Property must be filed soon

All personal property must be filed with the Norton County Appraiser's Office by Wednesday, March 15 to avoid the application of penalties and late filing.

Types of personal property needed to be reported include mobile homes (not listed on owned real estate); trucks and pickups with a tag greater than 12M; nonhighway or untagged vehicles; camping, car and utility trailers, unless tagged with an RV tag; golf carts; snowmobiles; all-terrain vehicles; boats, motors, jet ski, and trailers; aircraft; and business and office equipment.

Any person or business which has in their possession any tangible personal property belonging to others (not specifically listed above) must list the property with the appraiser in the names of the owner of the property.

If you are uncertain whether you have property that you are required to report, contact the office, on the second floor of the Norton County Courthouse, Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m., or phone 785-877-5700.



Youth center gives teens a place to hang-out

Ready, or not, here they come.

There might be a few odd jobs remaining to be finished at The Rock Youth Center, but the board of directors of the center have decided to begin the regular schedule, anyway.

Beginning Saturday, The Rock will be open every Saturday from 7 p.m. to 11 p.m. An entry fee of \$3 will be charged.

All youth will sign-in when they enter the center. However, one of the main rules states that once a youth leaves the facility he or she will not be allowed to return that night.

Board member Julie Douglas said there will be a concession stand open during the

evening.

Some of the activities for the youth to take part in include playing pool, ping pong, X-Box, foosball, cards, and board games. The board plans to add more.

Two events in the planning stages are Junior High Night and Family Night.

All events will depend on volunteers. The board is in need of workers to be in charge of an evening, volunteers to help with sign-in/out, concessions and the game areas. Worship teams are also needed for every night the facility is open.

Some needs the youth center still have include: two more televisions, an X-Box, an electric roaster, a variety of card games.

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Hospital gets grant for bioterrorism

The Norton County Hospital has grant money to spend before this summer.

Hospital Administrator Rich Miller told the hospital board at its last meeting that the hospital had applied for a \$19,500 bioterrorism grant and it was approved.

The hospital, he said, has until June 30 to use the grant money.

With the money, Mr. Miller said the hospital plans to upgrade the negative air equipment in the isolation room area; upgrade the decontamination area and possibly set up a second decontamination area; buy medications and vaccines so the hospital has them in stock; send staff through education and training; and increase the surge capacity, including buying more cots, etc., in case something happens where more people need treatment than the hospital has beds for.

Mr. Miller said the hospital has been holding utility studies, looking at natural gas, electric and water use. They have been trying to work with the employees on conserving energy, since the cost of everything has gone up.

He said the hospital received a letter from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, regarding the financial information the
