# County gets landfill permit OK

"Gentlemen, we have a permit," Solid Waste Supervisor Curt Archibald told the commissioners on Monday as he handed over the county's long sought after landfill permit.

"Hallelujah!," Commission Chairman Leroy Lang said.

The notice has already gone into the

paper requesting bids for the monitoring wells required by the state and bids for construction on the pit.

The commissioners made copies of the permit and put one in the county clerk's office for public display.

Mr. Archibald also told the commissioners that the recycling center has sent off a couple of loads of cardboard to

Phillipsburg, for which the county will receive \$95 a ton, and plastics to Denver for which the county will receive no money but it didn't cost anything either.

Acting Ambulance Director Andy Nielsen told the commissioners the ambulance crews had another busy weekend including two accidents and numerous illnesses.

He said he thought people were becoming more comfortable with calling an ambulance rather than going to the hospital in a private vehicle.

The county is looking at a building for a new ambulance barn and training area. The structure, the old army reserve building which was last used by Sunny Tarp, (Continued on Page 5)

## School celebrates Homecoming

## Flu shot time almost here

The Norton County Health Department is gearing up for flu season with vaccine on the way and clinics getting set up.

County Health Nurse Gina Frack visited with Norton County Commissioners on Monday and said she expects a busy year.

The health department staff usually does about 13 clinics, she said, including at all the senior citizen centers, the schools, and larger businesses.

This year clinics will be offered at both Moffett Drug and Pamida Pharmacy, she said.

Home health clients are also provided with shots. Others, who need to get the shot at home can do so by calling the health department, she said.

Mrs. Frack gave the commissioners

her profit/loss statement for August.

The department isn't making a lot of money but is holding its own, she said.

Commissioners signed a request for local bioterrorism money for the health department.

Mrs. Frack said she doesn't know what the money will be used for but it will mostly likely be used for communications equipment and training.

A lot of what she gets depends on what the regional people do with the money they will receive, she said.

Commissioner Dean Kruse asked about diabetic seminars.

He asked if there could be some place that diabetics could find out about seminars in the area.

Mrs. Frack said she was looking to get people trained in diabetic care but that it will take time.

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seems to be in good shape, commissioners said and is 5,000 sq. ft. with plenty of room for both housing ambulances and classrooms. The biggest expense for remodeling would be garage doors and paving, Mr. Nielsen said.

Commissioner Dean Kruse said he thought an engineer should go through the building to make sure the furnace, roof and wiring are in good shape.

Also an outbuilding on the property would need to be removed, the commissioners agreed.

"I think its worth looking into," Mr. Kruse said.

Mr. Nielsen said that an engineer from BG Consultants have looked at the building.

"We need an architect to do a preliminary study," Commissioner John Miller said.

The other commissioners agreed.

The commissioners said they are past the time they could get a grant to help pay for the building.

Mr. Nielsen said he would check to see what the building's appraised value is.

Mr. Miller said while he was worried about the flat roof on the building, if it lasts for several years the county could probably replace it with a peaked one.
