

Huskies hand Weskan 54-0 defeat

The Northern Valley Huskies didn't have to spend much time on the football field Friday night. In fact two quarters took care of the night's business as they shut out the Weskan Coyotes 54-0 at home.

The Huskies rolled to 28 points in the first quarter and 26 in the second.

Statistically, the Huskies carried the ball 33 times for 272 yards vs. 19 carries for 1 yard for the Coyotes.

In the air, Northern Valley was 2 of 3 for 26 yards and the visitors 5 of 10 for 39 yards.

Total offense for the Huskies was 298 yards and for the Coyotes 40.

Each team had 3 first downs. Northern Valley was penalized 2 times for 10 yards and Weskan 3 for 15 yards.

The Huskies fumbled 1, Weskan 4 times and lost 3.

Northern Valley punted once for 24 yards and Weskan 5 times for

107 yards.

Huskies do well in final home volleyball matches

The Northern Valley volleyball Lady Huskies hosted Triplains and Golden Plains for their last home matches of the season.

The Triplains contest saw the Huskies play a team that had just defeated them last Saturday in Ellis. But, this was a new day and at home.

"With the events that had happened to our school the day before — we were not focused on volleyball as the match began and we lost 11-25. We then realized that we were there for a purpose and playing would take our minds off those events and we started to play our kind of ball and came back in the second by using our skills to win 25-19. This set up the final game where we jumped out to a lead but could not hold it late in the game as Triplains used their 3 attackers to go ahead 20-23," said coach Chuck Zimmerman.

"Triplains is a very good team, one we could face on down the road in substate competition. We needed this win to let them and the rest of the substate area know we are to be taken seriously. This, as the girls were told, was the defining moment in this season. To our

girls credit they rallied with great team work using a determination that they showed in last year's basketball season when they came from behind to win the league tournament and regional tournaments. This determination is what a team, especially a volleyball team, must have to counter rallies that other teams start and must be countered. We came back to win 26-24 to win a very important match," the coach said.

"In our second match we played against Golden Plains and started off very well as we won the first game 25-18. But, as we do sometimes, we relaxed and allowed Golden Plains to have some confidence in their play and we did not respond and were defeated 23-25.

"So, we gave the fans their monies worth on this our last date at home as we played three games and in the third we didn't dominate but we did win 25-20 to win the match," he said.

The junior varsity also played two matches and did their older "sisters" one better as they took care of their competition in two, defeating Triplains 25-20, 25-15

and Golden Plains 25-14, 25-15.

"These young ladies have improved greatly from the time they stepped on our high school court to today. They have made some minor adjustments to the way they perform their skills, to suit the high school style of play, and have done well against their competition. To date they have a 7-2 record with their only losses to 3A schools," coach Zimmerman said.

"So to say the least, coach Largent and myself are pleased with their improvement and play and going into their last competition against bigger schools we will see if they can continue to put victories on the board.

"The team wants to thank our fans for the support we have been given here at home. We had 4 home dates this year compared to none last year and the support was great and we hope we enjoyed our play. We feel we have improved in our skills and our 'scrambling' and we continue to work on becoming more confident in our spiking," the coach said.

"As a fan stated — when we are on we are fun to watch. But,

when we are not, as the team says, we play 'ugly' and that is not fun to watch especially for us 'old' coaches who know they can," said coach Zimmerman.

Lady Husky Volleyball Hill City Tournament

The Lady Husky volleyball team traveled to Hill City for their invitational tournament and came away winning one, losing one and forfeiting another.

"We started the day with Trego and put ourselves into a hole early but fought back to only lose 21-25. We then regrouped and battled hard but our down fall was our serving as in both games we missed 13 serves. Again, 13 free points. And we lost the second game 25-27.

"That's two games lost by a combined 6 points and we gave them 13. Again, something we must realize and correct before the conference and regional tournaments," the coach said.

"We played Brewster in our final game of the day and lost the first game by not attacking and allowing Brewster to control the game with their attacks. We came back

in the second game and won by playing our style of ball and forced Brewster to play defense while we attacked. In the third game we took control and never looked back and won," he explained.

"We now go into our final full week of the regular season with hopes of finishing strong with the conference tournament this next weekend at Thunder Ridge," he said.

Junior varsity Jays lose to St. Francis

The Norton Community High School junior varsity football team lost to St. Francis 24-6 on Monday evening Oct. 6 in St. Francis.

The Indians scored on an opening drive the length of the field to take an 8-0 lead. St. Francis scored again early in the second quarter with another long drive culminating with a 1 yard touchdown run. The converted extra points made the score 16-0.

The Norton offense then came alive as the Jays stormed downfield late in the second quarter. Led by a long pass completion from Spencer Shirk to Brett Terrell, Norton had a first and goal opportunity. Unfortunately, the Jays were unable to capitalize and entered halftime trailing 16-0.

Norton continued to move the ball in the third quarter and the Blue Jay defense stiffened but Norton was unable to take advantage of scoring opportunities.

The Blue Jays broke into the scoring column early in the fourth quarter when Jordan Wahlmeier connected with Ryan Blecha on an 8 yard strike, cutting the deficit to 16-6.

St. Francis answered with a 44 yard touchdown run and two extra points to make the final score 24-6.

"We did not bring the needed intensity to the beginning of the game and found ourselves deep in a hole early and were not able to get out of it," said Norton assistant coach David Stover.

"We had success moving the ball offensively but just couldn't finish drives with scores.

"We were able to get positive

results from many of our players but it needs to become more consistent if we are to improve as a team."

The Norton junior varsity's final game of the season was held Monday when they played Colby at Colby, beginning at 5:30 p.m.

The Blue Jay freshmen played Atwood on Thursday night in a game not on the original schedule.


