Counties should think about ban

Kansas counties are being urged by two state officials to consider ssuing burning bans.

Maj. Gen. Tod Bunting, director of Kansas Emergency Management, and Jack Alexander, State Fire Marshal, issued their precautionary recommendation this week.

Bunting, who also serves as the state's Homeland Security director as well as adjutant general, told *The Norton Telegram* that he is recommending the burning ban in light of grass fires in Oklahoma and Texas and dry conditions that exist in Kansas.

He said it's better to head off a firefighting efforts. disaster than to endanger lives responding to one.

Alexander said it is important drought-stricken area of Oklathat Kansans heighten their awareness, and respect burning bans. He also stressed the importance of not discarding smoking materials and start open fires.

Bunting said Kansas has not received any requests for assistance under the Emergency Management Assistance Compact, a multi-state mutual aid agreement.
