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needs a building permit will go to the state for review and comment, usually is just a formality. The state agency's review can raise questions though.

However, Davis stressed that the final decision rests with the local government, in this case, Norton.

"The state is allowed to comment on the proposed work; however, the Norton City Council has the right to overturn the state's opinion," she said.

The Historic District is comprised of 19-acres of commercial, industrial and civic properties between the two railroad alignments on the north and south edges of

downtown.

The district is generally bounded by East Lincoln Street on the north, East Penn Street on the south, South Norton Avenue on the east, and on the west by South First Street. It includes 43 contributing buildings, one contributing structure, which is the brick paved street network, and 17 non-contributing buildings and one non-contributing structure constructed between 1887 and 1985. More than 70 percent of the structures contribute to the significance of the District.

Non-contributing properties don't add to the historic significance because they are either non-historic, not built within the period of significance, or

have been altered and no longer reflect their historic appearance. Non-contributing properties may become contributing if they were built within the historic period and are returned to their historic appearance.

For anyone interested in learning more, there will be a meeting at 5:30 p.m., Dec. 8 in the Economic Development Office, 113 N. Norton. Davis will be there to describe the how the listing on the National Register works, what it means, grants, incentives, and the environs law review in Topeka, as well as answer questions.

Property owners in the District also can go to the Economic Development Office to learn the history of their property.
