Members of the GFWC Mid-Century Club focused on sharing and giving at their November meeting at the home of Doris Winteroth. Leta Donovan was co-hostess.

Lois Myers shared stories and information about the outreach programs of Samaritan's Purse, founded by Franklin Graham.

These programs include Children's Homes, Children's Heat Program, Emergency Relief and Operation Christmas Child.

Operation Christmas Child was founded in 1970 and now has 1856 relay centers from which shoe boxes go to 372 distribution centers and then to six regional areas with 70,000 volunteers involved.

Operation Christmas Child involves filling shoe boxes with personal hygiene items, toys, games, books and/or school supplies for a specific age and gender of child — 2 to 4, 5 to 9, or 10 to 14 years, boy or girl — to be distributed to needy

children around the world.

Last year 7.6 million boxes were distributed around the world; 4.6 million were provided from volunteers in the United States.

Members of Mid-Century displayed the contents of nine shoe boxes they had filled for Operation Christmas Child.

Club member teams had packed three for girls, ages 2 to 4; two for girls ages 1- to 14; two for boys, ages 5 to 9; and two for boys, ages 10 to 14 years.

These were sent, with the needed postage, to the Plainville relay center. In addition to filling the shoe boxes, members were reminded to pray for the children and their families who will receive these boxes.

The short business meeting included committee reports, a report on 1734 Treasures at GFWC Headquarters and plans for the Christmas meeting on Dec. 11 at the home of Ginni Concannon.
