Carl Frank Miller, 95, father of Charlene Weskamp, Norton, died Friday at Hillcrest Nursing Home, in McCook, Neb.

Mr. Miller was born July 10, 1910, in Hitchcock County, Neb., in a sodhouse to Frank and Amelia (Wit-twer) Miller. He grew up farming with horses on the family farm in Hitchcock County. He bought his first tractor, a Farmall F-30, in 1937 and his first car was a 1930 Chevy Coupe.

He married his sweetheart, Augusta Andrijeski, May 18, 1932, at St. Ann's Catholic Church. They were married for 72 years. They began their married life on the Miller family farm north of Culbertson, Neb. In 1944, they moved to the Harr place near St. Ann, buying it in 1946. The Millers had a farm sale in 1975, but continued living on the farm until moving to McCook in June, 1984. After his wife's death in 2004, he moved to Hillcrest Nursing Home. Preceding him in death were his

parents, his wife Augusta, one brother Joe, four sisters, Anna Sonckson, Martha Smith, Ida Andrijeski, Wilhelmina (Minnie) Smith, two grandsons and three great-grandchildren.

Mr. Miller was the last surviving sibling of his family.

He is survived by eight children, four sons, Richard and Retha Miller, Cody, Wyo., LaVerne and Bernadette Miller, Sioux Falls, S.D., Kenneth and Jeanie Miller Longmont, Colo., and Melvin and Jerry Miller, McCook; four daughters, Charlene and Andy Weskamp, Norton, Carla and Dewey Teel, Neligh, Neb., Leo and Diane Miller, Lincoln, and Carol and Randy Lashley Trenton, Neb.; 31 grandchildren; and 72 great-grandchildren.

In lieu of flowers memorials may be given in his name.

A Rosary was held Monday at St. Patrick's Catholic Church. Mass of Christian Burial was today in Calvary Cemetery with Father Val Bartek officiating.
