Mr. Brannan came to give his weekly report to the Norton County commissioners and told them that he had had to buy a load of fuel last week.

Change alarms' batteries Provide family with fire safety

If you haven't already changed your smoke alarm batteries, do so now.

The Norton fire departments, along with those across the county, advise everyone to change their batteries when they change their clocks for Daylight Saving Time.

An average of three children per day die in home fires across the country and 80 percent of those occur in homes without working smoke alarms.

Non-working smoke alarms are worse than worthless.

The most common cause of non-working smoke alarms is batteries that are missing or too old.

Changing smoke alarm batteries at least once a year can save lives

The fire marshal's office recommends replacing smoke alarms every ten years.

"The peak time for home fire fatalities is between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. when most families are sleeping," says state Fire Marshal Jack Alexander. ."Smoke alarm maintenance is a simple, effective way to reduce home fire deaths.

"Children and senior citizens are most at risk, and a working smoke alarm can give them the extra seconds they need to get out safely."

In addition, the fire marshal recommends residents test smoke alarms by pushing the test button and practicing escape routes with the entire family.

Families should also prepare an emergency safety kit that includes working flashlights and fresh batteries.
