Graders get spots to park

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When its time to go home each night, where do the county crews park their large equipment like road graders, which are too big and bulky to send back to their barn every day?

Sometimes they are parked on the right-of-way or county property but often they end up on private property.

The Norton County commissioners want to be sure that this is OK with all parties and that the landowners don't feel upset or unhappy about the arrangements.

At Monday's meeting, they looked over a letter of agreement with landowners, who have had graders parked on their land.

The agreement would provide a yearly stipend for the landowner and a parking place for the county equipment at night and on the weekends.

Road and Bridge Administrative Assistant Sandy Smith and foremen Herman Pfannenstiel and Floyd Richard talked to the commissioners about the equipment and the cleanup that is going on at the county shop.

The cleanup is going well, Smith said, adding that the attic is done.

"That's a lot of years of junk," Commissioner Carolyn Applegate said.

"That's not junk," Commissioner John Miller responded noting that the county is hoping to sell the excess "stuff" at an auction in the next couple of months.

Smith said that the road crew is putting aside anything sellable but has a dump truck taking stuff to the landfill. Iron and aluminum is being put aside to go for recycling, she said.

It might be possible to use the attic for record storage now that it is cleaned out, Smith said. It is dry and warm up there and there is no evidence of insects or mice.

The workers that use the welding corner have been assigned to clean it up, she said, since they will know what's still usable and what's not.

The goal is to have the sellable stuff cleaned out by mid February so that it will be ready for a consignment auction in

There are 2,559 members and the assets have grown to over \$30 million.

other than deposits will be available sooner and withdrawals will post faster.

Steve Mathes and Jim Green were re elected to the Board of Directors.

Kailey Gill, 10, has been a member since she was two-months old, she is the daughter of Tim and Kelley Gill.

There was a \$62 deposit made to her account in honor of the 62nd annual meeting.
