

said they should wait until more of the board was there to make a decision and recommended that they wait until the next meeting to make a decision. Three board members were absent.

The board agreed.

In other business, the board:

- Met Patricia McCartney, an advanced registered nurse practitioner, who is helping in the emergency room.
- Took a tour of the physical

therapy department in regards to possible renovations.

• Heard what's been happening in the pharmacy department from Carol Elling and Krista VanDiest. They said the Dairyland information system is in place and the Pixus medication dispensing system has been integrated to it.

• Discussed the east parking lot. Maintenance Supervisor Ty Bruton said the millings on the lot are wearing out. He said a hot-mix plant is nearby and so could save

the hospital a little money if they wanted to lay asphalt. After discussion, the board decided to talk about it again at the October meeting.

• Heard that in August, the hospital had 227 patient days, 44 admissions, 4 births, 24 surgeries, 4,962 out-patient procedures, 1,134 Doctors Clinic visits, and 656 in-patient procedures.

• Approved a new bad debt policy. The policy is for people who make no attempt to pay their

bill after a certain amount of time. If no contact is made after several attempts by the hospital to collect, the bill will be sent to collections.

• Gave approval to Hospital Administrator Rich Miller to use a physician recruitment agency if he feels it is needed to find a new doctor.

• Received quality improvement reports from the Radiology, Information Technology, Risk Management/Quality Improvement, Pharmacy, Social Services and Activities, and Dietary departments.

• Reviewed patient surveys.  
• Heard from Mr. Miller that the Kansas Hospital Association convention is Oct. 14-16 in Topeka.

## Voter Registration for the November General Election

### Notice of Places and Dates Of Registration For General Election

In compliance with the provisions of K.S.A. 25-2310, notice is hereby given that the voters of NORTON COUNTY, Kansas may register to vote at the

following places during regular office hours: Norton City Office, Alma City Office, Lenora City Office and Library and the Norton County Clerk's Office.

At 5:00 p.m. on the 23rd day of October 2006, the books for registration of voters will close and will remain closed until the 8th day of November 2006.

A citizen of the United States who is 18 years of age or older, or will have attained the age of 18 years at the next election, must register before he or she can vote. Registration closes 14 days prior to every election.

When a registered voter changes residence from one precinct to another precinct, such voter must re-register in order to be eligible to vote. Any person

may apply in person, by telephone, or by mail to the county election officer to be registered. Application forms shall be provided by the county election officer upon request by the applicant. Such application shall be signed by the applicant under penalty of perjury.

When a registered voter fails to vote in two consecutive general elections, such voters name may be removed from the registration books and party affiliation lists. Such voter must re-register in order to be eligible to vote.

## Lenora Public Offense Ordinance

Published in The Norton Telegram on Tuesday, September 26, 2006. (1T)

### ORDINANCE NO. 332

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING PUBLIC OFFENSES WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF LENORA, KANSAS; INCORPORATING BY REFERENCE THE "UNIFORM PUBLIC OFFENSE CODE FOR KANSAS CITIES," EDITION 2006.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LENORA, KANSAS:

SECTION 1: INCORPORATING UNIFORM PUBLIC OFFENSE CODE. There is hereby incorporated by reference for the purpose of regulating public offenses within the City of Lenora, Kansas that certain code known as the "Uniform Public Offense Code" Edition 2006, prepared and published by the League of Kansas Municipalities, Topeka, Kansas. No fewer than two copies of said Uniform Public Offense Code will be marked or stamped "Official Copy as Adopted by Ordinance No. 332," and to which shall be attached a copy of this ordinance, and filed with the city clerk to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable hours.

SECTION 2: AMENDMENT. Section 1 of Ordinance 328 is hereby amended and replaced by Section 1 of this ordinance.

SECTION 3: EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the official city newspaper.
