'Rose' is on list of homes to be toured

The Rose of Sharon Inn, situated at the top of East Main Street, is one of four stops on the 2006 Arts Council Homes Tour.

Owned by Gale and Sharon Schulze, a portion of the stately Victorian home has been opened as an inn. Mr. and Mrs. Schulze live in the rest of the spacious home. The house was renamed "The Rose of Sharon" citing the scripture verse from the Song of Solomon 2:1.

Built in 1880 by James and Sarah Maggard, the house was formerly known as the Tinney Inn, named in honor of Dr. Ray and Dr. Grace Tinney. The Tinneys purchased the home in 1916 and set up their medical practice and a small clinic in the house. They served the Norton area until 1933.

Since then the house has been an apartment house and private residence.
