

Norton native key figure in K-State book

A Norton native son, Waldene "Wally" Frank, is one of the key figures in a recently released book entitled *Chemistry on the Court: the untold story of a No. 1 team*. The book features Frank, who was born and raised in Norton and who starred on the Kansas State University basketball teams in 1957-58 and 1958-59. The book, written by Mel Eaton Matuszak, features two very important years of Kansas State basketball when Coach Tex Winter was just beginning his coaching career. The 1958-59 Wildcat quintet was the overwhelming choice at season's end as the No. 1 team in the nation, although they never made it to the Final Four. In those days, the elimination process was entirely different. It is the only K-State team that has achieved that level of success. The team could almost have been considered a "pick up" team

because players like Bob Boozer, Don Matuszak and Wally Frank were not highly recruited and other teammates included walk-ons and football players. The team showed a determination to succeed and played a rigorous sched-

ule, including pre-season games with teams such as Purdue, Indiana, University of California and Brigham Young. The book can be ordered through UR Books, P.O. Box 898, Dacula, GA 30019. Cost is \$14 per book, including postage

Course will teach kids safety

In 1970, the U.S. Department of Labor declared agricultural tasks as hazardous for children under the age of 16. With certain exemptions, this law made employment of youth under the age of 16 at these jobs illegal for anyone other than their parent or legal guardian. The long withstanding tradition of youth finding summer employment on local farms prompted the development of the Hazardous Occupations Training (Tractor Safety) program to train and certify youth 14 and 15 years of age to work in agricultural jobs for someone other than their parents. With the summer season right around the corner, you may be planning on working on a farm or if you are a producer, possibly you are planning on hiring a 14 or 15 year old. Youth that are now 13 and will be turning 14 this summer or fall can also take the course. There are also several instances



when the training is required by the Hazardous Occupation Training law, even when the youth is working on the "family's farm". This is so when:
• The farm is a partnership with the youth's parents being one of the partners. Technically, the youth is working for the partnership and not the parents.
• The farm is incorporated. Here again, the corporation is the employer, not the parents.
• The youth is working on a grandparent's farm. Exemptions for the training law exist only for youth employed by their parents or legal guardian.
Kansas State Research and Extension councils from this area are

combining efforts and hosting a Tractor Safety Training class, which will be held from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. in Hill City on Saturday, May 6 at the Graham County 4-H Building.
Registration needs to be into the Norton County Extension Office at the Norton County Courthouse no later than May 1.
The cost of the course will be \$12, which will cover materials and supplies plus lunch and refreshments. Pre-registration is requested to distribute the manual prior to the course, so reading and completion of homework can be done before coming to the training.
Older youth and parents are welcomed and encouraged to attend the

training. Information presented should benefit all farmer residents and workers who have not previously attended these sessions.
However, youth 16 and over are not required by law to take the training, but are highly encouraged to participate in the course if they have not taken it before.
The course will go over general safety information, safety around chemicals, first on scene safety, tractor safety information, safety on the road, All-Terrain Vehicle (ATV) safety, livestock safety and farm safety.
