Top disc golfers play in Norton

If you were in Elmwood Park, August 29, you might have seen a world champion disc golfer play in this year's Norton Open. Kella Rodiek, Amhurst, Neb., is the 13 and under girls world champion. There were 57 competitors this year, compared to 42 in 2003. Players attending the tournament called it "the best Norton Open ever".

Brett Straight of Hays said, "I always enjoy coming to Norton. It just keeps getting better and better."

Carol Rodiek, won the Amateur Women's Division. Joan Bolt finished in third place and Charlotte Gasper was fourth.

Two Norton men placed in the Advanced Division. Don Mordecai came from behind in the second round to win the Advanced and Chad Gasper received second. One of the most exciting parts of disc golf is the possibility of an ace (hole-in-one) during competition. This is rare but there were two at the Norton Open this year.

Warren Billups, Colby, hit an ace on hole No. 3 and Chad Gasper, Norton, aced hole No. 4.

Three Norton men participated in the Amateur Mens Division — James Fawcett, Dale Henry and Doyle Nelsen won third place and a "Run for the Roses" prize.

Seven high school boys com-

peted — Aaron Daniels; Todd Bolt; Brock Scott; Todd Zink; Corey Rutherford, who took first; Nathan Morse, second; and Chris Davis, third. Morse also won the "Run for the Roses" award.

Norton had two Junior Players, Andrew Soderlund and Michael Zink. Soderlund won the division and a "Run for the Roses" prize at the end, along with Trevor Lewis, a former Norton resident.

The tournament winner and Open Division winner was Ron Convers, of Team Discraft, Blackwell, Okla. He said he was impressed with the condition of the course and how the tournament was run.

Trophies, made by Don Mordecai, were given out for first place finishers in all divisions.

"This was a very enjoyable event," Mr. Mordecai said. "I was impressed by the number of

people that this event attracts each year. I think it is a combination of a nice disc golf course that is well maintained and challenging and the amount of prizes that each golfer could win. This is a winning combination for a tournament that will continue to grow, year after year, along with the sport of disc golf."

year average when figuring enrollment and Mr. Mann said that Norton will probably use that for next year's budget, but with the shrinking enrollment, the budget is going to be smaller.

Since the 2000-'01 school year, he said, the district has had a drop of 66.8 in full-time equivalency. At \$3,863 per student, that loss totals more than one-quarter of a million dollars that the district doesn't have to spend in the budget.

He said the drop in student enrollment hasn't been a major problem yet, but it's getting to the point where it will be soon.

The enrollment numbers won't be official until Sept. 20.

Mr. Mann said despite the drop in enrollment the schools haven't dropped any activities, programs or classes.

The district did, however, hire a new art teacher for Eisenhower

Elementary and Norton Junior High. Vicki Robison, who was teaching art at Eisenhower last year, took over for Peggy Stull, who retired, at the high school level.

To replace her, the district hired Diane Lambrecht, who lives in Stockton with her husband.

Mrs. Lambrecht has nine years of teaching experience. She graduated from Hastings College in Nebraska and has earned both a bachelor's degree and a master's degree. She taught at Ransom for three years, Piper Middle School in Kansas City for four years,

Mullinville for two years and at Meade for two years.

Also new to the staff are two special education teachers, Gila Lavielle and Marie Miller.

Both Mrs. Lavielle and Mrs. Miller have more than 20 years of experience teaching.

Lida Sharp, the junior high math teacher, is the new junior high KAY sponsor and Lisa Terrill, who is new to the district, is the new at-risk tutor for the junior high.


