Home remodeled after three decades

Norman and Gloria Nelson's home sits adjacent to the pool, an ideal location for the home they built 30 years ago. A great deal of work has gone into the home, mostly in the basement which features many new additions to the home.

The main goal was to finish the basement, although her sister Judy Jocelyn, design specialist with Just Imagine, was the main influence. Mrs. Nelson said her sister planned and oversaw the re-model of the home.

The secondary kitchen is another important addition. Mrs. Nelson said she uses it for canning. She recalled canning fruit with her grandmother on the farm when she was younger.

"I did lots and lots of canning on the farm in Long Island," Mrs. Nelson said.

The kitchen is lined with jars of fruit and other canned goods.

A guest room sits off of the living room. Mrs. Nelson said they started planning by picking out the color scheme in the guest room as well as the bedding. A bathroom connects to the guest room, which has also been updated. Mrs. Jocelyn carefully picked out the decorations.

Mrs. Nelson's basement was updated with new lighting fixtures and flooring, although the walls remain the same. Antique furniture is scattered

throughout the basement.

Mrs. Nelson said planning began in May 2008 when they were in Colorado looking at some design magazines. It was recently completed.

While most of the work took place downstairs, some redecorating has happened over the years on the main floor.

The Nelsons moved into their three bedroom home in July 1979.
