Hospital to begin work on entryway

Concrete work in the emergency entrance area of the Norton County Hospital parking lot is scheduled to begin Monday, October 4 and conclude Friday, October 15. The inconvenience to patients and visitors will be minimal, as work will be affecting only ambulance and private vehicle traffic directly in front of the Emergency Department garage doors and three parking stalls directly east of the Outpatient Clinic Entrance. Safe pedestrian access to the Main and Emergency/Night Entrance will remain through the entrance under the covered walkway.

The main parking lot for patients and visitors will not be affected with these improvements.

Renew vehicle tags before Thursday

This is a tag renewal reminder for those whose names begin with the letter "P", "Q" or "R". The deadline is September 30. Bring your current proof of insurance and drivers license to the Norton County Treasurer's office in the Courthouse.

Drivers license renewals can be processed Tuesday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Instructional permits (IP) and drivers education restricted licenses can be processed in the office by appointment only.

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Scores of people from 14 states, including Kansas and one person from Canada, have filed past "The Moving Wall" during its display in Norton. Some came to remember, some to learn, and still others to look for a name. Few came away unmoved by the experience.

"The Moving Wall," a half-size replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C., arrived Thursday. Members of the American Legion Riders and numerous other volunteers assisted with set-up and during the event.

Lt. Col. Ramon Horinek, one of the most decorated officers and a former prisoner-of-war, was the speaker for the opening ceremony.

Horinek, who now lives in Texas, said he's often asked to speak. However, at nearly 80 years old, he only agrees to give four or five speeches a year.

"No way I was going to turn down one in Kansas so close to my home town of Atwood," he said.

Despite his personal torture by the North Vietnamese and five and a half years in captivity, Horinek said the real heroes were those whose names were on the Wall. They gave up their own plans for the future because their country called.

The Opening Ceremony also included a cannon salute by members of the First Nebraska Artillery. The cannons are exact replicas of Civil War cannons built by owners Billy Steinke, Culbertson;

Tom Lashley, McCook; Erv Huxoll, Arapahoe; Delbert Beins, Beaver City, and Lyle Hutchens, Hendley. Mark Hutchens, Beaver City and Wade Beins, Chadron, also helped fire the cannons. They were all dressed in authentic Civil War uniforms.

Friday evening's ceremony included the presentation of medallions by Curt Archibald, Commander of Weiland VFW Post 9043. Though the medallions for Vietnam War veterans have been approved by the Kansas Veterans Commission, they have not been made yet. So Archibald said the VFW and the Harmonson Redd American Legion Post No. 63 purchased coins to present to the 75 veterans who have made application for the medallions. They then called down all of the Vietnam veterans eligible for the medallions to the stage. They presented a total of 96 coins.

"As far as I know everyone got a coin," Archibald said.

The Norton Community High School choir performed at the Saturday evening service honoring prisoners of war and those missing in action. They sang a number of patriotic songs, including the National Anthem and salute to services.

During that era, everyone was affected. The nation was torn by moral issues related to the War, but those questions didn't matter to the families of the missing, said Jim Deister, Salina, Chair of Kansas State Council POW-MIA, Vietnam Veterans of (Wall - Continued on Page 5)

Commissioners consider hospital issues

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Norton County Hospital issues dominated the Norton County Commissioners meeting Sept. 20. Chairman Richard Thompson presided, and Commissioner Carolyn Applegate and County Clerk Robert D. Wyatt were present.

Hospital Administrator Richard Miller presented the audit outlining details.

Amy Griffey, director of Hospital planning and development, spoke about the resolution recently passed by the board. It supports a bond for the construction of

the new facility. She also reported on the process of the bond and public notification.

Commissioners and hospital representatives discussed the second floor renovation. Projects currently in the works take priority, and future renovations like the second floor will be addressed later.

Chief Financial Officer Ryan Stover gave a report on the current financial statement, including patient days, admissions, observation patients and total outpatient procedures. Revenues and patient procedures are down; however, Stover felt there were several possible reasons for the slow down.

Stover also gave the Hospital Comparative Income Statement of the revenue and operating expenses for the current month and year-to-date.

Miller reported that the concrete in front of the Emergency Medical Services entrance is going to be replaced. It isn't very old, but hasn't held up well, he said. Public notices will be placed and staff notified. The walkway will be used as an alternative entrance.

Hospital board members also attending were Von Fahrenbruch, Ruth Benien and Warren White.

Chairman Thompson also presented Applegate a (Hospital - Continued on Page 5)

Norton FFA team wins land judging

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On Sept. 22, Norton hosted the Future Farmers of America (FFA) Northwest Area Land Judging with 11 schools competing.

The Norton team placed first with a score of 1101; followed by Cheylin 1038; Hays 1002; Ellis 918; WaKeeney 886; Oakley 803; Russell 784; Smith Center 769; Atwood 723; Hoxie 644 and Palco 553.

By placing first, Norton FFA has qualified to attend the National Land Judging Contest in Oklahoma City next spring.

Individual placements were: 1. Troy Bainter, Norton, 389; 2. Darcy Bainter,

Norton, 378; 3. Craig Busse, Cheylin, 370 (165); 4. Korey Phannestiel, Hays, 370 (157); 5. Bailey Ambrosier, Norton, 356; 6. Will Orton, Cheylin, 350; 7. Scott Pfeifer, Ellis, 344; 8. Cash Drylie, Hays, 337; 9. Wyatt Wentz, Norton, 334; and 10. Austin Hager, Norton 331.

There were 6 excavated areas in the field and the groups were broken up by alphabet not by schools. There was a time limit to evaluate the site and mark the individual observations on their score sheets. All sites were judged by each group.

Land judging and homesite evaluation is a popular FFA and 4-H event. (FFA - Continued on Page 5)

Memories stand tall as church closes doors

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Most days the population of Edmond is about 40; however, Sunday that number tripled in honor of the closing service at the First United Methodist Church.

Pastor Lyn Linde, who has served as pastor for the Edmond and Norton churches since July, said seven to ten people attend church there on most Sundays, but that hasn't always been the case.

"In its heyday the pews were filled," Linde said.

With few new families in town, there was little chance of growth, though, so the congregation decided last February to close while there still was an existing congregation.

"I absolutely love the country church. I feel at home filled with spirituality, and

they make you feel welcome," she said. Several church members have already moved to Norton and were driving to Edmond now to attend church in their former home.

Local churches have the option to close, and there were no dissenting votes when the members of the Edmond church voted.

"Everyone is in agreement," Linde said.

In addition to the regular worship service Sunday, Hays District Superintendent Max Clayton performed the declaration of deconsecration of the building declaring it no longer a meeting place of United Methodist congregation.

Three former pastors attended including Herman "Buzz" Lambrecht, Lewis (Church - Continued on Page 5)
