authorized the mayor Monday to sign a contract with the Kansas Department of Transportation on the project to replace the brick intersections on Main at 11th and 12th.

The total project is estimated at \$411,000, with the state paying 70 percent. City Manager Ron Pickman said the city would pay the preliminary engineering costs.

If things work right, he said, the project could begin in the spring.

The commission also approved changes to the city personnel manual to implement rule changes from the Internal Revenue Service on personal use of city vehicles and cell phones.

Pickman said the IRS has changed the policy about public vehicles being driven home by the employees. He said the rule used to be that the employee could drive a vehicle home and back to work and the city would charge the employee tax on 37 cent per mile for one round-trip per day.

Now, he said, the city has to charge under the commuting rule. which means the employee is taxed on \$1.50 per one-way trip or about \$6 per day, if they go home for lunch. The city has to charge the employee for the taxes on this as part of their income.

This is more than the mileage for most employees, Pickman said, and some employees have stopped driv-

The Goodland City Commission ing vehicles home because of the change.

> Pickman said it is too early to tell how this will affect the city performance. He said one of the rules says the city policemen cannot wear their uniform boots home without them being considered taxable income. The reason for this is that the boots can be used for general use beyond the work shift.

> City Clerk Mary Volk said she does not know what the police chief has decided to do about the uniform rules, but that under the rules they will be considered taxable income until an alternative is proposed.

"I know Police Chief Ray Smee was talking to Pickman about this," Volk said, "but I do not know what they have decided."

Under the cell phone rule, Pickman said, city supervisors can have a phone to use in doing their jobs. Personal use of a city cell phone is not allowed, and any emergency calls made on a cell phone by an employee have to be reimbursed to the city at the current rate per minute. Pickman said most of the city cell phone have been turned in because of the new rule because the employees did not want to keep track of each call. He said there were not that many cell phones being used, and that many of the employees are using their own cell phones rather than have to follow
