Pharmacy gets new dispensing system

Ms. Elling said the pharmacy is implementing a new medication dispensing system called Pyxis, which is similar to the previous system, making it a fairly easy transition. They went live with the system in February. As for Dairyland, the hospital's new information system, the pharmacy went live at the end of March, she said. Dairyland communicates with Pyxis, automatically charging patients for their medication. It's all going fairly well, she said.
Ms. Cuthbertson said the information system department just finished the pharmacy, which was probably the biggest application

of the Dairyland system they have had to do. Before going live with pharmacy, the bookkeeping department had to key in each medication. The new system is much more accurate and less time-consuming, she said. Next, she said, they will be working on clinical documentation, meaning everything the nurses do now on paper will be done on computer. But, she said, they are taking it slow and have a lot to do before it is finished. They will also be working on interfacing the time-keeping network with Dairyland, so that it will go directly to payroll.


