Time to Spring clean your freezer

Have you looked deep into your freezer lately? Do you know what is really in there? Spring is the time of year to freshen the house, but it's also a good time to clean the freezer.

If you have a manual defrost freezer, it should be defrosted regularly or when there is about 1/4 inch thick ice on the walls. Remove the food, put in insulated coolers or in the refrigerator to keep cold. Unplug the freezer, open the door and let the ice melt. Scrape out the ice. Place a towel in the bottom to help soak up water. After it is frost free, wipe the interior with a solution of one tablespoon baking soda in one quart water. Wipe clean with fresh water and dry with a towel. Turn the freezer back on, let it cool for about 30 minutes.

Before putting the food back into the clean freezer, take inventory and remove "mystery" foods or items that have freezer burn or torn packages. Date the remaining items and use them first.

For automatic defrost freezers, it's also a good idea to clean it out and take inventory. Remove the food, use the baking soda solution to freshen the interior. Rinse and dry before putting the food back into the freezer.

If you have an odor in your refrigerator, here are four suggestions for removing the odor:

- Unplug the refrigerator and thoroughly wash the inside of the unit with a mixture of two tablespoons of baking soda dissolved in one quart of warm water. Wash the shelves, drawers, accessories and gaskets. Be sure to wash corners, crevices or grooves where odor causing liquid may have settled. Dry thoroughly.

- Place activated charcoal or activated carbon in a shallow bowl and leave it in the refrigerator while it is running for several days. The charcoal or carbon is available where aquarium and/or plant and garden supplies are sold. It will become saturated but can be reactivated by heating in a 300 degree oven for one hour and

then put back into the refrigerator. Try this for about 10 days.

- Place toothpaste (not the gel type) on small pieces of foil and set in several spots in the refrigerator.

- Lightly crumple sheets of newspaper and loosely pack a refrigerator shelf which has been emptied of food. Sprinkle the newspaper with water and close the door. Replace the newspaper every 1-2 days. In 5-6 days the odor should be gone.

If odor gets into the plastic lining or the insulation of the refrigerator, it can take a long time to dissipate.
