Community High School; 214 students, 27 Staff and 24 parents; Norton Junior High; 107 students, 12 staff and 24 parents; Eisenhower Elementary; 89 Students (5th and 6th grade only), 28 staff and 48 parents. Fourteen questions were common on all the surveys with four extra questions included in the survey for the high school and junior high.

staff response was 56 percent yes. • Students have a positive attitude towards the school. Forty three percent of high school students responded by saying yes and 57 percent said no. Junior high students: 49 percent yes, 45 percent no. Eisenhower students: 42 percent yes and 54 percent no. The faculty at all schools ranged from 89 percent yes at Norton Community High School to 100 percent yes at both the junior high and elementary. Among students this question had the lowest yes percentage. • My ideas and opinions are valued. This question was the lowest at the high school level with 48 percent of the students responding yes and 52 percent no. High school parents said yes, 62 percent, while

the junior high parents responded with 55 percent yes. The high school and junior high statement that was the most divided was: There is too much emphasis placed on extracurricular activities. Fifty five percent of high school and 47 percent of the junior high students said yes. Staff was even more divided with 49 percent of the high school faculty saying yes and the junior high responding 25 percent yes. Parents at the high school said 63 percent yes. Junior high parents said 46 percent yes. An overall positive census was given to the Norton schools by the survey. The survey was for information only and there were no actions taken at the board meeting on the composited results.

during the week. Other activities include providing space for visiting after funerals, wedding receptions, commodity distribution, health clinic screenings, inside garage sales, a farmers market outlet, lunch stand for auctions and meetings and dispatch for the public transportation service and Norton CARES. In addition the space is used to make cookie trays for shut ins, hold fund raisers, gather mittens and food for God's Pantry and Lions boxes, make things for the hospital like tote bags and baby Christmas stockings, provide an area for canning produce and as a social service information station. The building can be rented for \$35 a day, is handicapped accessible and has been inspected and complies with the Americans with Disabilities Act, Pabian said. Ms. Pabian also spoke to the commissioners as the manager and dispatcher for the county's public transportation system. She said she was asking for the same amount the service got last year and a letter that says the county will pay for part of the costs. "I'm not going to ask for an increase," she said with a smile. "I wouldn't get it." The transportation service, which is for everyone in the county, not just for the elderly, she noted, gets money from the state and federal government as well as the county, which will be asked to

contribute about \$6,000 out of a \$21,000 budget. Commissioner Applegate, looked at figures of bus ridership and noted that less than one-half of those riding the bus were seniors. In November, 254 people rode the bus. Of those 112 were 60 or over, 32 were in wheelchairs and 142 were from the general public. The ridership is increasing, Pabian said. In June, the bus had 196 passengers of which 105 were over 60. Pabian said that she plans to make sure there is enough money to pay drivers through the end of the budget year, which is June 2011, even if she has to volunteer her time as the dispatcher. Right now, she said, she gets paid \$3,500 a year but is also on call 24/7 and takes calls at home. She also gets money from Norton CARES and the senior meal site. "We are taking school children and we are also asked to cover Graham County," she said. The state requires that the service help other counties out, she said, and all five of the Graham County trips have been for people in wheelchairs since the Graham County bus is not wheelchair accessible. All of those people on those out-of-county trips, which have been to and from the hospital and doctors offices, have given a nice donation for the service, she noted. There are two ways that the

service can increase the amount of money it brings in, she said. One is sell advertising on the outside of the bus and the second is go to a mandatory fare. Pabian said that she would prefer the fare since it is hard enough for many people to spot the transportation bus as it is and if it were covered with ads it might be really difficult. Right now donations are requested for rides, she said \$2 in town, \$5 in the county and \$10 out. In January every county with bus service will need to have wheelchair access, she said. "I don't know what Graham County will do then," she said. Commissioner John Miller suggested checking on the advertising idea to help pay the costs and Commissioner Applegate suggested that ads on the back of the bus might be the way to go. Pabian said that she doesn't object to advertising inside the bus but would look at other ideas. Pabian also noted that Norton CARES acts as a backup. When the bus is out she can call on Norton CARES to help people so they will not have to wait too long. "Most directors aren't willing to take as little as you do and be on call 24/7 to do this work," Commissioner Miller, said. "I am very satisfied with my job," Pabian said. "It's a challenge to see that we can accomplish what we can with what we have."
