BB gun team returns to Kentucky

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For 39 out of the last 42 years, Norton County has qualified a teenage marksmanship team to compete in the U.S. Jaycees/Daisy International BB Gun Match Championships and this weekend in Bowling Green, Kentucky will mark the 40th year our local shooters have displayed their skills at the international shoot, the largest junior marksmanship competition in the world.

Since rules state that a shooter cannot compete in the international marksmanship two years in a row, each year's team consists of different girl and boy shooters.

Originally the Norton County Jaycees team and now the Norton County Rotary BB Gun Team, the youngsters and their parents and coaches left today for Bowling Green where they will fire BB guns for international recognition on Friday, Saturday and Sunday in Diddle Arena on the campus of Western Kentucky University.

The Norton County BB gun team is well known in international circles, having won the championship eight times, more than any other community.

Since assuming sponsorship, the Rotary Club has established a Norton BB Gun Museum on East U.S. 36 Highway. The museum displays the rich history

of the Norton shooting education and marksmanship program.

Norton has won the state championship 37 times and was runner-up this spring. The top three teams in each state shoot qualify for the international championships.

In recent history, Norton won the international title in 1990, 1991, 1998 and 2000 and placed second in 2003 and third in 1996. Last year's team placed second in shooting and fifth overall.

The young marksmen must be between 8 and 15 years of age. They compete in four shooting positions -- prone, standing, sitting and kneeling. The written test will contain questions on information from the Daisy 10-Lesson Curriculum and the National Rifle Association BB Gun Rule Book.

Norton's international team members this year and their ages are: Brady Tien, 14; Alexis Lively, 13; Dylan Sprigg, 13; Lane Archer, 12 and Erin Archer, 10. Alternates are Gabe Bird, 12 and Michael Smith, 12.

Assisting head coach Cameron Archer with coaching duties have been Mike Campbell and Cole Archer but Campbell will not make the trip to the international.

Classroom instructor is Lynette Archer. Three members of this year's international team have experience at the international level. Lane Archer and Dylan

Sprigg were members of the Norton 2006 international team and Erin Archer was an alternate on the 2007 team.

Four of this year's marksmen are second generation BB gun shooters for Norton. Alexis Lively's mother, Jill, was a shooter as were Cameron Archer, current coach and father of Lane and Erin Archer and Angie Bird, mother of Gabe.

The Norton team had its final pre-international practice on Monday night in the Norton BB Gun Museum building.

The Norton team qualified for the international championships through the Kansas Rifle Association State Shoot in Alma and the Kansas State 4-H Shoot in Great Bend.

"We've been improving every week and, hopefully, we will peak at the right time," said coach Archer. "I think we're ready. We just ask every shooter to focus, breathe steadily and have a calm hand."

"We had each shooter set scoring goals for themselves after the state shoots and I set my goals for them as well. They're still behind the goals but making progress."

The BB guns themselves can cause problems for the marksmen so Norton has always maintained them to the utmost. Coach Archer indicated that the guns have been holding up well in the twice-a-week practices.

The written test is 20 percent of each shooter's score and it can make a real dif-

ference in a shooter's final score. Norton always concentrates on the written test during practices.

"The written test is always a concern due to the higher comprehensive level of the questions," said classroom instructor Archer. "Our youngsters have a solid knowledge of proper shooting technique, rules and regulations but they word the test to weed out those who are unsure. We've tried a number of different things this year in preparing for the written test and we expect our shooters to test well."

Traveling to the state and international shoot is expensive but the Norton community has been generous in its support.

The sponsoring Rotary Club and others help with donations but the team also raised money this year through prize donations and a car wash.

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Long horse journey benefits children

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Phil Dawson believes in three things: kids, horses and America. That's why, he, along with his wife, Patty, and their two Appaloosa stallions, "Billy" and "Jet" are riding from their home in Hagerman, Idaho to Pocahontas State Park in Virginia, raising funds on the way. Accompanying them is Dennis Copenbarger, also from Hagerman.

Mr. Dawson said, "Children are the future of America. But, not all children in America are lucky enough to experience even the smallest joys that other American children take for granted." These are the children who are affected with long-term illnesses.

The couple takes turns riding and tries to average about 20 miles a day. Mr. Dawson said, "We'll go according to what the horse is capable of doing." He said he checks them very closely. He spent 25 years as a blacksmith so he knows what to look for. He is able to shoe the horses and watches their hooves for injuries.

When the horses aren't being ridden, they get to ride in an air-conditioned trailer equipped with a gravity flow watering system invented by Mr. Dawson. They get plenty of hay, vitamins and a special-mix mash Mr. Dawson stirs up for them. Mr. Dawson said they expect to arrive in Virginia by Oct. 20. He said this trip was a year in the making.
