 go out and the pumps will shut off again.  
 The work was planned two years ago when the city built it into this year's budget. Mr. Lawson said they anticipated having problems then.  
 "This is common. It is not unique to Norton," he said.

It is not yet known how much water will be lost due to the pressure relief valves running. The water loss does not affect the utility increases; those were due to upgrades at the water and sewer plants.  
 Mr. Lawson said an independent firm inspects the tower every three years. He said the tower

was in pretty bad shape, and there could have been a problem with rust if the work had not been completed.  
 The outside painting is expected to be completed next week. The roof will be painted blue, Norton will be in black lettering and a bluejay beak will be painted on the sides.

 "Osborne was not very good but, unfortunately, we were worse," said coach Cox.  
 Bethany Roy and Erin Terrell led Norton in kills with 5, followed by Kendra Engelbert and Kaitlyn Wolf, 2 each; Alyssa Thomson, 1.  
 In the serving department, Wolf led with 3 aces, followed by Terrell with 2 and Engelbert with 1.  
 Ashlie Stewart led in digs with 8, followed by Roy, 4; Wolf, 3; Thomson, 2; Raven Brown, Shelby Jones and Hannah Waggoner, 1 each.  
 In the assists category, Jones led with 6, followed by Roy, 4; Englebert and Terrell, 1 each.  
 Wolf had 1 block.  
**Win over Colby**  
 "Coming off a very disappointing loss to Osborne, the Lady Jays rallied to beat Colby in two," said

coach Cox.  
 "We played better, especially in the areas of passing and serving."
