## WEEKLY SERMONETTE

### A Pause for Prayer

"I urge you, first of all, to pray for all people. As you make your requests, plead for God's mercy upon them, and give thanks. Pray this way for kings and all others who are in authority, so that we can live in peace and quietness, in godliness and dignity. This is good and pleases God our Savior, for he wants everyone to be saved and to understand the truth. For there is only one God and one Mediator who can reconcile God and people. He is the man Christ Jesus. He gave his life to purchase freedom for everyone." 1st Timothy 2:16-5 NLT.

They're called the winds of war. In recent months, they have been zephyrs — rustling breezes with the warning stench of death.

No matter your country of origin, if you are a Christian, your ultimate allegiance is to a higher call and a transcendent Kingdom. This Kingdom does not know racial, ethnic, cultural, gender, or language boundaries. As children of God, we share our Father's concern and want all people to be saved by coming to Christ Jesus who gave his life to purchase freedom for everyone. So as we hear the rumble of the War Winds, let's take a prayerful pause.

In that prayerful pause, let's first give thanks. Let's give thanks for our personal blessings and freedoms. Let's give thanks for the age in which we live. Let's give thanks for those we love and hold dear. Let's give thanks for an unshakable Kingdom that is our security and hope in a world that is subject to death and decay. Let's give thanks for a loving God who loves us with an everlasting and inexhaustible love and will bring us into his presence in glory with great joy.

Next, let's plead for God's mercy on those who do not know him or who live in rebellion to him. Some of these people are close to us — they are in our family, or in the family of those we know well and love deeply. Let's ask for God's mercy to be upon them and our Father's presence to be real to them.

Next, let's pray for our world rulers so that peace and quietness will carry the day and not the

winds of war. Yes, we know that war must sometimes happen to prevent an even greater horror. We do not want to be naively complicit in another holocaust, nor do we want to sit idly by while tyrants plan the demise of innocent people or try to block the path of their people to religious freedom. But, God asks us to pray for peace and quietness so that his cause and his people can be known for their godliness and dignity.

Please dedicate yourself to prayer this week. Let's join together, hearts and prayers linked around the world, and let's ask that war can be averted and a solution can be found to ease the tension and remove the threat of mass destruction.

As the velocity of the approaching winds mount, let's pray that they can be stilled, that lives can be spared, that families can be reunited, and that peace will open up a highway for those that bring the good news of Jesus to those trapped in darkness, hatred, and unbelief. Read and remember Luke 8:22-25 which reminds us that Jesus has the power to stop the winds.
