 tential, motivation, recommendations and interview evaluations. Applicants must be legal residents of the state of Kansas, at least 17 years of age but not past their 23rd birthday on July 1 of the year of admission, citizens of the United States, unmarried, not pregnant, and without legal obligation to support children or other dependents. If nominated by Mr. Moran, the

applicants then must meet the individual admission requirements of each academy. The academies will make the final decision on who will receive an appointment of admission. Due to limited placement, the congressman encourages all interested candidates to also apply to the offices of U.S. Senators Sam Brownback and Pat Roberts. The application deadline, Rep.
