'Antlerless' deer season extended

The extended white-tailed "antlerless-only" deer hunt ends on Sunday.

Unfilled regular season deer permits revert to white-tailed antlerless only permits for this season.

However, this season is unit specific and several units are closed. There is no late deer season for units 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 17, and 18, so if you have a game tag that is unfilled, you will have to go east to unit 7 to hunt. Unfilled deer permits for unit 1 or 3 are void and no longer valid for late season use.

Basketball victories, elevator failure

It was the best of years, it was the worst of years. It just depended on whether you were on the state-championship high school basketball team or had grain stored in an elevator when the company which owned it declared bankruptcy.

Whatever else 2003 was, it wasn't dull.

Basketball Victory

The Norton High School boys basketball team had an impressive season, capping it off by winning the championship of the Class 3A State Basketball Tournament for the first time in 52 years with a thrilling 60-58 victory over Medicine Lodge in the Sports Arena in Hutchinson.

The win completed a storybook run through the sub-state tournament where they beat No. 5 state-ranked Belleville and No. 4 state-ranked Minneapolis and the state tournament where the No. 5 seeded Blue Jays defeated No. 4 seed Cherokee-Southeast in the first round and No. 1 state-ranked, No. 1 seeded and unbeaten Riley County in double overtime in the semi-finals.

The Blue Jays' never-say-die mentality just wouldn't let them lose. And, they lived up to the message on the signs erected by the Blue Jay Booster Club along the highway to Hutchinson, "Individuals play the games but teams win championships!"

Norton completed its state championship season with a 22-5 record. The Blue Jays won their fifth straight Mid-Continent League tournament and tied for the league championship.

Brady Grain goes under

Because of drought and tough economic times, Brady Grain closed its doors after over 20 years in business.

Shane Brady, president of the elevators, said the drought during the past four years cut out any hope of profitability.

"It's hurting everybody," he said, "farmers, everybody."

Mr. Brady notified the state Agriculture Department in September that the elevators had ceased to operate and it was his intent to relinquish control to the secretary of agriculture.

After the elevators were put in the state's control, liquidation began with the depositors' interests being protected by

In November, District Judge Bill Elliott approved the recommended bid prices and the stored grain was sold. Mr. Criss said he thought the bids offered were fair, especially when considering the condi-

tion of the stored grain.

Closing wasn't the first of the problems the elevators had. During the last full week of June, the Norton Farm Service Agency Office announced that grain put in storage in the Brady Grain elevators would not be eligible for loans because the

elevators had been removed from the list of warehouses approved by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

The Norton agency office said removal action was taken by the Farm Service Agency Commodity Office in Kansas
