Deer collisions more common in the fall

Approximately 1.6 million motor vehicle crashes are caused by deer each year, and spike October through December due to deer mating season, according to the Insurance Information Institute. These collisions make up over \$3.6 billion in vehicle damage per year, with each incident averaging \$3,000 worth of damage, based on statistics from the Insurance Information Institute.

"It is essential that drivers stay focused and alert when driving in densely populated deer areas, said Jim Hanni, executive vice president of public and government affairs at American Automobile Association." Collisions caused by deer are generally covered under insurance policies. However, if involved in an accident, it is best to contact your insurance company immediately.

Insurance agents say most damage from deer collisions occurs in the front or on the side of a car. If involved in a crash, drivers are encouraged to first call local law enforcement for assistance

and then to make note of the date, time, street name and take any pictures to help document the incident.

While driving this fall, agents recommend drivers keep the following tips in mind to stay safe on roadways:

Scan the road and shoulders ahead of you. Looking ahead helps provide enough reaction time if a deer is spotted. Also, remember deer often move in groups, so when there is one deer, there are usually more in the area.

Use high beam headlights if there is no oncoming traffic. Deer may be spotted sooner when using high beams allowing time to slow down, move over or beep to scare the deer away from the road.

If a collision is unavoidable, press the brakes firmly and remain in your lane. Swerving to avoid a deer can often cause a more serious crash or result in drivers losing control of vehicles.

Drivers should always wear a seat belt and drivers should remain awake, alert and sober.

Norton hospital joins research

Norton County Hospital and the University of Kansas Medical Center have joined forces in a research project, Kan Quit II, to identify better ways to help hospitalized smokers quit.

For the next two years smokers hospitalized at the hospital will have the opportunity to participate. Participants will receive telephone counseling from a

tobacco treatment specialist at the University. Some participants will receive individualized case management to aid them using medications to quit smoking.

Hospitalized smokers who want to participate can ask their nurse.

The Norton hospital is one of 30 critical access hospitals in the state participating in the project.
