Gift makes history for Logan museum

A gift of \$100,000 from benefactor Polly Bales will make the Logan Historical Museum a reality.

The gift will allow the museum to purchase the Dye Building in downtown Logan to become its new home. The building was constructed in 1905.

Over the last few years, Carol Bales, daughter-in-law of Mrs. Bales, oversaw the restoration of the building. All of the second floor bay windows were replaced with custom-built windows to fit the spaces; many sections of the tin ceiling were replaced with original pieces; and the original wood floor was restored.

Elements from other historical Logan buildings were incorporated into the restoration. Paneling from the old Methodist Church were used as were two, solid wood doors, two pillars light fixtures,

pew and communion rails from the old Catholic Church. There is a black board from the old Logan Grade School and a countertop from the Logan House Hotel. Visitors will see ornate trim pieces and light fixtures from the Opera House, two sets of handmade doors from the old house on the Gary States property, a solid oak fireplace from a local house and cabinetry and a wood door with a glass inset from the Peter Hansen home.

Historical pieces to add to the museum's collections include a scale and sign from the Hansen Lumber Yard, an area rug from the Dye house, a sign from the Gambles Store, bowling pins and a picture from the Opera House, a picture given to Fred C. Albright on his birthday, a large moveable cart from the train station or the creamery, a brass bed and marbled



topped dresser that had belonged to Alpha and Peter Hansen, the christening dress worn by both Dane Hansen and Kate Hansen, a large picture of Kate Hansen and a tin-lined trunk she used in her travels to Japan, and a bonnet that had belonged to the wife of John Alexander Logan, the founder of Logan.

On loan to the museum is the

front stage drop curtain out of the Densmore High School.

The mission of the Logan Area Historical Museum will be to collect and preserve historical artifacts of the Logan trade area. The volunteers who will operate the museum believe this preserved history will serve as an educational tool for the present and future generations.

Legislation to protect families at military funerals

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congressman Jerry Moran recently introduced legislation to commend the Patriot Guard Riders for shielding military families from protesters at funerals.

"This legislation is to express the U.S. House of Representatives' deepest appreciation to Patriot Guard Riders across the country for protecting military families and preserving the memory of our nation's fallen heroes," he said.

"I first experienced the power of the Patriot Guard last year when hundreds of riders showed up to the funeral of a Kansas soldier who

gave his life serving in Iraq," Congressman Moran said. "Regardless of one's opinion of our country's military commitments, we can all be thankful for these patriots who provide the families and friends of our fallen soldiers the peaceful time of mourning they deserve."

In 2005, a small group of American Legion riders in Mulvane, Kan., began a movement to shield families of fallen soldiers from disruptions at funerals caused by protesters. Calling themselves the "Patriot Guard," these motorcycle riders waved American flags and

revved their engines to serve as a barrier between mourning families and picketers.

A nationwide group known as the "Patriot Guard Riders" has since grown into a network of tens of thousands of members who volunteer their time to come to the aid of military families and show their respect for fallen service members at funerals, Rep. Moran said. Appearing at the request of families, they drown out the jeers and hateful signs of protesters to allow the memories of the deceased service members to be remembered with honor and dignity.

More than a dozen states are considering legislation that would restrict protesting at funerals. Representatives Todd Tiahrt, Jim Ryun and Dennis Moore all of the Kansas delegation have joined Congressman Moran in sponsoring this legislation.


