(Continued from Page 1) cooling tower.  
Lawson said the city purchases power from Prairie Land and Sunflower Electric, but the plant can generate power for the city in an emergency.  
"We can buy it cheaper than we can produce it," he said.  
Lawson said the plant is staffed by six employees, who could be absorbed into other city depart-

ments if hours are reduced.  
"We've talked about it. It's just unknown," he said of the employees.  
Leroux said one power plant employee transferred to a meter reader position, and the position left vacant at the plant will not be advertised.  
"For the time being, we will not advertise to fill the position vacancy his transfer will create,"

Leroux said.  
"We man it 24 hours a day, seven days a week," Lawson said.  
He said safety is the biggest reason the plant is staffed day and night, although other cities have eliminated hours and haven't had a problem, Lawson said.  
Lawson said the cooling system has had problems for the last 30 years.

"We're at the point where we need to do something," he said.  
The cost for repairing or replacing the plant is unknown at this point.  
"It could be millions of dollars," he said.  
Leroux said utility rates may be increased if the city decides to keep the plant open and safely operational.  
He encouraged residents to

come to the council or committee meetings to voice their concerns.  
"As a community, we need to make a decision on what direction we wish to go in for our power plant, and we need to know how much we are willing to pay to keep it operational," he said.  
Lawson said for now the plant is continuing to operate.  
"As far as I'm concerned, it's

business as usual at the power plant," he said.  
Curt Archibald, power plant supervisor, declined to comment for this article.  
The city council will continue to discuss the issue.  
The next city council meeting will be held May 5 at 5:30 p.m. at the city office. The next utility committee meeting will be set May 5.

She also benefits from the help of LINK, Living Independently in Northwest Kansas.  
She lives with her father, Robert Bean, where she writes her

music and sings. Plans to record her original songs are also underway.  
An adult student at Chanda's Dance Illusions Studio in Norton, Ms. Beagley has a pragmatic outlook on her situation.  
She said, "This could come back on me anytime, so I wanted

to do this (dancing) while I could. I've learned you can't take any moment for granted."  
Getting ready to perform in her first public dance recital, Ms. Beagley was nervous about remembering her dance steps.  
Her short-term memory loss makes it difficult. She said, "I'm

nervous, but I'm doing it anyway."  
Ms. Beagley credits her faith with a tremendous part of her recovery and coping with her condition.  
She said, "I wouldn't wish this on anyone. I just wish there was a support group for people who

have been through the same thing I've gone through."  
Even though her children say her personality is different than the mother they grew up with, her family has been very supportive. She has three children, Clinton Yoder, Clayton Yoder and Caroline Lewis and 12 grand-

children.  
Ms. Beagley said she is a stronger person for having gone through her medical ordeal, but as an end result she now knows real joy.  
"If I could ever help anybody else, I would," she said.
