

Briefly Norton's school board lists agenda


A 20-item agenda awaits the Norton School District Board of Education, and public, at 7:30 Monday night at the Alice Tweed Center, 105 E. Waverly.



Norton to grow by 900 Sunday

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The population of the city of Norton will temporarily increase by about 30 percent this Sunday with the arrival of approximately 900 bicyclists of all ages and their support personnel from all over the United States for an overnight stop during the 34th annual Biking Across Kansas.

Citizens of Norton will roll out the red carpet to welcome these bicycle enthusiasts who will take eight days to cycle 496 miles across the Sunflower State.

The bikers are of different abilities, some even being first timers, so they will arrive in Norton at different times from the Saturday overnight stop in Atwood. The speedsters will be in Norton by noon but most will arrive from 3 p.m.

Among the first to welcome the bikers on Sunday afternoon will be the Norton First United Methodist Church on the corner of West Street and U.S. Highway 36. They will have cold drinks waiting for the thirsty bicyclists, according to church spokesman Clair Rumford.

The church will also serve a light supper in the church, beginning at 4 p.m.

Brad Hopkins of Almena will also have Phat Boy Barbecue set up in the Water Tower Park.

The Travel and Tourism Committee of the Norton Area Chamber of Commerce will also have refreshments for the bikers as they arrive at the Stull Gymnasium for

their overnight stay. Of course, all local restaurants have already been alerted of the influx of people by the Norton Area Chamber of

Commerce. Biking Across Kansas has gone through Norton in the past but always with one

third as many riders since previously there were three parallel routes. Once the riders and their families have

had their evening meal, all will meet in the Stull Gymnasium at the Norton Community High School at 8 p.m. to discuss the day's trip. Present to welcome them to the city of Norton will be Kim Snyder, president of the Norton City Council.

The public is invited to the evening meeting.

The bikers will sleep on the gymnasium floor at the Stull Gymnasium and the Norton Junior High Gymnasium and many will pitch tents on the grounds outside. Some will stay in local motels.

"We're happy to welcome the bikers to Norton," said Norton USD 211 Superintendent Greg Mann, himself a three-time Biking Across Kansas rider. "We hope to get all of them in the two gyms but, if not, we'll have to go to Wilmeth Kirk Gym."

The bicyclists will start at the Kansas-Colorado border west of St. Francis on Saturday morning. Their overnight stops, in addition to Atwood and Norton, will be Smith Center, Beloit, Washington, Sabetha and Horton.

On Saturday morning, June 14, they will cycle to the state line at Atchison where they will finish and enjoy a celebration picnic.

"Many of the bikers will be from Kansas but entries have been received from as many as 40 other states, Nova Scotia and Canada," said Charlie Summers, executive director.
