

State Treasurer's office offers program to return property to vets

Just in time for Veterans Day, Kansas State Treasurer Dennis McKinney has announced that his office is bringing the Patriots Property Program to Kansas. Modeled from a Missouri initiative, Kansas now has a system in place to reunite Kansas Veterans with their unclaimed property.

The Patriots Property Program was created through a partnership between the State Treasurer's Office and the Kansas Commission on Veterans Affairs.

"These veterans have served our country well and we owe it to them," McKinney said. "Finding and returning their property is the least that we can do."

The State Treasurer's office will begin immediately looking for 35,000 veterans that may have unclaimed property.

Names of Kansas Veterans with property being held by the state will also be published on the State Treasurer's Web site, www.kansasstatetreasurer.com/patriotsproperty.

"When a name or address of the veteran matches a name or address in our unclaimed property database, then the veteran's most current contact information will be used to get in touch with them and make them aware of their lost property," explained McKinney. "We are proud of our veterans and we want to make every effort to return the favor of the great sacrifice that they have made for our country," McKinney said.

Each year thousands of people lose track of their bank accounts, cash, stocks, bonds, refunds, royalties, safe deposit boxes and other property.

People move and forget to furnish their bank, broker, employer or insurance company with a forwarding address. It is the treasurer's charge to locate the rightful owners and heirs to the over \$209 million in unclaimed assets currently being held by the State of Kansas.

"Norton County employees will do the work," Wyatt said.

In other commission business: Diane Stiles, Norton City/County Economic Development director, spoke about current issues with wind power development, saying there are issues with wind power and the zoning of counties. Wind energy organizations are making certain requirements with counties that are not zones. County Attorney Doug Sebelius spoke about the process of zoning. The commission discussed the issue but is not considering zoning at this time.

Norton County Road and Bridge Supervisor Tom Brannan delivered his weekly report. He updated the commission on road

maintenance and on the signage project. He said he is working on obtaining materials locally to build the signs. He will also check into the purchase of the machine.

The commission discussed the agreements with landowners regarding the storage of millings. Brannan said the original agreement was two years and has not elapsed. The commission suggested Brannan clarify the agreements and make new ones.

Brannan also presented road agreements between Norton County and the neighboring counties. The agreements were for road and bridge maintenance of roads between the counties. They need to be signed by Norton County Commissioners as well as the commissioners from other counties.

Charles Krull, Blue Cross and

Blue Shield representative, delivered the 2010 Norton County employees health insurance renewal. The county selected the high deductible plan.

The commission held a department head meeting to discuss the health benefits for 2010 as well as the technology contract. It was agreed that the hours on the technology contract will stay the same, but any expense other than maintenance will be a department expense.

The commission discussed employee benefits for 2010. After reviewing the new high deductible plan, the commission decided to hold a staff meeting to include all employees of the county. The meeting will be held Thursday at 8:30 a.m. County offices will be closed until 10:30 a.m.

Witt is currently sending packages to six servicemen. She said one is in Germany, one is in Korea and the rest are in Afghanistan or Iraq. Another set of packages will be sent Dec. 1.

Witt said recipients must be connected to Norton County; they had to graduate from Norton schools, have a parent here or have lived here at some point.

She said a lot of people are not sure what to write to someone they don't know, but they can write about anything going on at home, even how the local football team is doing.

"They like getting the letters from home," she said.

She said some soldiers write back, but she mostly hears from their families.

Sgt. Jeff Burton is currently on the soldier's board. His parents are Gene and Jane Burton.

"The first time he got a package, he was just amazed. He really appreciates it," his mother said.

Witt said she packs her boxes full because she knows if the recipient can't use something they can pass it along to someone who needs it.

"There are some people over there who don't get anything," she said.

Burton agreed, saying her son passes some things on to other soldiers.

Witt said the church participates and anyone can donate items or money. People have donated money or items for the packages. Witt said around Christmas time she likes to send things like Christmas decorations.

She said the items can range from hygiene, to snacks, to cloth-

ing to games and other miscellaneous items.

"The church has been very supportive," she said.

Witt started the soldier's board when her church did a 40 Days of Community, stressing community outreach.

She said she was a military wife and wanted to reach out to people in the military.

Donations are accepted at the Christian Church, 208 N. Kansas Ave, or by contacting Witt, 877-3660.

She said she will continue sending things until we don't have a military presence in Afghanistan, Iraq or Kuwait.

Burton said the First Church of God also sends care packages. She said she is very appreciative of the soldier board.

"They were so gracious to include soldiers from the community," she said.
