

Drill helps county health prepare

(Continued from Page 1) antibiotics for themselves and their families, because there was a mass outbreak of sickness.

People participating as the patients went to the Norton Junior High School, where they went through reception and registration. It was at registration that the first check of allergic reactions was made. From there, people went either to the slow or fast dispensing lane. People were put in the fast lane when there were no "red flags", such as possible allergic reactions. They received their medications and then were allowed to leave. Those in the slow lane had a one-on-one consultation with either Dr. Glenda Maurer or Dr. Craig Krizek. After their consultation, they too received their medication and were allowed to leave.

Ms. Frack said they intentionally set up some of the patients with problems to test the staff. People pretended to have allergic reactions and hysteria, while others just went off the deep end.

Overall, she said the clinic went well. They now know some things that work and some that need to be worked on.

Looking at the evaluations, she

said they received positive comments on the easy flow of the clinic, the organization and the minimal paperwork that needed to be done.

Things that they need to work on mainly deal with adding more staffing to some areas, which will increase security and speed up some lines.

Other agencies helping were the Kansas Department of Transportation; Kansas Department of Corrections; local law enforcement, including both city and county; Eisenhower Elementary staff; the Norton County Health Department; Dr. Maurer; Dr. Krizek and his staff; several city and county employees; the Norton County Commission; High Plains Mental Health; Mitch Jones, city fire chief; Scott Sproul, Rural Telephone; and Pat Douglas, who helped with security and had several Norton Boy Scouts go through the clinic.

Both clinic volunteers and patients who filled out an evaluation were entered into a drawing for \$125 each in Chamber bucks. Patients who won the drawing were Kathy Richard and Richard Wyatt. Clinic staff who won were Pat Hillebrand and Don Mordecai.

"Throughout the last century, the appearance of 'new media' has threatened the newspaper industry. Radio, television, now the Internet, all were going to put us out of business. It hasn't happened, and it's not going to happen," he said.

"The way we do things, the economic models, the profit equations all change, but one thing does not: Community newspapers will remain the prime, often the only, organization gathering and providing news about our towns. No one else can or will compete with us, with our papers and our

websites and our use of media not yet dreamed of. We have a great future in the greatest business in the world — if we accept the challenges before us and produce top-notch news products in the 21st century," he said.

"I feel privileged to have been in this business for 39 years and privileged to represent so many bright, capable, accomplished and worthy people," Mr. Haynes said.

"NNA has been serving the community press for 122 years; we've always been there for our members. We look forward to creating stronger relationships with state press associations to serve community newspapers," he said.
