## Eisenhower goes wild with exotic animals

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Children at Eisenhower Elementary School learned about Egyptian customs and animals from Sarai Page, a speaker representing Wildlife Encounters Refuge from Gretna, Neb.

Ms. Page presented a program in the school's cafeteria Thursday afternoon. She shared some facts about building pyramids, the Egyptians love and respect for all animals, especially cats and baboons and facts about the animals she brought with her. She showed the children an Emperor scorpion, an African serval, a baboon, a Nile monitor, an African pygmy hedgehog and a red-tailed boa constrictor.

Without knowing what animal she was going to display, several children volunteered to help. They were asked to line up, shut their eyes and hold out their hands. When she lifted a six-foot boa constrictor out of its container, the rest of the children let out an audible gasp. Of course, the volunteers opened their eyes and all but one immediately decided they really didn't want to help.

Ms. Page said she travels about 10 months out of the year presenting programs at schools all over the midwest.

## Safety chief cautions Super Bowl party crowd

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Chip and dip. Coke. Pepsi. Perhaps a few beers or other 'make-me-feel-good' refreshments. These are all ingredients for watching Sunday's Super Bowl game between the New England Patriots and the New York Giants.

The chip, dip, Coke and Pepsi won't create much problem. But the other ingredients could spell danger.

That all said, the Kansas Department of Transportation is joining with

federal, state and local highway safety and law enforcement officials to remind those who plan drinking alcohol on this special Sunday to act responsibly and designate a sober driver before the game even begins.

"Driving drunk or riding with someone who is drunk is simply not worth the risk; the consequences are serious and real," Pete Bodyk, chief of the Kansas Department of Transportation's Bureau of Traffic Safety told *The Norton Telegram*, and other media across the state.

"Not only do you risk killing yourself or someone else, but the trauma and financial costs of a crash or an arrest for driving while drunk are significant," he said.

"Simply put, ending up in jail or the hospital isn't the way you want to spend your Super Bowl Sunday," he said.

A rather startling figure Mr. Bodyk shared was that nearly 40 percent of all traffic deaths during the Super Bowl weekend in 2007 were caused by drunk drivers. The National Highway Traffic (Continued on Page 5)
