After the primary election the room was full as the votes were checked and a six vote lead by Commissioner John Miller over challenger George Gassmann shrunk to one vote.

To be eligible you must be a resident of Norton County; at least 6 months old; and have a chronic health condition such as lung disease (asthma, emphysema) heart disease (congestive heart failure), a metabolic disorders (diabetes) an immune system disorder (chemotherapy patient, lupus or HIV), be an organ transplant recipient, or have a kidney disorder (dialysis)

A signed physician's order is not required. The recipient must sign a consent form, which verifies that they have been diagnosed with a chronic medical condition making them high risk.

To receive a flu shot, go to the Norton County Health Department during business hours, 8 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and 1-4:30 p.m., Monday through Thursday and 8 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., Friday.
