# Congressman taking applications

Congressman Jerry Moran is accepting applications for nominations to the U.S. Service Academies for next year.

These are the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs; the Naval Academy in Annapolis; the Military Academy in West Point; and the Merchant Marine Academy in Kings Point, N.Y. Those selected will enter the academies in June 2005.

Selections are based on Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) or American College Test (ACT) scores, class rank, grade point av-

erage, school records, extracurricular activities, leadership, motivation, recommendations and interview evaluations.

Applicants must be Kansas residents, between 17 and 23, unmarried, not pregnant, and without obligation to support children or other dependents.

If nominated, applicants then must meet the admission requirements of each academy. The academies will make the final decision on who will receive admission. Due to limited placement, Moran encourages all interested candi-

dates to apply also to the offices of U.S. Senators Pat Roberts and Sam Brownback.

# April is child abuse prevention month

What is child abuse?

There are four major types — neglect, physical abuse, sexual abuse and emotional abuse. Although any of the forms may be found separately, they often occur together.

Most of the states in the U.S. define child abuse and neglect as:

- Neglect — failure to provide

for a child's basic needs.

Neglect may be:

- Physical (lack of supervision or failure to provide food, shelter or medical care).
- Educational (failure to educate or attend to special education needs).

Emotional (inattention to a child's emotional needs or exposure to domestic violence). These situations do not always mean that a child is neglected.

Sometimes cultural values, the standards of care in the community and poverty may be contributing factors. This could mean that the family is in need of information or assistance.

When a family fails to get help or make changes professional intervention may be required.

- Physical abuse — is injury (ranging from minor bruises to severe fractures or death) as a result of punching, beating, kicking, biting, shaking, throwing, stabbing, choking, hitting, burning or otherwise harming a child. Such injury is considered abuse regardless of whether the caretaker intended to hurt the child.
- Sexual abuse — includes fondling a child's genitals, penetration, incest, rape, sodomy, indecent exposure and commercial

exploitation through prostitution or the production of pornographic materials.

Emotional abuse: is any pattern of behavior that impairs a child's emotional development or sense of self-worth. This may include constant criticism, threats or rejection, such as withholding love, support or guidance.

In 2001, an average of 2,475 children were found to be victims of child abuse each day.

Each week 50,000 reports of suspected child abuse or neglect are made. And the most shocking perhaps is that four out of five victims are abused by a parent (about 41% by their mothers).

Everyone can help with prevention. Raise the issue. Reach out to kids and families in our community. Join community prevention efforts. Take action to help ensure that the children are safe and sound.
