

# HANSEN MUSEUM

The Dane G. Hansen Memorial Museum is proud to present "Bone Up On Bones", a new interactive science exhibit. "Bone Up On Bones" was created and is toured by the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry. The exhibit was funded by a donation from Regence Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Oregon (Regence BCBSO) and will run through Dec. 30.

The 2,000 square foot exhibit uses over a dozen hands-on-exhibit components, computer stations, fiber optic displays and videos to offer a comprehensive look at bone structure and health. In the exhibit, visitors will be able to: Learn how joints act as shock absorbers by manipulating prosthetic joints; Watch X-rays of bones in motion and get an inside look at the human body in action; Assess their risk for osteoporosis and print out their own "action plan"; Assemble a skeleton puzzle; View a video of an actual hip replacement surgery and also learn interesting facts about bones, including the ability to rebuild themselves.

Michael G. McNeil, a 1999 graduate of Northern Valley High School is a member of the award-winning, San Francisco-based vocal group, "Chanticleer". Also known as "Orchestra of Voices", "Chanticleer" has been named the 2008 Ensemble of the Year by editors of the Musical America International Directory of the Performing Arts. The award is especially notable this year because it is the first time a vocal ensemble has been recognized.

Patricia David was his vocal teacher while he attended Northern Valley. She said, "Mike was an all around musician. I began giving him piano lessons while he was in grade school. He was an exceptional student. He played the alto saxophone, too. As a freshman, I encouraged him to take a vocal solo to music contest. After that, singing became a bigger interest for him."

Mrs. David said she invited Dr. David Bauer, head of the music department at the University of

Nebraska/Kearney to conduct a vocal clinic at Northern Valley. After Dr. Bauer heard Michael sing he convinced him to attend the university after he graduated from Northern Valley. Mrs. David said Mr. McNeil sang baritone while in high school but he now sings counter tenor.

Mr. McNeil, is the son of Joe and Carol McNeil, Lincoln, Neb. The senior McNeil was a former business teacher at Northern Valley and Mrs. McNeil had been a daycare provider and a cook at the Almena Senior Citizen Center.

New Yorker Magazine called Chanticleer the world's reigning male chorus. The group will perform more than 100 concerts during the 2007-2008 season, including appearances in 22 states and in eight European cities.

The group will return to morning television for their third consecutive season on NBC's Today Show. That appearance is scheduled for Monday, Dec. 3.
