National Work Zone Awareness Week

Fashion advice for April 6: Go orange! That's the day KDOT is encouraging all Kansans to wear orange as a show of support for Kansas highway workers who risk their lives working on road projects and to raise awareness of work zone hazards. The Go Orange day is part of National Work Zone Awareness Week — April 4-8. "It can be easy to overlook the importance of highway workers. But the work they do contributes

significantly to the safety of travelers and the flow of commerce, and at times their work is done at great personal risk," said Kansas Transportation Secretary Deb Miller. "Wearing orange on April 6 is a way to show our support for highway workers and to raise awareness of the hazards of work zones for both workers and travelers." More than 85 percent of the time, it's motorists who are injured in work zone crashes. Last

year, more than 500 people were injured and seven people were killed in work zone crashes in Kansas. Some tips for driving in work zones include — watch for workers, follow traffic control, stay alert, change lanes when directed to do so, expect delays and allow ample space between you and the car in front of you.
