous NH₃ can escape into the atmosphere and be lost for crop use. At today’s high nitrogen prices, this can quickly become very expensive.

Importance of application depth. The deeper the ammonia is applied, the more likely it is that the ammonia will have moisture to react with, and the easier the sealing. Anhydrous ammonia can be applied to dry soils, as long as the ammonia is applied deep enough to get it in some moisture and the soil is well sealed above the injection slot. If

the soil is either dry and cloddy, or too wet, there may be considerable losses of ammonia within just a few days of application if the soil is not well sealed above the injection slot and/or the injection point is too shallow. A recent study near Topeka found little or no direct ammonia loss in the week after application when ammonia was applied at 5- or 9-inch depths under good soil conditions. However, under wet conditions, losses as high as 15% of the applied nitrogen were seen with shallow application.

Application rate and shank spacing will also have a strong influence on sealing and potential loss. Lower nitrogen rates and application with narrow spacings reduces the concentration of nitrogen at any one delivery point and reduces the risk of loss.

‘Fast and Furious’ back in the news

There is finally a break in the Justice Departments infamous Fast and Furious gunrunning scandal to Mexican drug cartels of hundreds of assault weapons. Under a July 18 court order emanating from the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia, the Department of Justice is now required to produce an index of hundreds of documents sought by Judicial Watch under the Freedom of Information Act. It is required to produce the index, unfortunately not the actual documents, by October 1.

You may recall the refusal of Eric Holder to surrender to the Committee on Oversight and Government Reform, U.S. House of Representatives, thousands of documents in his possession that would bring to light everything known about the supposed scandal which ended in the chief law enforcement officer in the land getting a contempt of Congress citation. The House was left powerless when Holder obtained from President Barack Obama executive privilege freezing the documents from congressional or public view – thus the charge of a cover up.

Until the release of the suppressed documents this is what is known or believed to be true. This administration’s contempt for the Second Amendment to the Constitution is well documented. Previous attempts to get Americans to give up their right to possess firearms have not been successful nor are likely to be.

Seemingly the intent was for the government, through the Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms Administration (ATF), to secretly sell illegal guns to the Mexican drug cartels, and then blame those sales on U.S. gun shows to discredit them. The administration had argued that 90% of the guns used by Mexican drug cartels had come from gun shows in the United States. The ATF gun sales, if undetected, would provide the government rational and support to close down the gun shows making it more difficult for citizens to obtain a firearm. The story is full of government intrigue, lies, conspiracy, and the murder of hundreds of Mexican citizens and an American Border Patrol Agent, Brian Terry.

The transfer of the illegal weapons was done without consulting U.S. law officers outside ATF or the Mexican authorities. The government would have succeeded with the scheme were not some of the illegal firearms found at the scene of murdered Border Patrol Agent Brian Terry, one of which actually the instrument of his death.

What is known about this nearly five-year-old scheme is an e-mail wherein Arizona U.S. Attorney Dennis Burke, charged with executing the “Operation Fast and Furious,” boasted to a colleague of the operation’s propaganda value, presumably to vilify gun shows. It read: “Some of these weapons bought by these clowns in Arizona have been directly traced to murders of elected officials in Mexico by the cartels, so Katie-bar-the-door when we unveil this baby” (“Will Holder’s Watergate Become Obama’s Waterloo?” Americas 1st Freedom, April 2012). They knew precisely what they could do with the propaganda value of their sales – destroy the gun shows.

What has been disclosed reportedly proves that U.S. gun shows were not the source of cartel firepower, as this administration has repeatedly contended, they through their ATF were, and that Holder intentionally lied when he told Congress he had heard about “Fast and Furious” from the media, as did other Americans. “One Justice Department official has claimed his Fifth Amendment rights against self-incrimination and refused to testify,” elevating anticipation that, so far, we may see only the tip of the iceberg.

The Court order requiring Holder’s Justice Department to provide a detailed listing of all documents withheld (Congress believes that number to be 74,000) together with information as to why the material is not being released, is a big step toward bringing to light potentially one of the biggest scandals in American history. This scandal could include evidence planting – the placement of 1,700 guns in cartel hands. Sadly the transparency promised by President Obama had to be delivered in a court order.

Some people have the mistaken idea that farmers and ranchers are harming our environment. You hear it everywhere: at the coffee shop, church, public forums, traveling, even in the grocery.

Children arrive home from school and tell parents about harmful practices farmers use on the land. Everywhere you go today, people are concerned about the food they eat.

Few businesses are as open to public scrutiny as a farm or ranch in the United States. The perches are always full. Others hop around on the ground, cleaning up whatever spills from the feeding frenzy above.

Open the door, and 50 or 70 birds might rise up and flap away. It’s constant, and the cheeping is loud. Loud, I said.

This morning, a pair of jays descended on the feeders. They ignored the thistle tube, realizing it would not hold their relatively huge bodies. One perched sideways on the upright holding the larger feeding tubes, then tried to stretch out to an opening, flapping one wing to steady himself.

It was pretty comical, and I’m not sure that he ever got so much as a seed.

Back by the thistle feeder, however, a gang of juvenile grackles figured out how to get some benefit there. They tried perching, but couldn’t hold on and eat, and besides, their beaks are too big for those dozens of tiny slots.

So, they dropped to the ground and started cleaning up tasty thistle seed dropped by the little guys. It seems to work for both of them.

Then there’s the squirrel living in the woodpile. He shows up every so often and fills his cheeks with seed, running home to stash it away somewhere. Last summer, he tried to get to the feeders for a direct meal, but the ingenious design of the crook holding the tubes kept them just out of his reach. He, too, was pretty entertaining.

This year, though, he’s found he can get his fill along with all the other scavengers on the ground. All in all, everyone seems to be happy with the situation, except me.

I watch all those dozens and dozens of birds flock in, and it makes me nervous. I’ve started to have dreams about them: a war between the big ones and the little ones, then they turn on us when the tubes go empty.

I’m not at all sure how so many of them find the feeders so soon. They must have a pretty sharp intelligence network, because first one and two show up, then a small flock, then more and more and more....

The revolution of foods and food choices on the American table

A term common in food production today, sustainability has been difficult to define. Even so, several major food companies have promised to only use and sell products that are raised in a sustainable manner.

While many definitions of “sustainable” exist, one of the most common definitions used comes from the United Nations. It’s a definition that traces back nearly 30 years and connects social, environmental and economic components.

“In general, (sustainable) means meeting the food and fiber needs of people today without harming the environment,” said Mary Lee Chin, a nutrition educator and consultant, and a registered dietitian, “and, not only meeting these needs for today but into the future, too, so that we protect the environment for future generations.”

Chin, a native of Denver, spoke Aug. 26 at Kansas State University in Manhattan to Kansas State Research and Extension family and consumer science professionals about “The Sustainable American Dinner Plate” and the revolution of foods and food choices on the American dinner table.

She said along with protecting the environment, being sustainable means taking the needs of producers and consumers of food into account.

“Another factor involves the people who produce the food, that they produce it in a manner they can make a living wage,” Chin said. “Then going along the food production line, it also means that the food that is produced so it is affordable

for people as well.”

In addition to addressing the challenge of defining sustainability, Chin also discussed food labeling and nutrition, and how to meet the nutrition needs of a world population that is expected to reach 9 billion by 2050, among other production agriculture challenges.

Food labeling and nutrition

While foods might bear many labels, not all of the labels are standardized or regulated, Chin said. This can lead to confusion among consumers.

“If something is labeled ‘organic,’ that is certified, and there are standards for that,” she said. “But, if something is labeled ‘local’ or ‘natural,’ there is no standardization.”

A “local” label is often more important to consumers than any other food label, Chin said, as consumers feel as if they are buying fresh foods and supporting their local economies. But, a “local” label could mean the product was produced in the immediate community, to being trucked from within the state, to being brought in from the region.

Research recently published in the International Food and Agribusiness Management Review has shown that nearly a quarter of consumers from the U.S. and Canada often confuse the terms “local” and “organic.” Retail sales of both local and organic products have seen increasing demand over the last decade, according to the research, and although locally produced foods can be raised organically, not all locally raised foods are organic.

Other research has shown that

consumers are also confused about the meaning of “natural” labeled food products. A recent study by Consumer Reports has shown that 59 percent of consumers check whether the products they are buying are “natural,” despite that no verified label for the term exists.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture, the regulatory agency for meat, poultry and egg products, said that any meat item can be called “natural” if it contains no artificial ingredients or added color, and it is only minimally processed. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration, which regulates all other foods, does not currently have a definition for “natural.”

Consumers should educate themselves about what different labels mean, Chin said. The nutrition labels are separate from any label indicating how the product was raised.

“When it comes to nutrition labeling, we take a look at the nutrients contained within that food,” she said. “So, it tells you the amount of calories, carbohydrates, fats, protein, vitamins and minerals – things that are important to your nutritional health. So, nutrition labeling, according to the FDA, means the actual content of what’s in the food, not how it was produced.”

People have extensively discussed genetically modified, or genetically engineered, foods and labeling those foods recently. According to the FDA (<http://www.fdgov/food/foodscienceresearch/biotechnology/ucm346030.htm>), food and food ingredients from genetically engineered plants were

introduced into the food supply in the 1990s. Genetic engineering means that scientists introduce new traits or characteristics to an organism to enhance the growth or nutritional value of food products.

An example of a genetically engineered food product is Golden Rice, which was developed to help prevent vitamin A deficiency, a condition that can cause irreversible blindness and even death, Chin said. Another example would be modifying specific proteins that give the peanut its allergenicity, which is under study currently. It could potentially eliminate the threat of peanut allergies.

The FDA has reported that foods produced through genetic engineering are as safe and nutritional as any other foods, so they do not have to be specially labeled. However, food manufacturers can voluntarily label whether foods have or have not been developed through genetic engineering.

Food production challenges

Chin said it will take growing food in a variety of ways to meet the food needs of 9 billion people worldwide in less than 40 years.

“We have many people arguing these days on which is better, which is worse, which way is good and bad for the environment,” she said. “My perspective is we have to use the best practices of every single type of food production method and agricultural technology that suits the system, that suits the producer and that suits the eventual consumer, in order to produce food for that number of people.”

She said the comparison of food production practices – organic, conventional and genetically engineered as examples – shows that they are many times more alike than they are different when it comes to using no-till, crop rotation, fertilizers and pesticides. Each method has its advantages and risks.

“It’s great that people want to buy organic,” Chin said. “It produces nutritious foods, and it does have advantages in terms of biodiversity and soil health. A lot of people are also in support of biotechnology, or genetically modified foods that can produce higher yields, pest resistance, or meet climate changes, like drought or flood tolerance.”

“Because of the different agricultural challenges and consumers’ wants and desires, we need to harness every type of technology to produce food that is appropriate

for the consumer and the producer,” she added.

“I think the crux of the problem is that 50-60 years ago, there were many people involved with food production and agriculture,” Chin said. “Today, less than two percent of people are involved in food production. Many people don’t understand that just like every other industry in our country now, it’s highly technical.”

For example, she said the agricultural industry is using more precision farming – technologies such as global positioning systems in tractors – to produce more food safely with fewer inputs, which is highly desired. If people could understand farmers and farm production methods, they might have a more realistic perspective on food production.

Goodland girl places fifth in the world at rodeo event

Goodland rodeo champ Nicole Sederstrom placed fifth in the world in trail course and sixth in goat tying at the National Little Britches Finals Rodeo in Pueblo, Colo., in July.

Sederstrom competed for world titles against more than 900 contestants in the five-day event, July 21 to 26.

Early in the week, she captured a fourth-place buckle in trail course, where horse and rider have to negotiate a series of obstacles such as gates and jumps. In the first rodeo of the week, she placed seventh in team roping.

The second rodeo began on July 24. Sederstrom had good times in the preliminary round, but not enough to advance.

On July 26, "Short-Go Saturday," the top 15 contestants in each event got to compete. Sederstrom had made it in for trail course and goat tying. In trail course she placed fifth in the short go, and in goat tying she placed second.

After the total points were calculated, Sederstrom ended up fifth in trail course and sixth in goat tying.

Points were also totaled up for the whole rodeo season, and Sederstrom was named "2014 Reserve World All-Around Champion" for the Senior Girl Division. For this, she received a Montana Silversmith buckle.

Sederstrom is a member of the Kansas High School Rodeo Association. The association's state finals were held in June in Topeka. She placed fifth in breakaway roping, falling short of qualifying for the National High School Finals by 1.5 points.

The Kansas High School Rodeo season for 2014-2015 began last weekend. Sederstrom traveled to Concordia, and got first place finishes in goat tying. She also placed fourth in barrels and sixth in poles.

Sederstrom will continue competing throughout the fall in Topeka, Oswego, Garden City and Emporia.
