Snowfall extends vacation

Students in the county got an extra long weekend as a snow day extended Thanksgiving break for an extra day yesterday.

The Norton, Northern Valley and Lenora school districts each called off school because of the weather. The Quinter and Jennings school districts did the same.

Yesterday, lots of things were canceled including pre-school at the Christian Church, Head Start at the Methodist Church, the Teens for Christ meeting, TOPS meeting and ladies inter-city bowling. The Norton Senior Citizens Center was closed.

Although almost everything involving youngsters was shut down, the Little Kids Wrestling will still meet tonight at 6:30 p.m. in the wrestling room.

Meteorologist Dave Thede with the National Weather Service in Goodland said they had a report from the Norton Dam that four inches of snow had fallen by yesterday afternoon. He said they also got another report of two inches from Lenora.

In addition to the four inches, the Norton Dam reported two-tenths of an inch of precipitation, while Lenora had 0.04.

He said Palisade, Neb., in Hitchcock County, just north of Atwood and Rawlins County, reported the most snow at six inches. Goodland, he said, had two inches, while the Tribune area had one inch. The snow, he said, was generally moving in a north/south direction.

Mr. Thede said he didn't think there was anything out of the ordinary about the county's first snow being in late November. Last year, he said, the county's first snow was reported on Nov. 23. That was one-half an inch nine miles southeast of Norton.

He said people in the Norton area can expect dry weather and slowly warming temperatures through the rest of the week.

K-State Multi-County Extension Agronomist Brian Olson said the snow came at the perfect time. He said the winter wheat is pretty well established and so the slowly decreasing temperatures didn't hurt it any.

But, with the dry conditions and cold temperatures expected in the coming nights, he said the wheat is going to need the protection and insulation given to it by the snow cover.

Top entertainer to give concert here

Nashville recording artist Josh Turner sounds like the kind of person who would fit in in Norton or any other small town across the country.

Mr. Turner will be performing his hit song, "Long, Black Train" and many others on Sunday, Dec. 12, when he appears in concert at 7 p.m. at Norton's East Campus Auditorium.

His appearance is sponsored by the Norton County Arts Council.

In a phone interview the country singer with the bass voice said he grew up working on a farm near Hannah, S.C.

"My granddaddy and great-granddaddy were both farmers," he said. Mr. Turner, a strong Christian man, said his song-writing ability is a gift from God.

He said he was a college student at Nashville's Belmont University and going through some tough personal times. He had just listened to some songs by Hank Williams, Sr. at the school's library and was walking across the campus when inspiration struck.

"As I was walking home I noticed there was something unusually dark about that night," he said. "All of a sudden, I got this

vision of a wide open space, out on the plains. There was a train running out in the middle of nowhere, and people were standing beside the tracks, just watching it go by.

"I was thinking, 'what does this mean?' It dawned on me that the train was a physical metaphor for temptation. These people were standing there, deciding whether or not to get on it. That stuck with me.

"Temptation was a subject I knew a lot about.

"When I got home, I sat down on my

bed with my guitar, and it just started pouring out of me."

This song has struck a chord with lots of people. Not only did he get a standing ovation at the Grand Ole Opry when he performed it there, but people everywhere fell the truth in the music.

"Long Black Train," has been nominated for Song of the Year by both the Country Music Association and the Christian Country Music Awards.

"My inspiration for this song was a gift from God," Mr. Turner said. "And I have to give it back to my friends and fans."

He said he believes in the power of music and this song has allowed lives to be changed.

He said he plans to give people in Norton a big show. His concert will include lots of songs that will reflect his country/Christian upbringing.

He and his five-piece band will be rolling into Norton in time to get set up for the show that night. His wife of 18 months, Jennifer, is part of the band.
